Six men had been killed, and many wounded in earlier fighting between the Indians and members of the posse, headed by United States Marshal Nebeker.

31 WARSHIPS ARE PRICE OF 3 BARRAGES

AEROPLANE SCOUTS OF ALLIES REPORT DAMAGE

(United Press Leased Wire.) London, March 20.—Thirty Turkish forts Kilid Bahr, Namazieh and Chanak, guarding the Dardanelles narrows, were practically dismantled during the terrific bombardment of Thursday, according to dispatches from Athens tonight.
