It shows George Stallings, manager of the Boston Braves, world's champions, out hunting on his farm, "The Meadows," Haddocks, Ga.



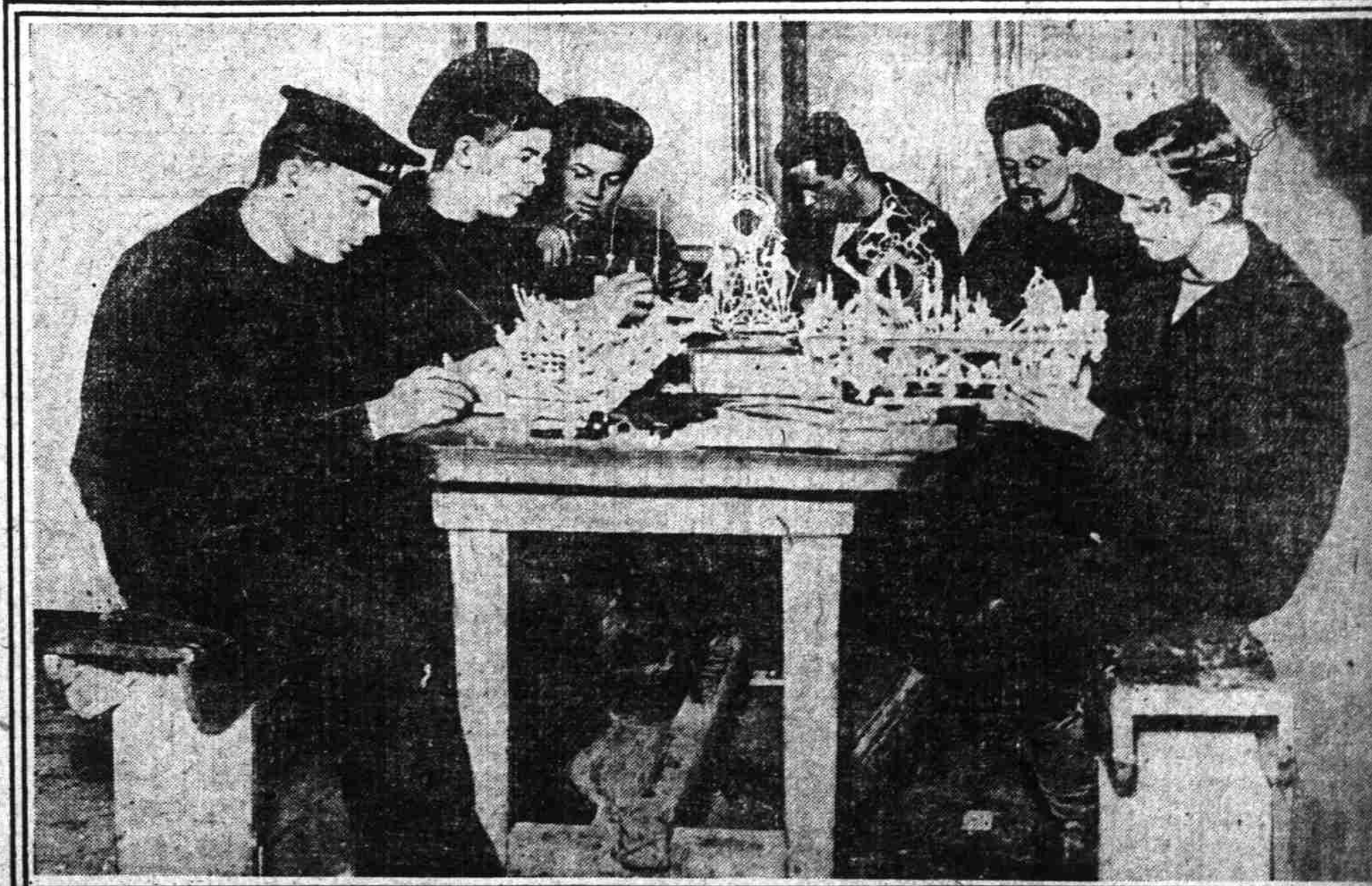
AMERICAN MILITARY HOSPITAL IN PARIS
