LUMBERMENS IS TO JOIN WITH NORTHWESTERN

Plans Practically Complete for Consolidation of Big National Banks Into One Institution.

TOTAL RESOURCES ARE MORE THAN \$10,000,000

Identity of Both Depositories Retained in Name to Be Adopted.

Negotiations have been practically completed for the consolidation of the Lumbermens National bank and the Northwestern National bank. The combination will take the name, Northwestern-Lumbermens National bank, and have its place of business in the quarters now occupied by the Northwestern bank in the new Northwestern National bank building at Sixth and Morrison streets. It will be several days, perhaps a month, before all details of the consolidation are completed.

SENATE ADJOURNS ON NEWS OF DEATH OF FATHER OF PRESIDENT

Rufus Thompson Passed Away at His Albany Home Last Night.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., Jan. 21.—The state senate held no business session this morning. It met and immediately adjourned until 2 o'clock this afternoon out of respect for the president, W. Laif Thompson, whose father, Rufus Thompson, died last night at Albany.

ATTORNEY AGREES TO BEHAVE

St. Clairsville, Ohio, Jan. 21.—Joseph Ector, noted L. W. agitator, was arraigned here today on a charge of treason. He pleaded not guilty and was bound over for action by the grand jury. Later Ector signed a \$5000 bond and left for New York, agreeing not to return or to send agitators to the Ohio strike district. The grand jury, it was announced, will take no action against Ector unless he returns to this section of the state. Ector was arrested in Belairs as he was about to address a gathering on the street on "war on capitalists."

ROSTAND PER IS DEAD

CHANGES PROPOSED BY SENATOR SMITH
