

ROSEBURG NOW HAS OPPORTUNITY TO GET RAILROAD AND MILL

Kendall Brothers of Pittsburg, Mo., Men as Requested. Put Proposition Up to Businessmen. CITIZENS MUST DECIDE

Bonus, Right-of-Way and Forty-Acre Site for Mill Is Asked of Citizens.

Roseburg, Or., April 6.—If the citizens of Roseburg will give a bonus of \$300,000, the right-of-way and a site for the mill, the Kendall Brothers company will construct a standard gauge railroad to the timber districts east of this city and build a sawmill of 200,000 feet daily capacity near here. This is the proposition tendered to the citizens of Roseburg by Kendall Brothers of Pittsburg.

The Kendall company has extensive timber interests in Douglas county. It was at the request of Roseburg men that the proposition was submitted. The city of Roseburg already has voted bonds in the sum of \$500,000 to aid in the construction of a railroad to Coos Bay, and it is probable that an election will be called in the near future for the purpose of authorizing the use of part of the bonds by the Kendall company. In case the road is built its title will be vested in the city of Roseburg and the Kendall company is to secure a lease for a period of sixty years. The road will be a common carrier with a regular train schedule and the city of Roseburg will have a hand in the making of traffic rates. The city will receive 25 per cent of the net earnings of the road. The Kendall company reserves the right to purchase the road at any time within the time of the lease for \$300,000 cash, and agrees to begin construction of the road as soon as the city enters into the contract for the construction of the railroad.

The engineers of the Kendall Lumber company estimate that the cost of construction of the railroad, exclusive of the steel rails which will be leased, will be \$750,000. Forty acres near Roseburg are asked as a mill site. A committee appointed by the commercial club to confer with the Kendall company upon receiving the proposition submitted by the Kendalls resolved, "that this committee accept the proposition submitted and recommend the same to be submitted to the people of the city of Roseburg for adoption or rejection."

In case the proposition is accepted by Roseburg the Kendall company agrees to accept the city bonds at par. It is said that practically all the stockholders of the local fair grounds are willing to surrender their shares in order that the fair grounds may be donated as a site for the mill. Probably the most difficult matter the local people will have to contend with will be the securing of a right of way. Whether the farmers along the route of the proposed railroad will consider the road of sufficient benefit to donate a right-of-way across their properties must be determined.

aidings, 75 miles, \$175,400; telegraph lines, \$21,000; buildings, \$20,000; equipment, \$118,820. This makes the cost per mile, including aidings, \$34,374.

Ample Tonnage in Sight.
It is estimated that the annual earnings will be \$1,347,765, derived from redwood, fir and pine, ores, machinery, fruit and general merchandise, together with the passenger, mail and express business to be expected. That an ample tonnage will be developed is the unanimous report of engineers who have gone over the territory, now shut off from the outside world except

through long and costly hauls over mountain roads. In diversification of resources all along the line, Dr. Reddy declares, no section of the state is so rich. The Illinois valley alone, while adapted to general agriculture and fruit, has besides vast areas of giant redwoods and sugar pine and fir. It has an elevation of from 1200 to 2000 feet and has about 60,000 acres of land that can be put under cultivation. Though its population is now only 3000, it has potential agricultural and horticultural possibilities alone for 15,000. The stage road between Grants Pass and Crescent City traverses the valley for 30 miles, touching the postoffices of Selma, Korb, Dryden, Holland, Takima and Waldo.

Ore Business to Be Heavy.
It is estimated that the timber within the drainage of the valley comprises 2,000,000,000 feet, including high qualities of oak and cedar. Several valuable mines would be opened up with a transportation line penetrating this region. Gold, copper, platinum, iron, cinnabar and coal have been found in eminently paying quantities and good qualities of clays, ochre, asbestos, mica, quicksilver, marble, granite, sandstone, slate and cement are accessible in many portions of the mountainous areas.

Reports indicate that seven or eight mines already are developed to a point where they can supply 1000 tons of ore per day, which could be increased to 3000 tons once transportation affords an outlet and market. **Will Save 100 Miles.**
Crescent City, the tidewater terminus of the line, is a city of 1250 people. The government has been investigating the feasibility of developing its harbor and it is understood that, on the proper showing of commercial possibilities and tonnage, a liberal appropriation will be made by congress. Crescent City is about 400 miles by water from San Francisco and about the same distance from Portland. Under present transportation facilities, so far as Grants Pass is concerned, tonnage is forced to move in one of two directions: Southward by rail to San Francisco, over the Siskiyou, or northward to Portland. Such of the north-

bound traffic as eventually must be transhipped for San Francisco has to make a great detour. With the line to Crescent City built, 92 miles, a direct and immediate water connection that would save hundreds of miles. Should the Southern Pacific decide to continue its Northwestern Pacific line northward from Trinidad, connection with California & Oregon Coast line would save 100 miles over the distance by way of Coos Bay and the Willamette Pacific into Eugene.

May Be New Organization.
The railroad under the present organization has the following officers: President, Dr. J. F. Reddy; vice president, Phil Metcham; secretary and treasurer, R. A. Letter; attorneys for bonds, Griffith, Allen & Letter; trustees for bonds, Title & Trust company. The company's offices are now at Grants Pass. Under the Twoby management, it is probable that an entirely new organization will be effected. Capital stock of \$5,000,000 has been authorized, secured by \$4,500,000 first mortgage bonds and \$500,000 second mortgage bonds. The bonds will mature in 25 years, bearing 6 per cent interest, payable semi-annually, subject to redemption after 1919 on payment of par, accrued interest and 5 per cent premium.

Orencia Will Vote On School Bonds

Present Quarters Not Large Enough, Though Some Thought Six Years Ago That Building Was Too Big.

Orencia, Or., April 6.—The directors of the Orencia school have called a special election for April 20 for the purpose of voting bonds to build an addition to the present building. Six years ago, when the building now in use was opened, some of the citizens thought the directors were unwise to build the four-room structure. Only two of the rooms were finished at that time. Since then the others have been finished and the upper hall also partitioned off into a room, making five rooms and five teachers, one of them teaching the high school, which was added last year. It is the purpose of the school board to put in the complete four-year course and have a standard high school.

When the new part is completed and the grounds are fixed up as planned, Orencia will have one of the most convenient and prettiest schoolhouses and grounds in the state.

Abrams May Resign.
