Unemployment to Be League Topic. Review of Situation Will Be Given by People Prominent in Sociological Work in Portland.

The program at the Oregon Civic league meeting in the Multnomah hotel tomorrow noon will include a review of the unemployment situation. J. C. English, chairman of the Citizens' Employment committee, will preside. Among the speakers will be C. W. Helme, the laundry manager, who proposed that each local business firm add 10 per cent to the remuneration of its employees; Mrs. Millie R. Trumbull, of the child labor commission; Rev. E. V. O'Hara, chairman of the industrial welfare commission; Professor W. F. Ogburn of Reed college; Isaac Sweet, secretary of the league. Members of the legislature have been invited to attend the meeting and listen to a discussion of the bill creating state employment agencies.

The problem of employment is the gravest one Oregon is called upon to face at this time, reads the announcement. "The meeting this week will be to discuss our responsibility in regard to this problem and arouse support for establishing state labor exchanges, and another bill for the regulation of private agencies. Land Rental Bureau Now Is Established

State Immigration Commission Undertakes Plan and No Fees Are Charged.

A rental bureau has been established by the state immigration commission for the benefit of those who wish to rent land in Oregon. Many inquiries are received from farmers in the east and middle west, who wish to come to Oregon, but who do not wish to buy land until they have lived in the state and become acquainted with its conditions. The bureau would like to secure a list of lands for rent as soon as possible.

"No fees or commissions will be charged," said J. W. Brewer, manager of the farm land bureau of the commission this morning, "and in all cases the fitness and reliability of applicants will be carefully investigated."
