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HIRING OF A SPECIAL HIGHWAY ENGINEER COMES UP TUESDAY

Caustic Comment Caused by Suggested Means of Settling Trouble.

FUND TO BE APPORTIONED

Expectation Advisory Committee Follow Recommendation by Bowby, and Approved by Promoters.

The employment of a special highway engineer and the apportionment of the 1915 state road fund will be considered at Salem tomorrow at a conference of the state highway commission and its newly appointed advisory committee.
