

CANTINE WILL DIRECT MITCHELL POINT AND OTHER HIGHWAY WORK

Highway Commission Gives No Intimation That Anyone Will Be Employed to Help.

FUNDS ARE APPORTIONED

Division of Money Practically Same as Was Suggested by Engineer Bowly.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)
Salem, Or., April 7.—The state highway commission yesterday afternoon told State Highway Engineer Cantine that he would be expected to superintend the Mitchell Point construction work in Hood River county, as well as perform other duties. There was no mention of putting O. Laugaard on the Hood River or any other job, and it is known that there is a slim chance of anyone being named to aid in the adjustment of disputes between contractors and some of the counties for whom they have done work.

The attorney general's opinion that there could not be two highway engineers and showing that if the commission should appoint a man to superintend the Hood River job or seek to adjust old contracts he would be a mere subordinate, put a crimp in further plans along the line of holding Cantine aloof from work planned and begun by Bowly.

The commission now takes the view that having voted Bowly out of a job, it is up to it to have the new appointee do the work and try to make good. Unless something unexpected should develop, it is practically certain that Cantine will be expected to perform all the duties of state highway engineer and will be held responsible. Estimates of the state highway engineer for work done by the Consolidated Construction company were yesterday afternoon turned over to County Judge Clarke of Columbia county, to guide him in making payments to the company.

"What the state needs is roads and 100 per cent efficiency on work undertaken," said Governor Withycombe during a discussion.

There has been enough money wasted on road building in Oregon since it was settled to pave the new Jerusalem," asserted J. H. Albert of the advisory board later on.

The fund apportionment, as finally fixed yesterday afternoon, is practically the same as that suggested by Highway Engineer Bowly, being as follows: Douglas county, \$20,000; Hood River county, \$20,000; Clatsop county, \$25,000; Columbia county, \$50,000; Jackson county, \$50,000; Josephine county, \$50,000; Washington county (Rox-Tigardville road), \$7231; miscellaneous, \$20,000.

Forty-Five Insane Deported This Day

Fourteen of Them Will Be Taken to New York City, and From There Sent to European Countries.

Salem, Or., April 7.—Forty-five patients at the state hospital for the insane were deported today. Fifteen of them will be taken as far as New York and there turned over for deportation to European countries. Four Mexicans will be taken to El Paso, Texas, and there turned over to the Mexican authorities. Others will go to various eastern and central European countries. Assistant Superintendent Evans of the asylum here, and Assistant Superintendent McKelvey of the Eastern Oregon hospital, were in charge.

Papas Gets \$500.

Hood River, Or., April 7.—The jury in the case of Gust Papas against the Mount Hood Hotel, yesterday returned a verdict in favor of the plaintiff in the sum of \$500. Papas sued the hotel company for \$2500 for injuries sustained while in the employ. The railroad company will appeal the case.

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MERGERITES WIN ALL BUT THREE OFFICES IN ST. JOHNS ELECTION

Measure to Become Part of Portland Carries With Big Majority.

A. A. MUCK IS NEW MAYOR

Socialists Lose Chief Executive's Office But Succeed in Landing Councilman.

With the sweeping victory for consolidation in Portland, the mergerites won all but three of the offices in the St. Johns city election Monday. The offices lost by the mergerites were recorder, treasurer and one councilman. They elected the mayor, city attorney, three councilmen at large and three ward councilmen.

Mayor A. W. Vincent, Socialist, was defeated for reelection, but the Socialists did not lose out entirely, as G. L. Perrine, successful candidate for councilman in the Second ward, is credited to that party. Mrs. J. M. Shaw, who ran for treasurer as an Independent, won over both the merger and anti-merger candidates. She won by five votes.

The new officials will be sworn in next Monday, and will take office the next day.

73 Packages of Paste Are Libeled

Government Takes Action Against Alleged Misbranding in Violation of Federal Law.

You can't make macaroni in the United States and promote its sale by pretending that it was made in the shadow of Vesuvius.

And you don't need to pretend very hard to come within the scope of the federal statute against misbranding, according to Robert R. Rankin, assistant United States district attorney, who yesterday filed a libel against 73 packages of macaroni.

In the label on the packages the words, "Naples style" and "Vesuvio brand" are prominently displayed. The effect is heightened by a picture of the bay and city of Naples, with Vesuvius in business-like eruption in the distance.

The words and picture give the general impression that the paste is a foreign product, says the libel, which recites that although the name and address of the company is printed in small letters in a lower corner, and of insufficient prominence to correct the label's general misleading and deceitful character.

Deputy United States Marshal Jackson went to Astoria last night to seize the offending 73 packages.

Dentist Sued by Former Employes

Personal Injuries Said to Have Been Sustained From Handling Alleged Poisonous Drug.

Two former employes of Edgar R. "Fainless" Parker, T. A. Penhalligon and Guy Pennepacker, yesterday sued Parker and his partner, Vitus A. Fitzgerald, for damages as the result of alleged injuries sustained from the use of "hydrocane," an anesthetic. They allege that hydrocane is a poisonous drug and that they were compelled to administer it to patients without having been properly warned as to its properties.

Each alleges injuries to eyes, nerves, muscles, and tissues. Penhalligon asks for \$10,250 and Pennepacker for \$5000. Penhalligon said he was forced to quit because of the effects of the drug December 24, 1914, and Pennepacker said he had to quit for the same reason March 27, 1915.

Teachers Are Home-steaders.

Salem, Or., April 7.—Of 25 teachers who attended a teachers' institute in Lake county recently, 24 are home-steaders and are teaching in order that they may support themselves while acquiring fertile 160 acre tracts, according to State Superintendent Churchill, who recently made a trip to Lake county. Illustrated Articles Describe Portland

International Edition of Dun's Review Devotes Six Pages, in All, to Description of This City.

Pendleton, Or., April 7.—Major Lee Moorhouse yesterday received several valuable additions to his already valuable collection of Indian curios and historic relics when Fred Lockley, special writer for the Oregon Daily Journal, presented him with some relics which he dug up a few days ago at the scene of the Whitman massacre.

While visiting the site of the old Waiilatpu mission, Mr. Lockley dug down several feet into the ground

where the charred remains of the house are yet visible. He excavated an old and much rusted fire dog, a number of pieces of broken dishes, a number of pieces of charred wood and a piece of a human bone. These he presented to Major Moorhouse.
