own state and municipal bonds. Present Rate Given.

The report advanced the opinion that the rate under present circumstances ought not to be in excess of 1½ to 2 mills per annum, or \$1.50 or \$2 on a security of a market value of \$2 on a security of a market value of \$1000. Present rates on this kind of property which classify it are: Connec-ticut, Pennsylvania and Rhode Island, 4 mills; Maryland, 4½ mills; Iowa, 5 mills; Wisconsin, one half to 3 mills."
