

VICE PRESIDENT AND PARTY MOVE ON TO FAIR AT SAN DIEGO

Mr. Marshall Pleased With Reception; Chinese Girl Appeals to Mrs. Marshall.

WILL ARRIVE ON SUNDAY

On Tuesday Party Will Continue to Los Angeles Where Its Members Will Remain Until Thursday.

San Francisco, Cal., March 27.—With a hearty word of thanks for San Francisco's big-hearted and lavish hospitality, and with his mission completed with the official dedication of the Panama-Pacific International exposition, Vice-President Thomas R. Marshall left this city today on the first leg of his return journey to Washington.

Motoring down to Saratoga, the country home of Senator James D. Phelan, with Mrs. Marshall, William Phillips, third assistant secretary of state, and Mrs. Phillips and Assistant Secretary of the Navy Franklin Roosevelt and Mrs. Roosevelt, the vice-president and his party traveled through the grandeur of the spring garb in which the country they passed through has clothed itself. The Phillips, after a brief visit, continued on to Del Monte, where they will spend two days.

Board Train for San Diego.
This afternoon Vice-President and Mrs. Marshall and Secretary and Mrs. Roosevelt boarded a train for San Diego. They will arrive there tomorrow afternoon.

On Monday the vice-president will speak at the Panama-California exposition. The distinguished visitors will remain in San Diego until Tuesday, when they will leave for Los Angeles. They will remain there until Thursday morning.

Then they will take their departure from the Golden state, and on the way east Vice-President and Mrs. Marshall will stop at Phoenix, Arizona, where Mrs. Marshall's family reside. They expect to remain a month in Phoenix.

The brilliant series of state and private entertainments for the distinguished party came to a close last night with dinner and reception in the California building at the exposition, tendered by Baron Uru, vice-president of the Japanese commission to the world's fair. Exposition directors and leading citizens were the guests of honor.

Appeal Touches Mrs. Marshall.
A pretty 15-year-old Chinese girl, born and educated in San Francisco, stood before Mrs. Thomas R. Marshall, wife of the vice-president, shortly before her departure today, and made a touching appeal in behalf of her people.

She gave to the First Lady of the land a forcible letter from her own pen, pleading for assistance in upholding the honor of the Chinese people and winning for them the respect which their progress has demanded.

"I am only a little Chinese girl but I come to ask you to help my people," said pretty little Ah Ying Low, as she stood with bowed head before Mrs. Marshall. Then she handed to the vice-president's wife her written appeal, telling of the achievements of the Chinese and pleading their cause. Mrs. Marshall, visibly touched by the child's stirring plea, accepted the letter graciously.

Ah Ying Low is the god-child of Mrs. Sun Yue Clemens Wong, sister of Mrs. Howard Gould, who has won distinction by her educational and missionary work among the local Chinese. The girl has taken a deep interest in Mrs. Sun's activities, assisting her in many ways.

Nevada Building Dedicated April 1

Two Delegations, Headed by Governor Boyle, Will Meet in San Diego, Form in Parade to Fair Grounds.
San Diego, March 27.—Governor Emmett D. Boyle will head the official delegation from the state of Nevada coming to San Diego April 1 for the dedication of the big building which that commonwealth has erected on the Alameda, the winding highway which passes between the citrus orchard and the model intensive farm on the exposition grounds.

The officials will form a small but important part of the double trainload from the north. One train is covering the northern section of the state and the other the southern. They are so timed as to arrive at the new San Diego station within a half hour of each other so that the parade to the grounds can include both detachments.

Local arrangements are in the hands of the Nevada building managers and the Nevada state society of San Diego. Immediately after the ceremony it is planned to have Governor Boyle escorted by the Spanish band and the Balboa guards around all the other state buildings as well as the buildings erected by the valleys of California, each of whose building managers will assist in the reception at the Nevada structure.

Nevada's representation is, next to California's, the largest on the grounds. It does not stand on La Via de los Estados where most of the state colony lies, but in the section devoted primarily to showing western agricultural opportunities in which that state is vitally interested. Dedication was delayed until the state's chief representatives could arrange to be present. The same policy is being followed by the state of Kansas, which since the opening of January, has added a tower and a bower place to the pavilion on the lower plateau.

Methodist Pastors In Annual Meeting

Methodist preachers of Portland will meet at 10:30 o'clock tomorrow morning in Rose City Park Methodist church, Sandy boulevard and East Fifty-eighth street. It will be the annual session of the Portland Methodist preachers' meeting. The preachers will be accompanied by their wives and at noon the women of the Rose City Park church will serve dinner. It is expected that 75 or 80 persons will be present. The four district superintendents will give a "Survey of the Conference." Officers for the following year will be elected. The dinner is to be given in celebration of the birthday of Father and Mrs. Ellen and Mother Doane.

NOTED LECTURER IS EXPONENT OF WIDER FEMINIST MOVEMENT

Mrs. Charlotte Perkins Gilman Young in Thought and Spirit; Attracts Interest.

PHILOSOPHY IS DYNAMIC

"Social Body for Soul of God" Achievement Great Woman Urges People to Strive for.

Young in thought and spirit; with life in every line of the eager restless figure; slender, dark, alert; straight as a pine tree; a rarely beautiful head that, with its crown of darkest hair, would attract at any point an instant interest; manifest conviction that while the erratic might happen, unselfish zeal for the right and unceasing battle with wrong are overmastering facts of her life—such is Mrs. Charlotte Perkins Gilman, writer and lecturer of international note in the field of social progress and reform in 1890, who arrived in Portland yesterday to lecture under the auspices of the Civic league.

Mrs. Gilman was met at the train by her old friend Mrs. A. W. Nicholson, Miss Virginia Arnold and Adolph Dekum. During her stay in Portland Mrs. Gilman is the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Dekum. After meeting the newspaper people and graciously posing for photographs she was hurried off to the Civic league luncheon at the Multnomah hotel, where she spoke for a few moments.

Of Older New England Type.
In appearance Mrs. Gilman represents the older New England type with hair drawn back smoothly and wearing a plain gown of soft black silk with prim cuffs and collar of delicate lace. Then, too, she is the owner of what New Englanders know as "faculty." The work of her hands is faultless. She can cook to a turn. She can design and fit and sew. She can even, if demand arise, "clean house," and is as fertile in resources in an emergency as the mother in Swiss Family Robinson. She has keen artistic sense and draws and colors with marked ability. As story teller, in private theatricals, in her dealing with children, her delightful humor and quick sympathy are always uppermost. She is a good comrade for young and for old, for all sorts and conditions of men.

Modern and Advanced.
Mrs. Gilman is as modern and advanced in her philosophy as she is prim and old fashioned in her appearance. For nearly 25 years this latest representative of the Beecher family has journeyed through the United States and in Europe from San Francisco to Budapest, speaking from church pulpits and lecture platforms for woman suffrage and broader feminist movement, heroically form-

ing an unpopular philosophy and protesting it with the illumination of genius. Perhaps no other woman can communicate with such force and such thrill the aspirations for social righteousness. Her philosophy is dynamic;

it is essentially one of hope, courage and joy and it is for America today. We must forget, she tells us, Greek and Roman civilization; study our present day life in the light of evolutionary science; achieve full consciousness and proceed to build that

which has never been constructed before—"a social body for the soul of God."

The mother instinct throughout nature is one of devotion, of love and service, care and defense, with no self interest," declares Mrs. Gilman. "The animal father in such cases as he is of service to the young, assists the mother in her work in similar fashion, but the human father makes of his position as the head of the family, an instrument of desire and combat and self expression following the essential masculine impulses."

"In his dominance over service women and helpless children free reign was given to the growth of pride and the exercise of irresponsible tyranny. To these feelings developed without check for thousands of years and to the mental habits resultant it is easy to trace much of the bias of our early ethical concepts."

Noble Fatherhood Requisite.

"Masculine ethics colored by masculine instincts, always dominated by sex, has at once recognized the value of chastity in women, which is right; punished its absence unfairly, which is wrong; and then reversed the whole matter when applied to men, which is ridiculous. Chastity is a virtue because it has been proven necessary for human welfare; not because men happen to prize it in women and ignore it themselves. The underlying reason is the benefit of the child; and to that end a pure and noble fatherhood is requisite as well as such a motherhood."

WAR HAS ENDED OLD SUBSERVIENCE OF WOMEN, IS BELIEF

"The new world that's half women is not going to be half war."

Thus Charlotte Perkins Gilman, speaking at the Y. M. C. A. auditorium last night, summed up her ideas of the relation of women to the present war. She named sex desire and love of combat as the dominant male instincts, and love and service as distinctive feminine qualities.

The world has not felt the effect of woman's influence as it has that of man because of the economic submergence of woman, she argued.

But with the entrance of woman into industry and the professions, with their finding that they are not dependent on men, she predicted the dawning of a new day for civilization, "when the qualities of women are going to count in the world as the qualities of men have counted."

"The women of Europe," Mrs. Gilman said, having found that they can do men's work because of their having been compelled to do it during the war, will not willingly return to their old subservient position when the war is over.

Three things the speaker said she could see as results of the war: First, it will greatly advance the labor movement by teaching the workers the necessity for organization, and because labor will be so scarce when the war ends that the demand for workers will exceed the supply; second, the feminist movement will be advanced by women's discovery of their economic independence; third, the war is forcing by 100 years the movement toward a world federation.
