Local Man Has Had Great Success in Coaching Various Sports at Lincoln High School.

Walla Walla, Wash., Feb. 27 .- Vincent Borleske, athletic coach of the Lincoln high school, of Portland, Or., and former athletic director of the Broadway high, of Seattle, will succeed Archie Hahn as physical director and athletic coach of the Whitman cellege, according to reports from authentic sources. The report that Hann was to lose his place with the Missionaries was a complete surprise to the foilowers of athletics of the Whitman college. Borleske, it is said, will take up his new duties beginning with the fall term.

The report from Walla Walla to the effect that Archie Hahn was to be let out as director of athletics of Whitman college and that Vincent Borleske, of the Lincoln high school, was to succeed him, took the local sporting world by surprise. It was thought here that Hahn's work with Whitman has been highly satisfactory.

In securing Borleske, who attended Whitman college in 1908 and 1909, the Missionaries have a capable coach During the time he has been wach of the Lincoln high school, Borieske has turned out teams that have been con tenders for the title in baseball, basketball and football. He has also assisted in handling the track and field team and it is expected that he would meet with the same measure of success in the college athletic world. Borleske is regarded as one of the greatest halfbacks that ever played in the northwest conference. In 1998 and
