### SPEEDWAY PEOPLE TO TURN RACE MEET OVER TO CHARITY THIS FALL

Some Organization Will Be Given Right to Stage Event and Receive Profits.

#### HIGH CLASS NAGS COMING

Leading Horsemen of Northwest Take Up Reins As Weather Man Begins to Adopt Balmy Attitude.

To hold a monster race meeting and fair in Portland this fall, the entire profits to go to charity, is the plan announced by the Rose City Speedway association. It is planned by the association to turn the meet over to some organization, such as the Mutts, which may handle the money, paying the expenses and use the profits as deemed best.

The attractions planned for the opening week, beginning August 2, are high class, and will attract huge crowds, it is thought. Carnival companies, which show over the northwest during the fall, will come to Portland, and, together with a high class program of harness and running events, will no doubt make up a program which will excell anything ever held here, even in the palmiest days. Should this plan go through success-

fully, and there is little doubt but that it will, the fair will be held each year and the profits used for charitable purposes,

Leading horsemen from all parts of the northwest are in correspondence with the Speedway association, and high class racing stock will be seen in action in Portland this fall from Vencouver, B. C., Montana, Idaho, Washington and all parts of Oregon. As the Portland fair is on the northwest fair circuit officially this year there is little doubt but that the 1915 meeting and fair will be the most successful ever held in the Rose city. Word has been received from Baker.

Or., from C. W. Todd, well known horse owner and trainer, that he has a large stable of trotters and pacers, as well as some high class thoroughbreds in early spring training. Among them are Haltamont, a pacer which holds the Oregon record of 2:054, Bonnie Antrim, Aldine, Maurice S, and Sally Mint, the latter heading his string of thoroughbreds. Trainer Todd writes that all of his horses are in good early son trim and he expects to have a

Medford Horses Working.

Medford has several prominent horsemen who report that their pacers and trotters will be in good shape for the spring opening of the circuit in this city. Taylor brothers of that city have a large stable headed by the fast pacer King Seal, who has been seen in action at a number of meetings in this city. Georg Swischer, another Medford horseman, has in training a fine stable, among his best prospects being Hailie B, a pacing filly owned by Mrs.

Fred Brooker of Vancouver, Wash., is another trainer who is beginning early in the year to get his stable in shape, and he expects that a number of fast trotters and pacers, which he purchased last fall, will be the big money winners of the season.

At the Rose Vista track, east of Multnomah, Charles Gholson is conditioning a large string of classy steppers, headed by St. Elmo, a pacer, that has world of speed. He is also training Fred T. Merrill's string, which includes Red Hal, 2:10 1/4, the pacer that made such a creditable showing at the last fall meeting. A Hal B filly owned by Dr. Creamer also shows considerable promise.

At the Rose City Speedway in Rose City Park are a number of well known trainers, including John Sawyer with a classy stable; Harry Squires, whose stable is headed by a trotter called Dean Swift, by Almadon, with a record of 2:08. This trotter was recently brought down from Seattle, and reports are that Dean Swift will, if in proper condition, be a contender among the fast trotters of the coast.

Woodcook Has Large String.

Fred Woodcock, another Portland trainer, has a large string under his eye. Among the most prominent are Hal Paxton and Hal Norte, both owned by Weiss Bros. of this city. This pair of Hal Bs created somewhat of a sensation on the circuit last season and even a better year is looked for during the coming campaign by Trainer Woodcock. A 3-year-old Hal B pacer in this stable looks very sweet to many horsemen who have seen the side wheeler perform.

There are many other fine steppers whose trainers have not as yet re-ported their plans for the coming season, but who will no doubt have their horses ready for the Portland meeting.

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
