

## MILK INSPECTORS OF THE NORTHWEST OPEN SESSION TOMORROW

Mayor Albee Has Been Selected to Give Address in Behalf of the City.

### OTHER SPEAKERS NAMED

Many Subjects Listed for Discussion; Session to End With Banquet on Thursday Evening.

The annual meeting of the Pacific Northwest Association of Dairy and Milk Inspectors will open at 9:30 o'clock tomorrow morning in the Elizabethan room of the Imperial hotel. Mayor H. R. Albee will give the address of welcome on behalf of the city.

The morning program calls for an address by the president of the association, Dr. D. W. Jackson, chief dairy and milk inspector of Portland; an address by Dr. C. C. Cottle of Portland; a paper on the Relation of Milk to Public Health, by City Health Officer Marcelus; and a talk on "The Beginning of Dairy and Milk Inspection in Portland," by Dr. Esther Pohl-Lovejoy.

Davis; "Cooperation of the Milk Inspector and the Producer," J. E. Dorman in charge western dairy investigation, federal bureau animal industry, Salt Lake City; "Bacteriological Analysis of Milk," Professor T. D. Beckwith, Oregon Agricultural college; "The Production of Good Milk From the Producer's Standpoint," Professor E. V. Ellington, University of Idaho; "The Production of Certified Milk," C. V. Orton, Sumner, Wash.

**Round 1.** Johnson came out confidently. The white man wore a serious look. Johnson rushed Willard at the start, forcing the white man back into his corner. They clinched and in the breakaway Johnson tapped lightly to Willard's kidneys. Johnson was smiling. Willard made no head, fighting viciously. Willard landed a left to the negro's jaw, swinging the champion's head slightly. Johnson countered with right to Willard's jaw. They exchanged lefts to the body. Round even.

**Round 2.** Johnson laughed as Willard missed a left to the head. A second later Willard repeated the same drive and landed a hard left. Willard feinted with his left and shot a hard right to the body. Johnson lost his composure and smiled momentarily and began rushing the white man. Willard stood his ground and fought the negro off. There was a spirited exchange of blows in the center of the ring. Johnson landed a right and Willard countered with a left to the negro's jaw. Willard's round.

**Round 3.** The negro again tried to rush Willard at the start of the round. The Kansan blocked him with surprising cleverness, sending a stiff left to the body. Johnson grew cautious, but did not drop his smile. He worked into

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a clinch. In the breakaway the fighters exchanged light taps. Willard blocked another attempted rush, but the champion had the best of the exchange. Willard kept working his left at the negro's head, landing several times. None of the blows, however, was a stiff one. They mixed it in a real set-to in two corners in the eighth. Johnson landed a left jab to the body. He went at Willard like a whirlwind, and drove him to the ropes. Willard blocked body and right to the jaw. Round even.

**Round 4.** Johnson came up laughing, holding out his stomach. Willard failed to fall for the trick and he sent Jim Jeffries down. He sent back a lunge. They went into a clinch. There was sharp engage in the breakaway with no damage. Both blocked lefts. Willard became more confident. He laughed as he blocked another of Johnson's rushes. Johnson rushed Willard into the ropes, landing two hard punches. Willard bled slightly around the lips. Johnson's round.

In an exchange near the ropes Johnson emerged with his mouth bleeding slightly. He feinted and landed a right to the body. Johnson again rushed Willard to the ropes, landing two body blows. Willard landed a left to the face. Even round.

In an exchange of blows Johnson had the better of it, landing a stiff right to the jaw. Willard blocked another headed for the same place. Johnson blocked several lefts directed to the body. Johnson rushed the fighting fiercely at this point, raining blows at the white man's body. Willard seemed cool and landed a left jab to the body. Johnson drove Willard into the corner at the bell. Round even.

**Round 6.** Johnson was fighting with grim determination on his face. Apparently he is trying his hardest to win. Willard blocked all rushes nicely. Johnson landed a left jab to the body and then landed a left jab that was only a tap. Johnson evidently was playing for the white man's stomach. Willard covered his abdomen. The negro landed a left to the face and followed this up with a hard right to the body. The negro ran into a clinch. There was another vicious exchange as they broke away. Willard's round.

He swung wildly twice in an effort to connect. He tried it again and again. All four times the white man blocked. Johnson landed a left to the jaw that rocked the Kansan's head. Willard countered with a smashing right to the body. Johnson followed this up with a straight right to the head. The negro blocked another right to the same place. Round even.

**Round 19.** They stalled and clinched early in this round. Both fighters blocked several swings. Willard then carried the fighting to the negro, landing a left to the stomach and a light jab to the face. Johnson hooked a short left to the body. There was a lively exchange and both men landed several blows and the big Kansan getting the better of the mix-up. Willard's round.

**Round 20.** Willard took the aggressive and rushed the white man's corner. Johnson laughed back at the white man as he blocked several leads to the face. Johnson was trying to lead the fight. The white man blocked a left jab to the body. Johnson landed a fierce mixup in the middle of the ring. Willard blocked most of the negro's punches and landed his right repeatedly in the mixup. Willard's round.

**Round 21.** Both scrappers posed a minute in the center of the ring without offering to lead, apparently feeling each other out. Then Willard shot in right to the head. The blow evidently bothered the negro. He immediately exchanged with Willard. Johnson landed several jabs to the body and a light swing to the head as they broke away. This was another tame round, repeated with hipdroming. Willard's round.

**Round 22.** The Kansan blocked a vicious right and jabbed a straight left to the jaw. They clinched and wrestled in the middle of the ring. Willard landed three hard blows to the body in the in-fighting that followed. Johnson landed his right repeatedly to Johnson's stomach. The negro rushed into a clinch to save himself, and held on until the bell. Willard's round.

**Round 23.** Johnson blocked two rights to the jaw, shaking off both blows with a laugh. The white hope sent a shower of rights and Johnson blocked them all. Willard was doing all the fighting in this round. The negro apparently was permitting the white man to wear himself out if possible. Willard scored a light left to the face. It was only a tap, and the champion grinned. Willard's round.

**Round 24.** The champion was patiently resting at the beginning of this round, holding onto Willard and passing the wink to him. The white man hooked a left to the body. The white man hooked another clinch and for the greater part of the round hugged like a couple of friends. There was little fighting. The Kansan scored three hits to the jaw, but none of them was haymaker. Willard's round.

**Round 25.** Willard rushed and sent a light left to the face. The negro clinched and hugged the cowboy close and Willard blocked a left and right, headed for the face. Johnson landed a right to the jaw. Willard scored a right to the body and another to the jaw. Willard was forcing the fight all the way.

**Round 26.** Willard landed a right to the body. Referee Welsh was forced to make them break. The negro hung on from the start. Willard nearly dropped the negro with a terrific left to the jaw. Johnson was nearly gone. He clinched and held on. Johnson landed a final smash that knocked the champion cold.

**October to See End of War, Says Turk**

David Bey, Minister of Finance, Says Germany Not to Go Through Another Winter Campaign.

(International News Service.) Paris, April 5.—A dispatch from Geneva to the Matin quotes David Bey, the Turkish minister of finance, as saying: "I am of the opinion that the war cannot last much longer, for the Germans will be unwilling to make a second winter campaign. I expect, therefore, a definite solution toward the end of October."

The Echo de Paris quotes Herr von Hasenstein, director of the German Imperial bank, as saying: "I believe that neither Russia nor France will be able to support the war financially if it lasts a year from today."

**Astor and Bride, Wet, Save Yacht**

When Palatial Boat Drags Anchor in San Francisco Bay Couple Brave Waves in Boat and Order Steam.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, April 5.—Vincent Astor today congratulated the crew of his palatial yacht, the Nomad, because it was not wrecked in San Francisco bay late yesterday by a 60-mile gale, which, sweeping in through the Golden Gate, drove the craft to its anchor dragging, toward the shore, near the exposition grounds.

When Astor saw the yacht in imminent danger of being cast on the breakwater he embarked in a small boat, accompanied by his bride, and rowed to the Nomad and boarded it, wet to the skin with spray just in time to order steam gotten up. This was done in time to bring the yacht back to the bay. Several small launches in the bay were wrecked.

## Krasner Expected To Make Legal Fight

Motion to Quash Indictment Made in Case Involving White Slave Charge; Defendant Is Still in Jail.

A motion to quash the indictment against their client was presented in federal court before Judge Wolverton this morning by attorneys for Sam Krasner, accused of violating the Mann white slave act. The motion will be argued next Monday. It alleges that there are two separate offenses named in the indictment, and that this is prejudicial to Krasner. The motion, presented in place of Krasner's plea, which was to have been heard this morning, indicates that the case will be fought. The motion is still in jail, having been unable to furnish the \$5000 bond demanded by United States District Attorney Reames.

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## Ultimatum Sent To Eitel, Is Report

Remember That German Cruiser Ordered to Leave or Interne Within 24 Hours.

(International News Service.) Washington, D. C., April 5.—Reports that the German raider Prinz Eitel Friedrich had been served with an ultimatum to depart or intern within 24 hours could not be confirmed here today. The report was that the Eitel's time would expire some time tomorrow.

The Eitel is still at Newport News, Va., according to a wireless dispatch received by the navy department. Secretary of the Navy Daniels declared today that he has no knowledge of the raider's intentions, and that the treasury department alone has knowledge of any orders that might have been issued to the Eitel.

## Want \$228,059 for Sinking of Frye

Claim for That Amount to Be Made Against Germany Because American Ship Shelled by Eitel.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, April 5.—The American for \$228,059.54 will be made against Germany as a result of the sinking of the American vessel, the Frye, it was officially announced today.

The Frye was sunk by the converted cruiser Prinz Eitel Friedrich, now at Newport News, Va. The American ship carried a cargo of wheat, and despite the protests of her commander was sent to the bottom of the Pacific. The captain and crew of the Frye were landed at Newport News when the Eitel put in there for repairs.

## Closing of Gateway Would Be Protested

Columbia River Zumbermen Are Perturbed Over Rumors of Proposed Action of S. P. & N.

Zumbermen along the Columbia river below Portland are considerably perturbed over the proposed closing of the Portland gateway by the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway. The tariff has not been published, but the word has reached the mill men that it will appear soon.

The proposed tariff, if sustained against attack, would cancel through rates on lumber and forest products routed by way of Portland over the O.W. & N. to points east of the Missouri river and to points west of the Missouri river, which are accessible by the Hill lines. This would give the North East and other Hill lines the advantage of the long haul.

## Looks Bad for Whiskey, Sulphur

Oregon City, April 5.—There will be no more prescriptions calling for whiskey with a pinch of sulphur for "boose fighters" in Oregon City, if the drastic prohibition ordinance which is proposed passes the council. Complying with his prelection promise, Mayor Jones will introduce an ordinance this week which will prohibit the sale of liquor in drug stores in any manner whatever.

Seattle, April 5.—Believed to be members of a gang of burglars that have operated in Seattle during part of the winter months, three men giving the names of William McFarland, H. Molnar, and M. S. McGregor, are held in the city jail here today. They were arrested in a lonely cabin near Riverside in the woods south of the city. In the cabin where the men were found, the detectives unearthed several hundred dollars' worth of loot, alleged to have been stolen in various burglaries of stores and homes in Seattle.

Bornheim be admitted to probate and that letters of administration be issued to H. W. Arneson, who is the sole heir of the estate consisting of 10 acres of real estate in Clarke county.
