Chinese Sailors Discharge Cargo-Longshoremen Refuse Because the Craft Touched at Vancouver.

Police Guard Vessel. Seattle, Wash., March 13 .-Under guard of a detail of poice, dock employes this morning began discharging the liner Glengyle. The vessel's Chinese crew worked cargo aboard the steamer from one hatch. The Glengyle has 1000 tons of cargo for Seattle and 2000 tons Portland.

B. C., where a strike is in progress, the British steamer Glengyle, one of the big carriers of the Royal Mail Steam Packet fleet, has been declared unfair by the longshoremen of the Pacific coast. She has 2000 tons of cargo for this port and space for 2000 tons of export freight has been reserved here for her, but unless she is promised quick and uninterrupted dispatch by the local longshoremen, will not come here.

The disposition of the big steamer is at present entirely up to the longshoremen. J. A. Madsen, secretary and treasurer of the Industrial Longshoremen's association, and the head of the Portland union, together with John business agent for No. 6, the union which handles all offshore vessels, has wired his superiors, asking for information; but up till noon this had not been forthcoming. The McCabe company, stevedores for the Royal Mail line, have asked that they be allowed to work the craft, but have so far been given no encouragement.

The Vancouver strike was brought on by the decision of the operators of the Canadian Pacific coastwise dock No. 1 and the Union Steamship company's dock to pay only the usual union wages for truckers, according to advices received here from Vancouver. These companies had been paying straight longshore time of 45 cents an hour on merchandise, and 55 cents an hour overtime to their truckers. Trucking and longshoreing are handled separately on other docks in the British Columbia port, the truckers having s union of their own and a scale of 30 cents for straight and 35 cents an hour for overtime. Owing to the drain on their finances caused by the European war, these companies in their retrenchment decided to return to the Sun lower scale, it is said.


