

MARY ANTIN GIVES VIEWS ON PROBLEMS NOW FACING WORLD

Slender Little Woman Says She Will Gladly Answer Questions.

IMMIGRATION IS SUBJECT

International Figure in Field of Social Reform Lectures Next Wednesday Evening.

All the way from Portland, Maine, Mary Antin has come, bearing a message from the immigrant—a message burning with the fire born of her own experience. Twenty years ago she came to this country, a child of 13, with no word of English and no experience of life outside the Jewish pale. Today she is an international figure in the world of social reform.

Miss Antin spent a few hours in Portland yesterday on her way to Tacoma, where she will lecture tonight. She was met by a few members of the Mary Antin committee, of which Mrs. Julius L. Louissou is chairman. Miss Antin is a slender little woman, with a smooth olive skin and great dark, luminous eyes reflecting a questioning interest in everything that is real and vital. Simplicity is the keynote of her appearance and of her attitude in many things.

"We have been hearing that your book, 'They Who Knock at Our Gates,' influenced President Wilson to veto the immigration bill."

"Oh, how happy I should be if it did, but President Wilson would not sign that bill or any other without a personal conviction that he was doing the right thing."

Miss Antin displayed an interest in Portland's own little "melting pot." "I shall be more than glad to have the Portland people ask me questions." "To Miss Antin the United States is the fulfillment of a dream, because the conditions she left behind in a Russian village.

"It is because I understand my history. In its larger outlines, to be typical of many, that I consider it worth while traveling across the continent to carry my message. My life is a concrete illustration of a multitude of statistical facts. It is illustrative of scores of obscure lives. I am only one of many whose fate it has been to live a page of modern history. I began life in the middle ages, and here I am still your contemporary in the twentieth century. We love to read the lives of the great, yet what a broken history of mankind they give unless supplemented by the lives of the humble. But, while the great seek for themselves, or by the tongues of their admirers, the humble are apt to live humble and inarticulate, and die unheard. It is well now and then that one is born among the simple with a taste for self revelation. The person thus endowed will speak, though there are only the grasses in the field to hear and none but the wind to carry the tale."

Tickets for Miss Antin's lecture are on sale at the Bore Theatre. The lecture will be given Wednesday evening at the White Temple.

WELL KNOWN JURIST PASSES AWAY AFTER A LINGERING ILLNESS

Judge Thomas O'Day, Prominent Democrat, Came to Portland 26 Years Ago.

Judge Thomas O'Day, 63 years old, a well-known Democratic leader and prominent member of the Oregon bar, died at his home, 5 St. Helens Court, early yesterday morning. He had been ill several months. Present at the time were his wife, Mrs. Agnes O'Day, Miss Mary Reber of Seattle, and his nurse.

Judge O'Day had been a resident of Portland since 1889. He had a wide circle of acquaintances throughout the state. He was regarded highly as a jurist. In 1907 he was appointed by Governor Chamberlain to the circuit bench to fill an unexpired term of two years.

For several years he was associated with L. H. Tarpley in the practice of law. The firm was dissolved a few years ago and he had been practicing alone since. His ability as a trial lawyer always won him recognition. Judge O'Day took an active part in Democratic politics and was an ardent supporter of William J. Bryan in the campaign of 1896. He was a member of the Episcopal church for years. He was born July 4, 1852, in Connecticut and was later educated in the public schools of Illinois, having gone to that state with his parents when a child. He graduated from the law course of the University of Iowa in June, 1877.

His law career began at Bedford, Iowa, but in 1879 he moved to Neligh, Neb., and practiced there for 10 years. In 1882 he married Miss Agnes Earl, and in 1887 was nominated on the Democratic ticket for justice of the supreme court of Illinois.

His widow and a half-brother T. J. O'Day, publisher of the Malden Register at Malden, Mass., survive him.

Funeral arrangements are in the hands of W. W. Cotton, counsel for the O-W. R. N. and friend of Judge O'Day's for 25 years.

The funeral will be held Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Trinity Episcopal church.

J. P. Boethe, president of the Multnomah Bar association, conferred with Judge Henry E. McGinnis, presiding judge, this morning, and a committee of bar association members, consisting of W. W. Cotton, Martin L. Pipes, Samuel White, James B. Kerr, C. W. Fulton and D. Solis Cohen, was appointed to prepare proper resolutions.

MARRIED TEACHER'S MANDAMUS AGAINST BOARD BEING TRIED

To Decide Whether Wedding Bells Ring Instructor Out of Her Situation.

QUESTION IS DEBATED

Directors Claim Have Power While Dismissed Woman Declares Tenure-in-Office Law Prevails.

Since the tenure-in-office law for Portland teachers went into effect, can the school board dismiss a teacher for getting married?

This is the question to be settled in Judge Morrow's court this afternoon in the mandamus proceedings brought by Mrs. Orin R. Richards, nee Maud L. Marsh, against the school board.

The direct question involved is whether a certain provision in a woman teacher's contract is valid. The question which many women are discussing is whether the act of getting married should disbar a teacher from the Portland schools.

Contracts signed by women teachers in Portland say: "By a special resolution of the board, all women teachers who are married shall be dismissed from the district, thereby terminating their services with the district."

Miss Marsh had been teaching in the Portland schools for four or five years. In January Miss Marsh became Mrs. Orin R. Richards and she received notice that her services with the schools automatically terminated.

The discovery of paint on a chain Saturday and the fact that air bubbles and oil came to the surface was responsible for the confidence of the officers at that time that it was the F-4 at which the California was tugging throughout two days and two nights.

"Terrible," Says Roosevelt.

(United Press Special Wire.) San Diego, Cal., March 29.—When asked here today about the ill-fated submarine, F-4, sunk in Honolulu Bay, Franklin D. Roosevelt, assistant secretary of the navy, here with Vice President Marshall's party, said:

"It is terrible. It is just terrible! But we must remember that the failure of the submarine to rise is only one of the things that can be expected in any kind of war. It is, in fact, a gratification to ourselves in having her escape all similar disasters. The officers and crew of the F-4 have nobly met their death—and as heroes. The nation will grieve for them."

Uprooted Tree Reveals a Mystery

Body of Young Man Found at Kirkland, on Shores of Lake Washington—Police Believe He Was Murdered.

(Pacific News Service.) Seattle, Wash., March 29.—Unearthed by the turn-up roots of a falling tree from the shallow grass in which it had apparently lain for several years, the body of an unidentified man, about 20 years old, has been found at Kirkland, on the shores of Lake Washington, and police and county authorities are today endeavoring to solve the mystery of his death. The body was found by John Castle, a farmer.

Because the body was found in a shallow grave, the police believe that the man was murdered. No weapon or poison container of any description was found in the grave or on the body. Physicians have declared the body must have occupied its rude grave for four or five years.

The body is dressed in a dark overcoat of good Kersey cloth, well tailored. Discovery of this body reveals the third mysterious death that has occurred in this lonely spot in recent years.

Circuit Judge Davis this morning directed a jury to return a verdict acquitting Charles Carrigan of a crime involving immorality.

Man and Woman Attacked in Home; Neighborhood Row

Following a neighborhood row yesterday afternoon three men invaded the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Tuesher, at 6215 Woodstock avenue, according to the report of neighbors to the police, and attempted to kill the couple. Tuesher was hit over the head with a brick and a revolver and one of the men threw a knife at Mrs. Tuesher, narrowly missing her. According to City Detectives Hellyar and Tackewer, who are investigating today, Samuel Danno, of 618 East Twenty-second street, is one of the assailants, the others have not been identified.

MILITARY PARTY GETS CONTROL IN JAPAN BY 46 MAJORITY IN DIET

Recent Election Gives Okuma Administration Full Power; Greater Navy Planned.

(United Press Special Wire.) Washington, March 29.—With cables from Tokyo announcing that the policies of the Okuma ministry were endorsed at the recent Japanese election, the far eastern situation has become a real problem for the United States to solve.

The Japanese embassy announced today that the Okuma side will have 231 votes in the diet, against 167 for the opposition. The latter includes 31 independents, who stand ready to vote with the government on many vital questions. This gives Okuma a majority of 46, even without the independent support.

State department officials realize that this result is a great triumph for militarism and all that militarism means. They expect the mikado to assemble parliament within a fortnight to take some action toward a greater Japanese army and navy.

Despite reports that Japan has made additional demands on China, which will interfere further with the "open door" to the far eastern republic, there has been no reply to the Japanese representations of a fortnight ago. Ambassador Guthrie at Tokyo has been assured unofficially by the Japanese foreign minister that the Japanese attitude towards China are entirely friendly, but formal, official assurances are lacking.

There is a general belief among officials here that Japan may reopen the problem presented by California's anti alien laws so that the Tokyo government will have something to trade on as the negotiations progress.

for Day, and have never met Lucius. I never promised to support Lucius or any other man, for the reason that the law effective May 22 provides that the governor shall have the absolute right of state highway engineer, and I told the governor weeks ago that I would support his man.

The board plans to permit Bowly to continue at his old salary, and carry on the work in Hood River county to completion. It is also the plan to have him settle with contractors in Hood River county and elsewhere for work done. The new highway engineer will start with a new slate and carry on all work outside of Hood River county. It is stated he will not be expected to interfere with any settlements for work done under the Bowly administration.

W. W. Lucius, the Portland engineer, who was most strongly favored by Senator I. N. Day, apparently has no chance with Governor Withycombe.

The appointment of Bowly is a distinct blow to Senator Day, according to the view taken here.

That it would be impossible to carry out any such two engineer system as proposed, seems to be apparent from the terms of all highway contracts. The contracts distinctly state that the state highway engineer shall have the full say as to specifications, and on all questions arising as to the performance of the work. If Bowly is removed, as proposed by Kay and Lucius, the new man will be in charge as highway engineer, and will have full authority, under the contracts, no matter what may be the attitude of the commission.

It was the boast of representatives of certain bridge companies, both before and after the election, that when Withycombe was in office Bowly would soon have to get out, and that the governor had been pledged to make the change.

Despite Kay's denial of any activity concerning candidates, he has been fighting unceasingly to oust Bowly. Kay's statement today is looked on here as an attempt to "get out of it," and to put on the governor whatever blame may arise.

E. I. Cantline is a general contractor and has been a resident of Portland several years. Before going into the contracting business he was engaged in railroad engineering work, and was formerly connected with the Northern Pacific railroad. Since coming to Portland he has acted as a consulting engineer for various projects.

Coquille Section Revises.

Marshfield, Or., March 29.—The lumber business in the Coquille section of Coos county is reviving. The Crane logging camp, which has been closed for some time, is to be reopened soon with Nona Anderson in charge. The logs taken out will be furnished to the plant of the Prosper Logging Co., at Marshfield. The Crane logging railroad is building a tract of timber which he will log, and will use the road to carry the logs to the sawmill. Aasen Brothers also expect to open their camp near Coquille.

Struck by Auto.

R. Roomes of 570 Ryan street was struck by the automobile driven by J. C. Davis of 309 Stark street, at Twenty-second and Hawthorne avenue, yesterday, when he walked in front of the machine from behind a streetcar. He was not seriously injured.

HUNGARIAN TOWNS IN SAROS DISTRICT ARE TAKEN BY RUSSIANS

Reported That 120,000 of the Czar's Men Rush Through Dukla to Make Capture.

TWO RAILROAD CENTERS

Official Reports Say Russians Win Two New Victories in Poland One on Skwa River, Other Near Pilica.

Petrograd, March 29.—Pouring through the Dukla pass, three Russian army corps, consisting of 120,000 men all told, have captured five Hungarian towns in the district of Saros, according to advices received today at the war office, from the Caucasus front.

Two new Russian victories in Poland are officially reported. One was on the Skwa river and the other near the Pilica.

The Russian drive through Dukla resulted in the Russian occupation of Buzow, Al Polyanka, Sbor, Al Komarnik and Czetes, and also the important railroad towns of north Bartfield and Szvidnik.

The Russian advance entered the northwestern districts of Hungary. It met a determined resistance and was compelled to retire and await the main force.

GERMANS PURSUE RUSSIANS.

(International News Service.) Berlin, March 29.—The pursuit of the Russian invaders of East Prussia, whose aim was the capture of Tilsit, is continuing, according to an official of the German general staff in a statement here today.

Heavy Russian losses are reported in the district of Krasnopol, where the Germans captured more than 1000 from a cavalry squadron.

In the western theatre the day was declared to have been "rather quiet."

GERMANS HOPE FOR PEACE.

Petrograd, March 29.—The war office today broke its silence concerning the recent operations in the north of East Prussia, marked by the occupation of Memel. In view of the German claims of an important victory as the result of the withdrawal of the Russian forces, the statement declared.

"After obtaining certain information which was desired, the invading force was ordered to withdraw, and correspondence from Germans complaining of their heavy losses and expressing hope for a speedy ending of the war."

Woodburn Veterans Enjoy Reunion

Preliminary Plans Are Made for Organization of Camp Oregon Volunteers Who Saw Service in Philippines.

Woodburn, Or., March 29.—The second annual reunion of Company M, Second Oregon Volunteers, held here Saturday evening, was well attended by veterans, 29 responding to the roll call and 11 reporting by letter or telegram. The records show that 19 have answered the "last call" and a number have not yet been located.

Captain Poorman presided at the meeting, at which many interesting stories of the campaign were related. It was unanimously decided to continue the annual meetings, to be held on the anniversary of the battle of Alcala de Henares, in this city in the future, and all present living in the vicinity of Woodburn signified their intention of affiliating. It is estimated that the new camp of Veterans will start with a membership of nearly 50. Enthusiasm was manifested over the proposed camp.

Banker May Know His Fate Tonight

Expectation This Afternoon That Sheridan Case Will Be in Hands of Jury in Short Time.

Unless the jury strikes a snag, T. H. Sheridan, the Roseburg banker, on trial charged with wilfully converting the funds of depositors to his own use, will know his fate tonight.

United States District Attorney Clarence H. Reardon reviewed the evidence to the jury this morning, and Judge A. W. Bennett of Marshfield, one of Sheridan's three attorneys, had made the first portion of the defense's closing argument when court adjourned this noon. Former Senator C. W. Fulton was to close for the defense this afternoon.

Accused of Breaking Parole.

Virgil B. Jennings, a parole violator from Monroe, Wash., state reformatory, was arrested at Sixth and Hoy streets this morning by City Detectives Swensen and Moloney and will be held for the probation officer of the institution, Ralph Lindsay, another parole violator from the same reformatory, was arrested Saturday.
