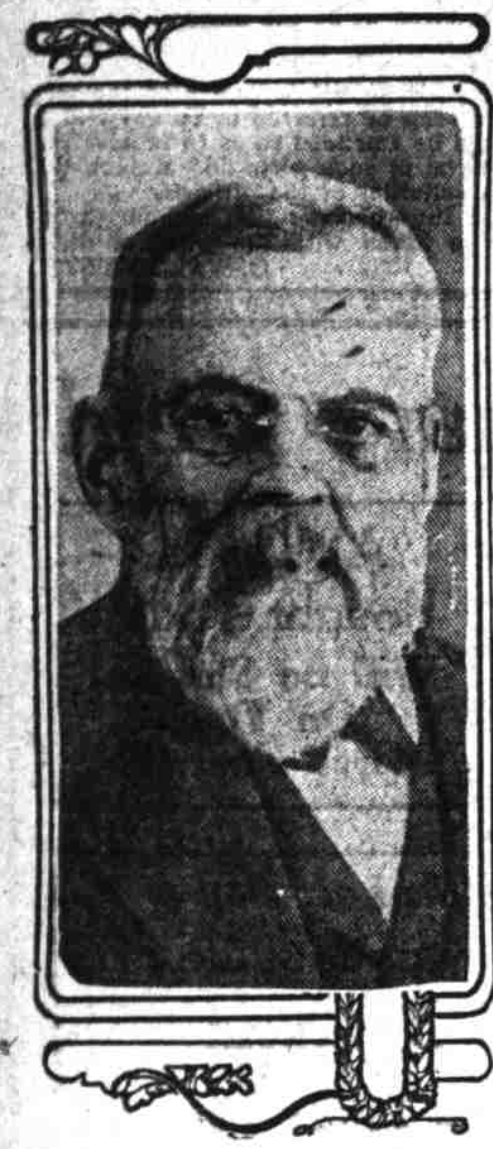


PROF. J. W. MARSH WAS EDUCATOR AND CHARACTER OF NOTE

Was Descended From Line of
Students; Father President
of University of Vermont.

BUILT UP PACIFIC "U"

took Particular Interest in Library
and Has Wide Personal Knowl-
edge of Books.

(Special to The Journal.)—Professor Joseph Walker Marsh, who died at his home in this city yesterday, was one of the most widely known educators on the Pacific coast, and his learning and scholarship was a source of pride to his friends throughout the state.

Professor Marsh came from a line of scholars and educators, and he had a keen intellect, broad mind and great capacity for work. He was born at Burlington, Vt., in 1836, and graduated from the University of Vermont in 1857, his father being president of that university at the time.

After his graduation Professor Marsh taught for 10 years in Canada and Wisconsin, and in 1867 he came to Forest Grove to accept the chair of Latin and Greek. When he first went to Pacific the school was in its infancy, and it was largely through his efforts that the institution came to have a steady and sure growth toward the position which it now occupies among the higher institutions of learning in the west.

Became the Librarian.

Professor Marsh, as a labor of love, took up the duties of librarian of Pacific university, and it may truth-

fully be said that it was through his efforts that the school now has one of the finest collections of books on the coast. Of the thousands of volumes he was personally familiar with every one, and whenever a student would request a certain book for reference, Professor Marsh would unhesitatingly go to a shelf and take down the book. He was the author of a grammar which is used as a text book in a number of the schools of the country. Marsh Hall, the main building of the university, was named in honor of Professor Marsh.

Professor Marsh will always be remembered for his splendid Christian character. Never hesitating in his duty, never shirking a task, he came to be recognized as a man of great personal power and activity. As a teacher he inspired his students to their best efforts; as their friend at all times he helped and stimulated them to a higher plane of living and thinking, and as a brother of all mankind he came to be greatly beloved. He was known as the "Grand Old Man" of Forest Grove.

Solicitor for Students.
He was ever solicitous that his students should attain the highest degree of moral and spiritual development, and many men and women who were students upon seeing the large collection of books housed in the handsome library building which was erected on the campus last year. He was Professor Emeritus of Latin at the university at the time of his death.

Surviving Professor Marsh are his widow, and the following children: William Marsh and Dr. Fred Marsh, of Woodburn; David Marsh, of Forest Grove, and Mrs. Gertrude Hall, of Clatskanie.

Woman Says She Saw Mrs. Dickey

Police Receive Anonymous Telephone
Message Regarding Missing Woman;

"They have been keeping me at a sanitarium," Mrs. Dickey said, according to the woman, "but I got away, and came up here to get the air. I think it is better for me than to be shut up."

The woman said that she did not know Mrs. Dickey personally, but that she "knew her when she saw her."

MAX ALBERT SENTENCED

Max Albert today was sentenced to 12 months imprisonment in the county jail by Judge Wolverton of the United States district court on a charge of concealing assets in bankruptcy. Albert pleaded guilty. The case hinged on a fire last year in a store at 207 Front street owned by L. and Sam Sax. The Saxes are also under indictment for the offense to which Albert today pleaded guilty, and in addition are charged with perjury before the referee in bankruptcy. Their trial was set for March 22. Albert began sentence this afternoon.

VERBAL AVELINS ARE USED BY EVANGELIST AGAINST BACKSLIDER

Skeptical, Doubter and Man
With False Ideas Flayed
by Dr. Bulglin.

LEAVE SAVING TO JESUS

Services Tonight for High School Students, Who Are Invited to Come and Bring Tells.

Addressing his remarks principally to backsliders in Christianity, Evangelist E. J. Bulglin flayed the skeptic, the doubter and the man with false ideas about holiness in his talk on "The Dual Nature" at the Belmont street tabernacle last night.

"The way to be saved is to believe Jesus and let Jesus do the saving, and the way to keep saved is to believe and let Jesus do the keeping," said Bulglin. "Jesus says: 'Let a man be born of the water and blood he cannot enter the kingdom of heaven.' He lays down obedience there, and the reason many people don't get to heaven is because they won't obey."

"There are men and women today who are discouraged souls, befogged in their Christian lives, who say they can't possibly live the Christian life. They say that under present conditions and environments they can't live up to the standard and therefore won't try. These people are backsliders."

Christian Life Demanded.
"God says you can hold out. If you say, 'I can't' then you make God out to be a liar. God demands the Christian life of everyone on the penalty of death. Christianity is no play game; it takes the best stuff in a man or woman; it takes courage."

"But you can live it. I thank God I am fighting on the side of a captain who is sure to win and you fellows on the side of the devil are going to lose."

"None is infallible save Jesus, and all err, and so I want to address the cold old skeptic who sits back and criticizes and picks out sins in poor Christians. This skeptic is a thief. Such a man doesn't belong in this country. This is God's country; this is Christian civilization. Every dirty scoundrel who stays in Christian America and lives off the fruit of God's truth is a thief."

"And the fellow who has false notions about holiness is like a man with a chip on his shoulder, daring someone else to knock it off. I believe in sanctification but not crankification. The best people we find in our travels are those who live holy lives and say nothing about it. I believe in lots of religion with a well balanced intellect."

Old Devil Always Fighting.
"The man who is saved and doubts his own sanctification certainly ought to know it, for he is not doing much work for God unless he is happy in salvation and he is not happy unless he is saved."

"But there is a vast difference between sin and sins. God never did promise to forgive sin, but sins. He forgives sins. But God could not forgive that which is anarchy against his soul."

"It is preposterous to say you can't live without sin. You will have to fight, of course. You will never get to a point where you won't have to fight the old devil. If you do, look out. It is a fight, it is a battle, and God pity you if you haven't got the stuff in you to get in and fight when you know your captain has already won the battle."

"It takes more grit to be a Christian 365 days of the year and do the things God assigns you to do than to fight the battles of Napoleon. If God Almighty is able to do a perfect work he is able to save to the uttermost, and those who are sinners had better take God's dose whether they like it or not."

Christ Alone Can Save.

"To quit sin one must get up and say he will be saved, for God states that the world doesn't know anything about the feeling in your heart until you get up and say so. Faith won't save anybody; Christ alone can save."

The evangelist gave a graphic description of soul cleansing, saying: "I can see old Nicodemus standing by Jesus' side with his long beard blown away to one side with the wind, Jesus said, 'The wind bloweth where it listeth.' Yes. How do we know? Because of the effect it produces. All right, Bud, when God lets the wind blow through you and take the sin away you will know that something has happened to you also by the effect it produces."

On the unanimous rising vote of those at last night's meeting Bulglin will repeat his sermon on "Hell" Tuesday evening. Tonight he will discourse on "What I Must Do to Be Saved," or "The Way Made Plain." All high school pupils in the city are invited to attend and bring their school yells and pennants.

Phone Inventor Recalls Incidents

Thomas A. Watson, Associate of Alexander Graham Bell, Tells of Times of Long Ago.

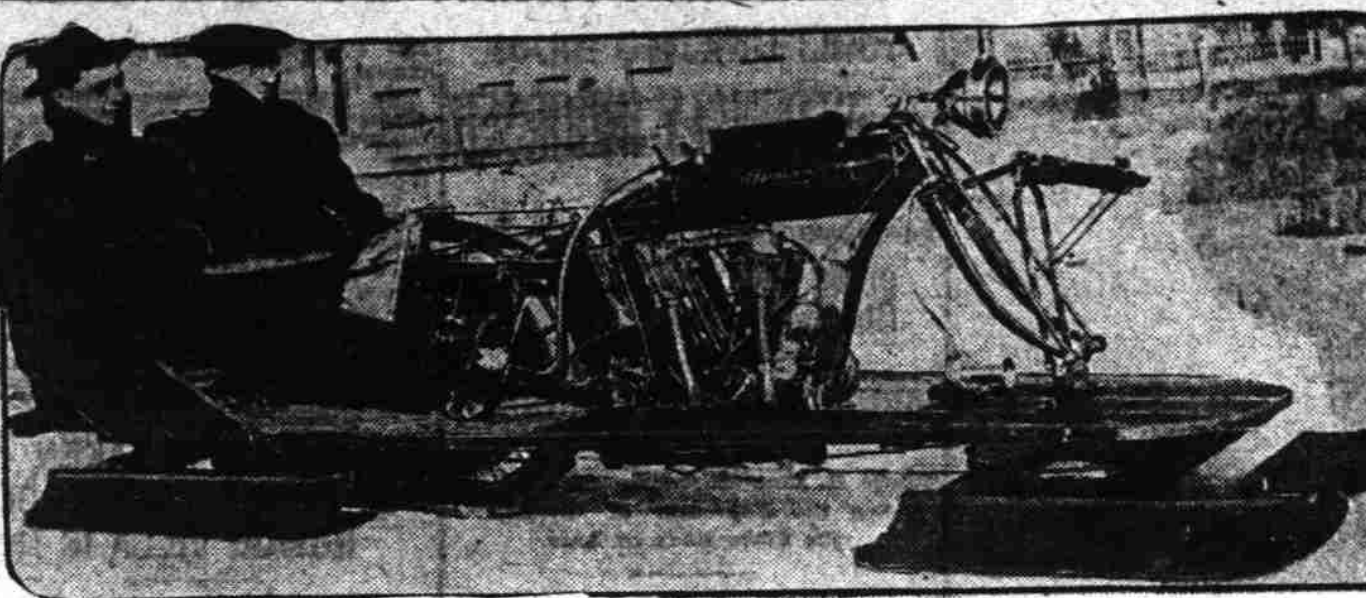
Thomas A. Watson, of Boston, associate of Alexander Graham Bell, inventor of the telephone, told an audience of 800 at the Baker theatre last night the trials and tribulations of getting the first "phone to transmit the human voice. Mr. Watson spoke under the auspices of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company.

Mr. Watson stated that Professor Bell was experimenting to perfect a "harmonic" telegraph that would carry six messages over the wire at the same time.

"I picked a spring at the end of a 60 foot wire on June 3, 1876," said Mr. Watson, "when Mr. Bell came running into the room and demanded what I had done. I told him, and that is how he learned to telephone. It was due to a condition of currents."

"I completed a telephone that night. The financial end of telephoning in those days was in lecturing and demonstrating," said Mr. Watson. "We borrowed telegraph lines for our experiments. Henry W. Longfellow and Oliver Wendell Holmes were among the first persons to request Mr. Bell to lecture about his invention. I was at the other end of the wire, perhaps 40 feet away, and had to sing and talk. The audience would hear my melodious voice, and applauded vigorously, and I

BUSINESS MEN'S CLUB FAVORS STATE LEVY OF TAX FOR IRRIGATION

Legislature Is Urged to Make
an Appropriation of \$450,-
000 to Get U. S. Aid.

SECRETARY LANE LETTER

Head of Department of Interior Admits
Oregon Has Not Been Treated
Fairly in the Matter.

The Progressive Business Men's club took positive stand yesterday in favor of the millage tax for irrigation and by unanimous vote at its meeting in the Multnomah hotel adopted a resolution urging the legislature to appropriate \$450,000 that an equal amount set aside by the secretary of the interior may be available.

Before the vote was taken a letter from Secretary of the Interior Lane was read, asserting that the opportunity to secure the government's \$450,000 will expire with this fiscal year, or June 30, when special action by congress will be necessary to get government money for irrigation.

"Oregon has not been treated fairly in the distribution of reclamation funds, in my judgment. I have tried to remedy this by the extension of the Umatilla project, and by doing the only other thing asked me by Oregon, the setting aside of \$450,000 for cooperative work," wrote Secretary Lane. "This is still available, but congress alone has power to embark upon any new and independent enter-

prise, and the power to cooperate this I now have will expire with this fiscal year."

The resolution was prepared after investigation by a committee of the club consisting of R. W. Nesbet, W. S. Asher and S. C. Rasmussen.

The "appropriation by the state of Oregon would be in fact a loan to be returned to the state with interest," reads an expression contained in the resolution.

"Such reclamation work will afford labor to unemployed homes for the homesteaders, will greatly increase the taxable property of the state and add to the producing population. The Progressive Business Men's club of Portland indorses and urgently recommends the appropriation by the present legislature of the sum of \$450,000 to be used in cooperation with the federal government in reclamation work in central Oregon, the selection of the project upon which such reclamation work shall be undertaken to be left to the decision of the desert land board of Oregon and the federal authorities."

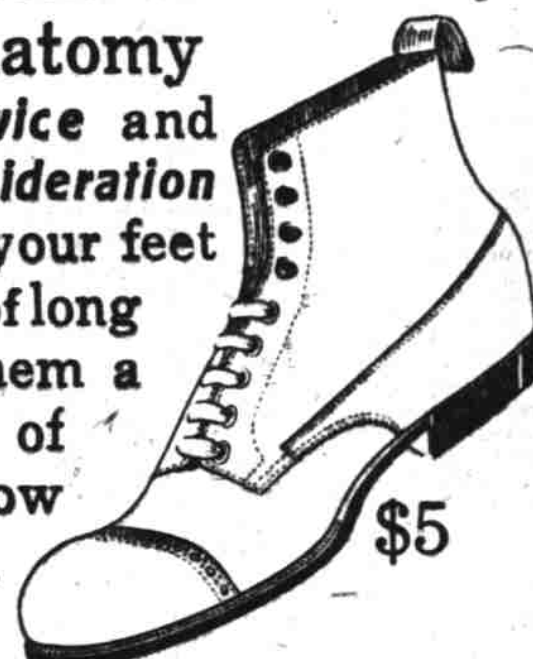
John H. Dundore was inaugurated president of the club yesterday. Other newly elected officers had seats of honor.

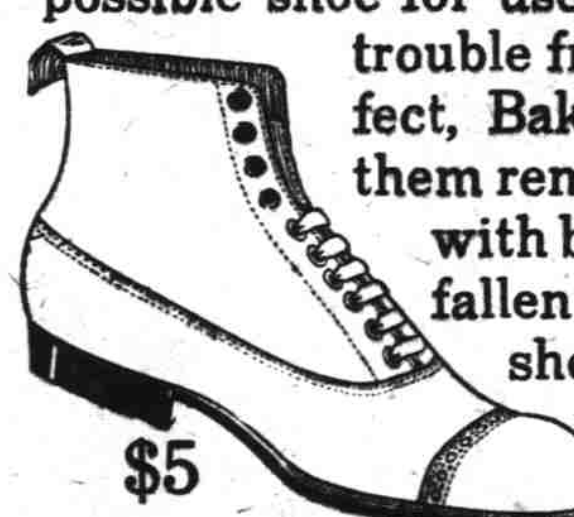
