

STEAMER EUREKA IS CHARTERED TO CARRY LUMBER TO ATLANTIC

In Addition, Five Schooners Taken to Load for West Coast and Sydney.

LARGE ORDERS REPORTED

Other Vessels in Near Future May Be Secured to Transport Timber to Other Coast.

For trade between the Columbia river mill and the Atlantic seaboard the Cross-Western Lumber company has taken the big steamer Eureka on time charter for one year. The vessel, one of the largest lumber carriers on the Pacific coast, has been in the west coast trade under charter to W. R. Grace & Co. for the past year, and is now eight days out of Sydney. She will go to Norfolk or Baltimore for coal for San Francisco before taking up her new charter.

In addition to this charter five sailing schooners have been chartered for loading, either on the Columbia river or Puget sound ports, for the west coast and Sydney. Four of the vessels were taken by W. R. Grace & Co. for delivery at Callao, and the fifth by Comynn, Mackall & Co. for delivery to Sydney.

The Grace interests secured the Peruvian bark, Alcaza Bay, Alliance and Cavour and the Chilean bark, Comynn, Mackall & Co. took the Chilean ship Curzon for a trip to Sydney. Just how many of these vessels will be sent to the Columbia river depends largely on the condition of the lumber markets here and on Puget Sound. The Grace interests buy their lumber outright and it is said they have been able to purchase at the lowest prices on Puget sound of late than they could have. Lumbermen say that there is merely a difference between operating at cost and a few cents at local mills handling their material at cost or better, whereas the Puget sound millers have been cutting below cost to keep the mills running full time.

SMALLPOX DETAINS LINER

The Chiyo reported the smallpox case by wireless while on the way from Honolulu. She came from Honolulu, and her cargo was taken to anchor in the bay off her pier. Dr. M. W. Grover was sent aboard in the government tug Frodoquin.

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DISEASE EPIDEMIC IS A GREATER MENACE THAN ENEMY'S SHOT

Danger From Thousands of Rotting Bodies Facing Armies of Allies, Germans.

MINING IS CONTINUED

Great Offensive of the Allied Hosts Will Be Launched in Month, It Is Believed.

London, April 19.—(U. P.)—With spring rains heavy, drenching portions of the battlefield and the rapid approach of warmer weather, the allied and German armies are facing a greater menace than bullets and shells—the enemy's rotting bodies. The dread of epidemic due to the thousands of rotting bodies lying in the trenches is with the medical corps of every army.

Bodies Hastily Buried

On narrow ledges, hastily dug in the sides of the trenches, hundreds of rotting bodies are being hurriedly buried. The conditions are most favorable for the spread of disease.

Trench Fighting Continues

Where Kitchener and Joffre will strike first is problematical. The tests of the German positions, the Marais des Sables, near Neuve Chapelle, availed the allies nothing. The fact that the Germans were able to maintain their line in the face of the offensive is a serious indication of the terrible price that must be paid for success in the offensive yet to come.
