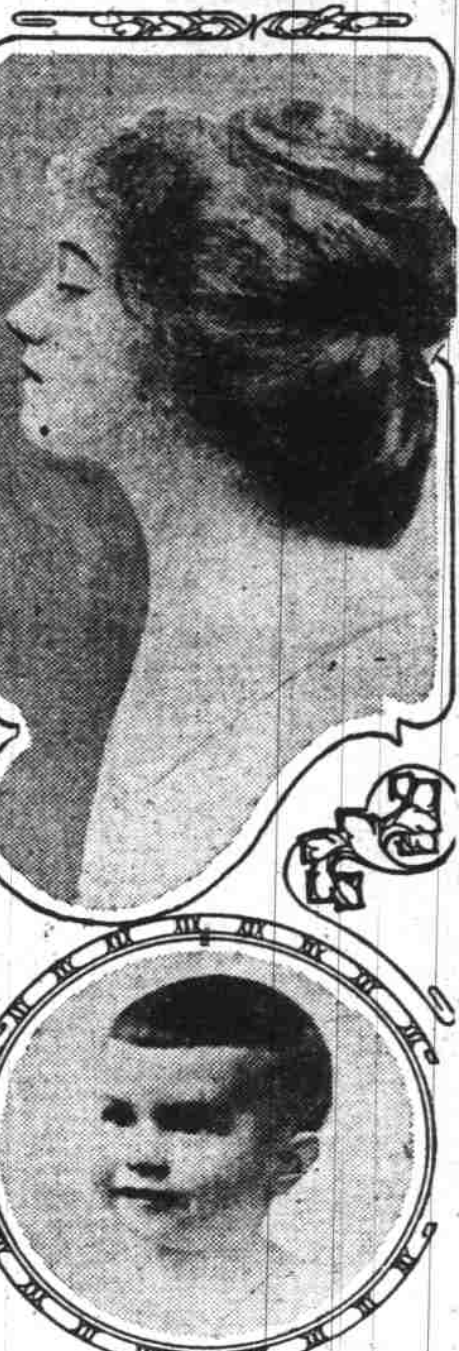


# SOCIAL EVENTS OF THE WEEK
