

This record was set in the second event of the day, with the Parsons Special first. time 13 minutes and, 45 seconds flat. Schneider's Special was second, and the Gordon Special, with Frank Elli-ott at the wheel, third. The Velle No. 4, that won most of the class B events last week, was given the go signal 50 seconds after the first car had left the tape in a 10 mile drive. Fred Forbes, in his Buick, got away second in this event, but soon overtook the Marmon. After once gaining the lead, Forbes was never headed and finished a quarter of a mile ahead of the Velic. The time made in this race was 10 minutes and 19 seconds. Just after the third race, a 15 mile class B handicap, had gotten under way, the rain began to fall in torrents and H. L. Keats, western representa-tive of the American Automobile association, and Frank Atwell, referee, conferred, and deemed it advisable to call the meet off. They gave W. L.
