A large depression is central at sea off the North Pacific coast. Windings for this disturbance were last night at Cape May, N. J., and should it be necessary they will be extended to other points in this district soon.

Today, rain is falling in western Oregon and California and snow has occurred in southeastern Washington and Nevada. In connection with this disturbance, the Dakota high pressure area has advanced southward to Missouri and is now prevailing in the middle Mississippi valley and in portions of the Lake region. The low pressure area in Colorado, the western portion of the Dakota and the Canadian northwest.

The conditions are favorable for unsettled weather in this district tonight and Friday, with rain west of the Cascade mountains and snow or rain and snow showers elsewhere. The temperatures will slowly rise.

H. D. Slater Died Last Night.—H. D. Slater of this city, well known in Eastern Oregon died last night at his residence, 294 Simpson street, after a short illness. He was a native of Illinois and was born in 1847. He lived at Grand Forks, North Dakota prior to taking up his residence at Holbrook. Later he removed to Portland. He is a member of the Albina Masonic lodge. Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

Non-Residents Expensive.—Non-resident poor cost Multnomah county \$10,352 from June 12, 1910, to January 1, 1915, according to figures prepared by County Auditor Martin to be submitted to the ways and means committee of the house. County officials hope to have an appropriation made reimbursing the county as provided by law. The charge is made on the basis of 5 cents a day for 20,704 days provision made.

Geographic Board Named.—Salem, Or., Jan. 28.—Governor Withycombe, at the suggestion of Will G. Steel, president of the Oregon Geographic board, has appointed these two as new members of the board: Captain O. C. Applegate, Klamath Falls, and Turner Olive, La Grande. The seven other members of the board are Will G. Steel, Portland; George H. Himes, Portland; J. B. Horner, Corvallis; Lee Moorhouse, Pendleton; J. Q. A. Bowby, Astoria; Lewis A. Will Share Redcoating Cost.—The Portland Railway, Light & Power company will be required to pay nothing for the cost of repairs to the structural part of the Grand avenue bridge, although it will be required to pay the share of the cost of redecking. Such was the decision of the city council yesterday following a report made by City Attorney La Roche that the company was not liable for cost of repair of the structure proper. As a result the company will pay \$1768.89 for the share of redecking and the city will be required to pay the company \$1645.98 for the changes made in the tracks.

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
