In Oregon there are now 50 parishes and missions looked after by 33 clergymen. Communicants number 3924 and Sunday school members, 1753, and have contributed \$59,753 during the year towards the support of the church. Special services included 366 baptisms, 231 confirmations, 191 marriages and 169 burials.
