### **ASTORIA HIGH SCHOOL** CHAMPION OF STATE LEAGUE OF DEBATERS

Both Gresham Teams Lose in Debate on Government Ownership of Railroads.

Gresham, Or., Feb. 13.-Astoria High school won the championship of the Columbia river district of the State High School Debating league last night by defeating Gresham High school. Miss Marguerite Volbrecht and Miss Mabel Ehipley, Gresham's affirmative team, lost at Gresham to Coach P. T. Kadinger's Astoria negative team, Miss Ruth Spande and Sverre Halsan, by the unanimous vote of the three judges. At Astoria, Gresham's negative team, Frank Rodgers and Miss Ellen De Haven, coached by Miss Eva Struggles, lost to Astoria's affirmative team, Miss Eva Bower and William Sigerdsund, by the votes of two judges to one. The question was: "Resolved, That

the federal government should own operate all interstate railroads acting as common carriers (including intrastate lines competing with them). constitutionality waived." Gresham had won preliminary debates with Tillamook and James John Hogh schools, and Astoria had won preliminary debates from Scappoose High. Miss Shipley, for the affirmative, opened the debate at Gresham, declar-

ing that private railroad ownership has resulted in serious abuses, such as excessive charges, confining developnent to paying routes, private control of the country's prosperity and discrimination between places and individuals. The speaker also brought out the

point that present conditions warn us that some radical change is necessary. and, since the interstate commerce commission in 27 years has not achieved adequate regulation, the only remaining plan is ownership by the government, which has the people's welfare, not money, at stake.

Mr. Halsan, opening for the nega-tive, declared that, while strict regulation was desirable, government ownership would be an unwarranted in fringement upon private capital in vested in railroads, forcing it to seek other channels, thus causing an industrial revolution; would unfairly real profits of industry developed by private capital, and would demoralize oth r enterprises.

The speaker also maintained that All Day Session Session Speaker also maintained that government ownership is unnecessary, as present facilities are adequate, and would be inexpedient, as so vast an undertaking by the second undertaking by the government would result in extravagance and inefficiency Miss Volbrecht, second affirmative

speaker, argued that government ownership is a complete success in Prussia, Switzerland and other European countries with governments similar to ours, and that no nation ever returned to private ownership. She further demonstrated that it is practical as the

Miss Spande, second negative speakdeclared government ownership would be a positive detriment economically, contrasting the loss of government owned railroads in France with the greatest commercial nation, Great Britain, which has private ownership. and stated that the efficiency of privately owned railroads in the United States is unparalleled by those of other nations.
