

PORTLAND'S HOCKEY TEAM STRENGTHENED FOR COMING SEASON

Recruits Who Are Being Lined
Up Carry Plenty of Beef for
Hard Campaign.

OLD PLAYERS TO LEAVE

Probable Advent of Seattle Will Give
Fans More Games; Drafted Players
Will Go There.

Portland fans are going to have one of the fastest hockey clubs that money can procure to represent them in the Pacific Coast Hockey association for the coming winter season. The management of the Hippodrome is now delving into the hockey records of all the western hockey clubs looking for material to fill out the weak spots in the Portland team.

Any team a member of the Pacific Coast Hockey association has the power to sign up players in the western territory, which is west of Fort William, Ontario. Any player east of that city comes under the jurisdiction of the National Hockey association and cannot be signed by a western club unless the eastern club waives on such player. The Pacific Coast Hockey association has had the power to draft three men every season from the eastern league.

Late last season when it looked as if the agreement between the east and the west was to be disrupted because an eastern club played a player who refused to report to the coast league, President Quinn of the Eastern league made the Coast league an offer of the privilege of drafting six men, which would mean one man from each of the clubs in the National association. This offer as a peace settlement was accepted and next year six eastern stars will be wearing the uniforms of the coast league.

Seattle Is Coming In

By all accounts Seattle is to be in the league, which will mean a four-team combination composed of Vancouver and Victoria representing the Canadians and Portland will have Seattle as a running mate in upholding the American end. A four team league will add greatly to the interest in hockey. Seattle will have a strong lineup to represent them. A majority of the men secured by the Coast league through draft will go to the Seattle team.

The Vancouver team will be kept in line. Taylor has notified his intentions of hanging up the stick and telling the future generation what a fine player he was when he quit the team. It is no doubt he will be found out on the ice again, crouching and turning with that dexterity which keeps the opposing team wondering what he is going to do next. Cook, the big defense player, who performed on the wing after Manager Patrick donned a suit, has returned to the team for a summer and the strenuous pastime of working hay and oats will tend to keep his muscles in trim. McKay has returned to his home in Ontario, as also has Lehman, the Vancouver net guard, whose occupation is road contracting. All the rest of the Vancouver players are still on the coast.

The Victoria team is in for a shake-up. The team held together for three years and won two championships, but last winter they took a bad slump. Manager Patrick is looking for three forwards and a couple of defense men and by the time that the season is ready to open he will have a good lineup in sight. For the last two seasons he has been his best but by the way the big fellow traveled when he performed with the local club against the Vancouver team. It is a pity if he was just starting in his career instead of finishing it. In the first game he scored five goals and got three assists to his credit, which was more than some of the players had credited to them all season.

New Recruits to Lineup

The Portland team will have several new faces on its lineup. The management will probably spend the money which it would have to pay for drafting players as transportation expenses of young players who figure that they have a chance to make good in professional hockey. To win a championship takes a lot of practice and, coupled with the experience of a few older players. With Johnson and Rochon on the defense, the Portland team will have a brace of defense men hard to equal. Rochon has written the management stating that he is in good shape again and that he was not troubled him for some time. Rochon is a cool, heady player, a heavy body checker and also a very clean player, who seldom comes under the eyes of the officials.

Mitchell will have opposition in the nets. On the former team he will be three or four new men trying to do the veterans out of their jobs.

The new recruits will carry a lot of beef which will enable them to stand the hard bumps. Some of the new players who are expected to report are Ole Hawes, the Chalmers, Mch, wonder, and Delores Chaput, the fast skating Frenchman of the same team. Alf Harbour of Blainmore has already come to terms. Chalmers are Jimmy Leach of Prince Albert, who was the leading scorer in the Northern league; Clem O'Laughlin, a defense man of the Winnipeg Amateur championship holders of the Mann cup, and Bill Adams of the Port William team, the leading scorer in the Amateur cup games. played against Winnipeg. Adams is a big man weighing in the neighborhood of 180 pounds. He is fast on his skates and was one of the hardest checking forwards in amateur circles. Strings are out for several other men from the boundary country as well as the material in eight or ten other up last year's team. Portland should have a septet that should represent the coast in the next world's championship series.
