

PHYSICIAN ACCUSED OF IMPROPER ACTION TOWARD TWO GIRLS

Dr. Herbert W. Hegele Arrested on Complaint of Applicants for Positions.

DOCTOR DENIES CHARGES

"My Nurses Were Present at the Examinations, Despite Girls' Statements," Says Dr. Hegele.

Charged with improper conduct toward young women to whom he offered employment, Dr. Herbert W. Hegele, a well known physician with office in the Eureka theatre building, Broadway and Yamhill streets, was arrested yesterday afternoon by City Detectives Moloney and Swenne. The case was docketed for trial in the municipal court today, but it is believed that a postponement until a later date will be asked for. Dr. Hegele admits certain details of the stories told by the two girls who are the specific complainants, but denies emphatically any criminal intent. He was released on his own recognizance late last night.

The charges originated in the offices of Mrs. Lola G. Baldwin of the women's protective division of the department of public safety.

"Healthy, strong, capable sanitarian assistants," were asked for in advertisements inserted in the newspapers by Dr. Hegele, and two of the applicants for these positions are the complainants.

The girls said they were invited to his office for further examination at 7:30 the evening of March 21.

Instructed to remove her clothing and put on a sheet, she averts, according to Mrs. Baldwin, the girl took off her coat, hat and gloves, believing that she was to use the sheet as an apron. The physician insisted, however, on her removing her clothing, and she left his office. The experience of the second girl is reported to be the same, with the exception that she carried out the physician's instructions.

Dr. Hegele, in denying the charges, says that his only purpose was to give the girls proper instruction in the duties of the position for which they had applied.

183 Make Application.

"There were 183 applicants to this advertisement," he said, "and only a few of these were possibilities. Those who did qualify lacked any training whatever. It was necessary for me to give them a treatment in order that they might know what to do. They evidently misunderstood the duties of a nurse in hydro-therapy."

"My attitude toward these girls was always courteous, and it is extremely necessary that the nurses are of the best moral character. Some of the best people of the city are my patients, and I conduct a decent, respectable place."

My nurses were present at both these examinations, in spite of the statements of these girls to the contrary," Dr. Hegele concluded.

Dr. Hegele was indicted in October, 1912, on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor, but the charges were subsequently dropped two years later, without ever coming to trial.

Dr. Hegele said last night that he was sorely tempted to sue Mrs. Baldwin for slander as a result of her conversation to two of his nurses, in which she severely labeled the physician.

Southern Pacific Is Buying Large Ties

Purchasing Agent Rhodes Visits Portland to Superintend Filling of Orders.

L. O. Rhodes, general purchasing agent of the Southern Pacific company, is here from San Francisco superintending the manufacture of several hundred thousand feet of new ties to be used by the company in replacements and the laying of sidings and spurs.

When he was here last January, Mr. Rhodes discussed the new company policy of utilizing ties of 10-inch breadth, instead of the 8-inch ties previously used. The advantage of the broader surface lies in the longer life, the lesser liability to split and the smoother roadbed it produces. Since then, the Oregon mills have been cutting out these ties and to many of the small mills this new business was a salvation.

Since the purchasing department of the railroad was consolidated under one head in San Francisco, resulting in the closing of the Portland office, the policy of making purchases so far as possible in the localities where the material is to be used has been continued, Mr. Rhodes explained.

Corvallis Has Council.

Corvallis, Or., April 12.—Three hundred Sir Knights from various parts of the state were present at the installation of the new Council, Knights of Columbus, here last Sunday. 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WIFE OF MISSIONARY RECITES HARDSHIPS IN LETTER FROM PERSIA

Kurds Said to Have Burned and Plundered Many Villages.

HAD TO FLEE ON HORSE

Infuriated Hordes Attack Towns and Throw Children Into Rivers and Maltreat Women.

To flee on horseback with his wife and 4-weeks-old baby before an infuriated mob of Kurds is the experience of Elder Frank P. Oster, a Seventh-Day Adventist missionary in Persia, as given by him in a communication just received.

Oster was obliged to flee from Maragha. The Kurds plundered the town the day after he left. He reports many Christians and Moslems killed by Kurds at Mandoob and Urumiah, and later at Walla Walla, Wash., a daughter of Elder W. B. 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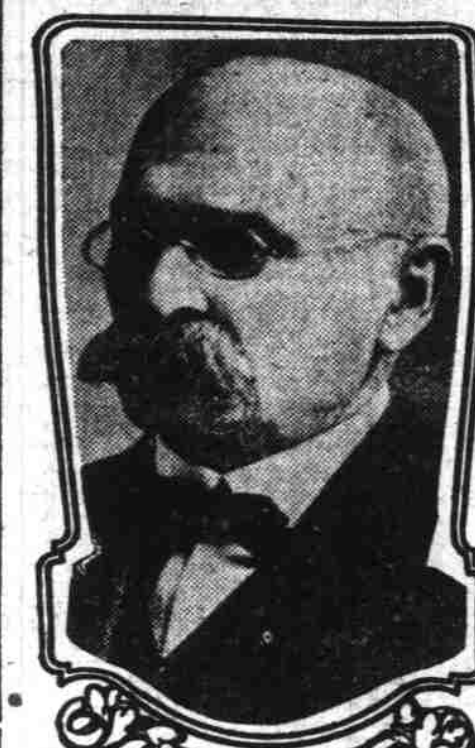
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YARD FOREMAN A QUARTER CENTURY

Pendleton, Or., April 13.—Frank P. Rounds, who died Friday night at his home here, had been foreman of the local O. W. R. & N. yards for the last 25 years.

He kept the saddle for 14 hours without a rest. "We arrived safely. Now the Russians have retaken Tabriz, and we feel quite safe again. Just six miles from here 800 Kurds were killed, 500 taken prisoners, and about 500 escaped. The ground was strewn with their bodies. Because of their defeat we fear they will take vengeance on Maragha, but we cannot tell. As yet, the Russians are not strongly enough enforced to go down to Maragha. We do not know if they must wait until they are through fighting the Germans or not."

"Hundreds of refugees are fleeing through the snow barefooted. Many are dying from starvation. It is just too terrible. We are kindly cared for here by the Presbyterian missionaries from America."
