Gresham, Or., Feb. 13.—Astoria High school won the championship of the Columbia river district of the State High School Debating League last night by defeating Gresham High school. Miss Marguerite Volbrecht and Miss Mabel Shipley, Gresham's affirmative team, lost at Gresham to Coach H. B. Kadane's negative team, Miss Ruth Spande and Sverre Halsan, by the unanimous vote of the three judges. At Astoria, a similar negative team, Frank Rodgers and Miss Ellen De Haven, coached by Miss Eva Struggles, lost to Astoria's affirmative team, Miss Eva Bower and William Sigurdson, by the vote of two to one.

RATES ON LUMBER TO CALIFORNIA POINTS FROM OREGON LOWER

I. C. C. Gives Points Between Willamette Valley and San Francisco 17 1-2 Ct. Rate. (Washington Bureau of the Journal.) Washington, Feb. 12.—Application of the Southern Pacific for relief from the long and short haul clause of the interstate commerce law on shipments of rough lumber from Oregon points to San Francisco has been denied by the Interstate Commerce commission.

Anti-Trespass Bill Dies Sudden Death

Measure Intended to Further Protect Railroad Rights of Way Occasional Remonstrance From Many Sides. Salem, Or., Feb. 12.—By an almost unanimous vote this morning the house voted down the so called anti-trespass bill, H. B. 448, which forbids the use of railroad tracks or right of way for persons not authorized to go upon them. Even Mr. Wentworth, who introduced the measure, was constrained to vote against it, and when the vote was cast, Dr. A. C. Smith and Vernon A. Forbes were the only ones favoring the bill.
