Oregon City, Or., March 1.—Estacada was put water for its citizens and it is probable it will be able to get water from Oregon City, providing the bond issue to finance the South Fork water project carries at the special election Wednesday.

There are 70 water consumers in Estacada and the annual income of the local town, including the water, is about \$1000. This income, doubtless, is increased should better thinking water be obtained for the city.

Members of the Pure Mountain Water league of Oregon City, the special water commission and bankers and business men of this city have carefully estimated the cost of building the proposed pipe line, and their judgment has been accepted as good.
