BILL RODGERS GETS RELEASE FROM NAPS; M'CREIDIE WIRES HIM

Manager McCredie Tipped Off by Cleveland Coast Star Is Free.

HE CAN TAKE OLD PLACE

Returns of Captain May Mean That Stump Will Be Sent Over to Shortstop Position.

San Francisco, May 10.—(U. P.)—Bill Rodgers, who went to the Cleveland Americans from the Portland club of the Pacific Coast league, has been unconditionally released by Cleveland, according to information received today by Manager McCredie of the Beavers.

McCredie said he would telegraph transportation to Rodgers immediately, so the fast second baseman could take his old place in the Portland lineup within a few days.

Rodgers was captain of the Beavers for three years and his loss was keenly felt by the "champions."

If McCredie is successful in securing his former minor league star second baseman it will undoubtedly mean that Bill Stump will be shifted over to shortstop and Bobby Davis will be sent to the bench. Just where Milton Reed figures in remains to be seen.

In order to cut down to the player limit it is likely that Murphy will be released, as he has no chance to break into the Portland outfield with Hilliard playing good ball. Lober striking his old clip and Speas going merrily along.

Walter Doane is a slow starter and it is hardly likely that Mac will let him go in favor of Murphy. Davis, too, is hitting the ball pretty well now, and McCredie is facing a delicate problem.

Stump can play a good shortstop, as he has a great arm. Rodgers on account of a weak arm can play only third base.

Of the three infielders sent up by McCredie this year, only one, Dave Bancroft, has made good.
