FILES REPORT WHICH **URGES DRASTIC LAWS** AS A CHECK ON VICE

Wisconsin Legislative Committee Asks Passage of Acts Like Mann Measure.

SALOONS ARE ARRAIGNED

Blamed by Badger Solons for Loose Morals.

Madison, Wis., Jan. 9. - Fifteen months' study and investigation of the vice problem in Wisconsin by the legslative committee resulted in radical proposals for law enforcement andbetter secial conditions, summarized a public document with its filing with the secretary of state. The greatest cause of commercialized vice, the report says, is the use of intoxicating liquor. Contributory causes are public dance halls, roadhouses, poorly lighted parks and public places, lack of responsibility by parents, non-enforcement of laws by public officials, lack of public amusement and recreation facilities and automobiles. The committee found that the wage question has no material relation to a girl's downfall.

Committee Urges Reforms The committee recommends:

That a morals court be established in cities of the first class with exclusive jurisdiction over all cases in-Volving Loral offenses, That a law similar to the Mann acapplicable between cities, villages and

towns of the state, be enacted, That police departments be required to record all written complaints made, with a report of their findings thereon, with a view to centering respon sibility.

That a permanent state police department be established with power to investigate immoral practices, of law in all communities and power to enforce the law where local officers

Former Vice Consul at Breslau Declares Germany Has an Impregnable ute, as it now stands, is an invasion Portress at the Elbe's Mouth.

New York, Jan. 9 .- The German naval base at Heligoland has been made virtually impregnable by hundreds of heavy guns, many rows of contact mines and an armada of torpedo boats and destroyers, according to Richard Wackerow, former United States vice wackerow, former United States vice consul at Breslau, Germany, who has reached here from Genoa. Mr. Wackerow said that he had visited Heligoland shortly before sailing—a privilege he did not believe had been accorded any other American.

"Heligoland is a second Gibraltar," e said. "The great cliffs have in their sides concrete emplacements for hundreds of great guns and the Ger-man fleet lies just below. The English know it is impossible for them to pass the island fortifications."
