In the Pacific Northwest district and in the lake region, the Middle Atlantic and the New England districts, the temperatures have risen decidedly in the Red River Valley of the North. The conditions are favorable for fair weather in this district tonight and Thursday, preceded by rain tonight in western Idaho, which it will be cooler tonight in southern Idaho and frost will form Thursday morning generally throughout Oregon, Washington and Idaho.
