

BISHOP SENDS HIS GREETINGS JUST AS DEATH TAKES HIM

Rudolph Dubs Had Been a Consistent Church Worker for Many Years.

SESSION AT CORVALLIS

M. J. Ballantine, Dallas, Is Elected President, and G. L. Lovell, Portland, Secretary.

(Special to The Journal.) Corvallis, Or., April 1.—Simultaneously with receiving greetings from Bishop Rudolph Dubs, D. D., LL. D., by the Oregon Evangelical church, assembled here for its twenty-first annual session this week, news also was received of the death of the bishop in New York state.

Bishop Dubs was the senior bishop of the three bishops in the United States, having served over half a century in active service for the church. He was 77 years old and had been a consistent, hard worker and recognized pillar of the institution. As a pulpit orator he was one of the best known in the United States. He was a pioneer minister of the gospel here, and in early youth, and was numbered among the few who carried the word of his God among the Indians, and the hardships and sufferings of the frontier.

The session of the conference, which started Wednesday and which will end Sunday with special Easter services, is headed by Bishop W. H. Fouke of Harrisburg, Pa. In the election of permanent officers of the Oregon division, M. J. Ballantine of Dallas and G. L. Lovell of Portland were elected president and secretary, respectively, of the association.

At the conference of the missionary societies last night, Mr. E. Bell of Corvallis was elected head of the local mission field.

College at Pullman Would Enter Cadets

Asks for Permission to Have 300 Leads Take Part in Encampment at Exposition in San Francisco This Summer.

(Pacific News Service.) San Francisco, April 1.—Lieutenant L. D. Roscoe, U. S. A., assistant chief of the military bureau of the Panama-Pacific international exposition, has received a request from Oesterman State college, Pullman, Wash., for permission for the college to enter 300 cadets in the encampment to be held at the exposition during the summer. To date five military organizations have signified their intention of participating in the encampment, as follows:

Roswell Military Institute, 250 men; Oregon Agricultural college, 1200 men; Pennsylvania National Guard, 150 men; Chicago Boy Scouts, 150 boys; Texas National Guard, 150 men; Oregon National Guard, number of men not settled.

This morning Chief Clark told him to confine his operations to the street and released him.

Will Fight Increased Rate.

Hood River, Or., April 1.—The Oregon-Washington Telephone company, of Hood River, formerly the Home company, has made application to the state railroad commission for a hearing which will be held on April 8 at which the telephone company will ask for a rate of 25 per cent in rates with a discount of 25 cents per phone if the rate is paid on or before the tenth of each month. This means a considerable increase on the rents of the phones in the business houses and a corresponding increase in the rates for long distance calls.

Mrs. Elizabeth Walling Passes After a Short Illness.

The deceased was a native of Maine, Germany, and was born in 1853. She was married in 1881 and has been a resident of Oregon for 19 years, part of the time in Linn and Lincoln counties. She was a widow, one daughter and three sons, May, Harry, Frank and Charles Walling, all residing in Oregon. The widow is 75 years of age, a veteran of the Civil war and a member of the George Wright Post, No. 4, A. R. Arrangements for the funeral will be announced later.

Pola, Naval Base, Safe From Attack

Austrians Complete Defenses at Adriatic Sea Stronghold by Equipping It With Long Range Krupp Guns.

(International News Service.) Venice, via London, April 1.—Austrian defenses at Pola, the great naval base in the Adriatic sea, have been completed. The very latest long range Krupp guns have been installed, and Pola now is regarded as impregnable. The Austrian fleet has been brought up to its highest efficiency with the addition of 12 submarines, sent to Pola by rail from Götting, Germany.

The entire zone between Dignano, Fasana and Pirano (Adriatic ports on the Istria peninsula), have been converted into an immense entrenched camp with sufficient munitions to last 12 months.

Work Started on Umatilla Project

West Extension Furnishes Employment for 150 Men; Force Will Probably Be Increased Later.

(Special to The Journal.) Hermiston, Or., April 1.—Work on the west extension of the Umatilla project has been started with 150 men locally employed men and with as many head of horses. The chief work will be the continuation of the construction of the main ditch, which is concrete lined. Work will continue through the summer and fall until freezing weather, when it will be discontinued until the following spring. The number of laborers and teams will probably reach 200 during the busy season, and the work will greatly relieve the unemployed problem of this section.

SEASIDE BONDS BOUGHT

Announcement was made today by the Lumbermen Trust company of the purchase of the \$45,000 funding bond issue of the city of Seaside. The deal was closed late yesterday by F. W. Camp, secretary of the company. The bonds will bear 6 per cent and will mature serially in from 5 to 25 years. The issue was purchased at par and will take up all the floating indebtedness of the city, besides paying for the waterworks, street improvements and other obligations.

Once Brewery—Dairy Soon.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Olympia, Wash., April 1.—Adolph D. and Frederick W. Schmidt may have been depressed when the state went dry last fall, but they have found a silver lining in the clouds. On June 1 they will convert a part of the Olympia Brewing company, which the Schmidts formerly owned, into the Olympia Dairy Products company. The new company will supply pasteurized milk and cream, butter and ice cream.

BOB HOLMAN, PIONEER FIREMAN, TRANSFER MAN, PASSES AWAY

Former Chief Engineer of Volunteers and Captain of Police Was 75 Years Old

CAME TO PORTLAND IN '63

Funeral Services Will Likely Be Held Sunday and Interment in Exempt Firemen's Plot.

Robert (Bob) Holman, pioneer Portland fireman and transfer man, died this morning at his home nine miles out of Portland on Taylor avenue at the age of 75.

A native of England, Mr. Holman came to Portland from Brooklyn, N. Y., in 1863, and was one of Portland's first fire department officials, being chief engineer of the local volunteer department in 1885 and 1886. After serving for a time as captain of police he founded the transfer business which still bears his name.

He leaves a widow, three sons—Edward, George and William Holman, all of Portland—and three daughters—Mrs. Elmer Huntington of Castlerock, Wash., and Mrs. Sophie Robinson and Mrs. Bert Kellogg of this city.

Also surviving are two brothers and a sister. Edward Holman, well known Portland funeral director, James Holman of San Francisco and Mrs. Sarah Norton of Portland.

Funeral services will probably be held Sunday and interment will be in the exempt firemen's plot in Lone Fir cemetery.

Carries \$250,000 Through Streets

Radium and Mesothorium Worth Fortune Put in Safety Vault Until German Exhibit at Fair Is Completed.

(Pacific News Service.) San Francisco, April 1.—Two small packages, worth nearly \$250,000, were placed in a local safe deposit vault today by Dr. Hugo Leiber, inventor, and president of H. Leiber & Co. of New York, awaiting installation as part of the German industrial exhibits at the exposition. The packages were brought in handbags by Dr. Leiber, who arrived here yesterday as chairman of the committee in charge of the German participation in the exposition. One package contained radium and the other mesothorium.

Walla Walla, Wash., April 1.—Commercial clubs of Walla Walla, Milton, Freewater, Dayton, Waikeburg, Athena, Wallula, Prescott, and other towns of the valley, will gather here tonight to outline the program for the Walla Walla valley part of the Celilo canal opening celebration, to be held in Wallula May 5.

Trolley Car Service To Linnton Ends

United Railways, Deprived of Franchise, Withdraws Cars and Ends Steam Service Connection.

Something was lacking on downtown Stark street today. The same vacancy was noted out of Pettygrove and westward to the county road running to Linnton. The big olive cars of the United Railways were not there.

Today marked the discontinuance of interurban service between Portland and Linnton because the United Railways franchise revocation was in force.

Concurrently appeared more of a bustle among the motor buses. Since the county commissioners canceled the company's franchise because of its refusal to maintain its Portland-Linnton fare at 5 cents, the bus people began in earnest. Several gasoline driven cars have been on the run for some weeks, in fact since the jitney influence has been noted in competition with the city streetcars. They have been carrying passengers to Linnton for 10 cents. Rumors this morning were that the fares are to be raised to 20 cents, the regular tariff charge for the North Bank steam line to Linnton.

The railroad company put in service today its new schedule of steam service, connecting with the United Railways at Linnton for Wilkesboro and way points. Three trains daily will be run for this service.

Valuation Hearing Being Held Here

State Railroad Commission Engaged in Taking Testimony in P. B. L. & P. Co.—Three Weeks Consumed So Far.

The state railroad commission is engaged in taking testimony in the P. B. L. & P. Co. valuation hearings in Portland this week. The local hearings will continue until Saturday. The work is being undertaken that a basis may be provided for use of the commission in rate making. Already 21 days in Portland and at Salem have been consumed in the hearing. 2300 pages of testimony have been taken and over 100 exhibits have been introduced. Land and waterpower holdings of the company are now under discussion, with special reference to Oregon City property.

BOWLBY, KEPT AWAY FROM MEETINGS, WAS ALLOWED NO DEFENSE

Governor Withycombe Explains That Sessions Would Have Been Embarrassing.

ONE WAS A "HEARING"

Many Believe Real Reason Was That Usset of Program Was Feared.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., April 1.—According to Governor Withycombe, the reason that State Highway Engineer Bowlby was not invited to attend the meetings of February 17 and March 23, was that it would be embarrassing for him. For this reason, George Palmer Putnam, the governor's secretary, was called to act as secretary at the meeting of February 17, when it was voted to dismiss Bowlby, and Esther Carson, chief stenographer in the governor's office, was called on to act as secretary at the meeting of March 23, when it was decided to give Douglas county \$20,000 for the improvement of Cow Creek canyon, the session of March 20, when Bowlby submitted an appointment of state highway funds, and of March 24, when a Clatsop county delegation was heard and assailed Bowlby.

The real reason why Major Bowlby was not invited to attend many meetings held by the state highway commission since Governor Withycombe was inaugurated, is believed by many here who are well posted on the situation, to be that it was feared he might upset the plans of the majority, Governor Withycombe and State Treasurer Kay.

Blocked Any Defense. By refraining from calling Bowlby to the meetings, the commission prevented him from making a defense and spoiling their opportunity to play politics. As a result of the plan of keeping Bowlby away, publicity was secured for the contractors and those seeking to "put the skids" under Bowlby, and the engineer was given the worst of it.

It is known that Kay and Withycombe feared that if Bowlby were called in he would probably upset the program of the day. This was shown at a recent meeting attended by Bowlby when a delegation from Clatsop county were forced to back down on many assertions. Bowlby also took issue successfully with Kay on a fund

Six Measures to Feel Referendum

Expected That Petitions Will Be Ready for Circulation Before the End of the Week; Titles Submitted.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, April 1.—Referendum petitions against six measures passed by the last legislature will be ready for circulation before the week is over. Attorney General Tanner submitted the ballot titles for these measures to the secretary of state yesterday, and there are no further legal obstacles to overcome. The bills to be referred are two measures encroaching on the freedom of the initiative, referendum and recall; a measure to cripple the powers of the Seattle port commission; an anti-picketing bill; a measure requiring a certificate of necessity to start any public utility, and an unscientific budget bill.

Two other measures, the Jitney \$2500 bond bill and the Benick finance measure, are in the courts. They will be subjected to referendum if the court knocks out the emergency clause.

Jitney Driver Hurt; Machine Wrecked

As the result of a collision between a jitney bus and a North and South Portland streetcar at Sixteenth and Irving streets at noon today, Abraham Isenstein, of 623 Fifth street, was taken to the Good Samaritan hospital, and his automobile is almost a wreck. Isenstein was badly cut about the head.

Isenstein drove south on Sixteenth and in turning east on Irving crashed into the front end of the streetcar.

Great Battleship Parade.

Washington, April 1.—In the parade of the United States battle fleet in San Francisco in July will be seen flying the flags of two full admirals and the secretary of the navy for the first time since the Civil war.

The two admirals' flags will be those of Admiral Howard of the Pacific fleet and Admiral Fletcher of the Atlantic squadron. From New York the Atlantic fleet will pass through the Panama canal where the delayed official opening exercises will take place. Following the review of the squadron at San Francisco by Secretary Daniels, the vessels will proceed toward Puget sound. It is expected that the battleships Texas and New York may be included in the squadron which will pass through the canal and ultimately visit Honolulu.
