

PERSONS WHO BUY MILK MUST KNOW BUTTER FAT TEST

New Law Provides That After May 22 Creameries and Others Must Have License.

WILL TEST GLASSWARE

Proof of Qualifications and Payment of One Dollar Are All That Is Necessary.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Or., May 12.—Every creamery, shipping station, factory for the manufacture of dairy products and all other firms or persons buying milk on a butter fat basis are required after May 22, next, to secure a license. This is one provision of the statute enacted by the recent session of the legislature as H. B. 207, which also provides that all glassware used in making the tests shall be inspected, and if found conforming to the requirements of the law, branded with the letters S. G. O. meaning standard glassware Oregon. Licenses may be secured upon application to the state dairy and food commissioner and presenting to him a certificate of proper qualifications, and upon payment of the one dollar license fee. The certificate of proficiency is to be obtained by passing an examination prescribed by the chief of the dairy department of the Oregon Agricultural college and receiving a certificate signed by said chief. Examinations for these certificates will be held at the college or at other points named by the examining board, notice of which will be made by circular letters and through the press. Tests will include demonstrations of ability of applicant to make butter fat tests, and a written examination of the composition and contents of milk, and methods of handling milk and cream.

Persons or firms engaged in the purchase of milk on the butter fat basis for dairy manufacture may send their glassware to the college dairy department by express, postage or freight charges prepaid, and receive a fee of three cents for each article must accompany the shipment. The ware will then be examined and if found correct stamped indelibly with the proper inscription and returned to the owner. A letter will also be sent to the owner showing the number of articles inspected and the result. The provisions of the law together with explanations of its effects and operations, have been issued by the extension division of the college. It was written by Professor E. B. Fitts, field dairyman of the college, and copies may be had on application. In the same publication Professor Fitts gives methods of taking samples, making the test and other facts of value to those engaged in the purchase and manufacture of dairy products. Hotel restaurants and others using the milk in the home do not come under the provisions of the law.

Man Who Gave Beer Appeals Case

Salem, Or., May 12.—H. D. Trover, photographer, yesterday convicted of giving two glasses of beer to a friend, today took an appeal to the circuit court, and will test the constitutionality of the ordinance making it a crime to give any one not a member of the family a drink of beer or liquor. Trover conducts a long established and successful studio, and there was no evidence that he ever sold any beer or liquor. His action in appealing was urged by many Salem people who contended that the ordinance is an invasion of their rights.

Salem Water Rates Have Been Reduced

Salem, Or., May 12.—Following the filing yesterday of a complaint with the state railroad commission and a storm of protest from patrons all over the city, the Salem Water, Light & Power company today announced that it would charge only for acreage irrigated, with a minimum of 3000 square feet, instead of for all the lots a water owner had in the irrigated area, as had been attempted.

Mazrousky Reports Violent Attack

Henry Mazrousky, a junk dealer of Sixth and Main streets, reported to the police this morning, that while he was buying junk in the country back of Vancouver yesterday, a man who worked for him until two weeks ago, attacked him, and after beating him almost to insensibility, robbed him of \$11.20. The assailant was traced to Portland by Mazrousky. The man is described as being at least 60 years old, and not over five feet tall.

I. S. Cobb, Writer, Ill in New York

Condition Was So Alarming Sunday That It Was Feared He Would Not Survive the Night. New York, May 12.—(I. N. S.)—Irvin S. Cobb, the writer, is seriously ill at Polytechnic hospital. He was taken to the hospital May 5, and at times his condition has been alarming. It was stated today that he was much improved. On Sunday night, it was learned, physicians considered the situation so grave that Mrs. Cobb was called to her husband's bedside. It was thought that he could not live through the night. Since then he has been slowly gaining ground and his improvement yesterday was marked. Several specialists have been in consultation.

Salem Man Fears For Wife's Safety

Howard S. Damon Wires Police of San Francisco to Prevent His Wife From Jumping Into the Bay. San Francisco, Cal., May 12.—(U. P.)—A telegram was received by the police from Howard S. Damon of Salem, Or., who said he had feared his wife had gone to San Francisco to drown herself in the bay. Damon declared his wife left home several days ago after having threatened to end her life.

Paderewski Helps Polish War Victims

New York, May 12.—(I. N. S.)—Ignaz Jan Paderewski, the pianist, who has come to America to organize relief for Polish victims of the war, has issued the following statement: "An area equal in size to the states of New York and Pennsylvania has been laid waste. Two hundred towns, 1400 churches, 7500 villages have been completely ruined. The loss in property destroyed is \$2,500,000,000."

Manufacturers Told Of Deferential Law

George D. Lee, secretary of the industries and manufactures bureau of the Chamber of Commerce, is sending out letters to Oregon manufacturers and producers to the 5 per cent differential law, which will become effective May 22. This law provides that all public bodies, in letting contracts for public supplies or equipment, may favor Oregon manufactured goods to the extent of 5 per cent. This means that on a \$10,000 contract, if an Oregon manufacturer bids within \$500 as low as an outsider, the contract could be awarded for the Oregon made goods.

Livestock Industry Discussed at Dinner

Matters pertaining to the welfare of the livestock industry of the Pacific northwest were discussed at the first monthly dinner yesterday at the Transit house, North Portland stockyards. C. C. Colt, president of the Union Meat company, and O. M. Plummer, secretary treasurer of the Union Stockyards, discussed cooperation among livestock interests while George Lee talked regarding the advertising part of the industry.

School Cornerstone To Be Laid May 21

With appropriate ceremony the cornerstone of the new Shattuck school building, College and Park streets, will be laid at 2 o'clock on the afternoon of Friday, May 21. The new building will cost in the neighborhood of \$170,000, and is designed with the most modern conveniences for school work. It will have a big swimming pool and shower baths. Arrangements have been made with the city authorities to supply the pool with water, in return for which the public will be permitted to use the pool at hours which will not interfere with its use by the students.

SALE OF JERSEYS AT INDEPENDENCE IS DECLARED SUCCESS

Polk County Stages Its First Event of Kind and Bids Are High.

Independence, Or., May 12.—The first annual sale of the Polk county Jersey Cattle club was held in a large tent near the Southern Pacific depot in this city on Wednesday and Thursday. Many Jersey breeders from distant states, some coming from as far as Iowa and Illinois, were in attendance. The sale was a record breaker, and the seating capacity of the tent on both days was overtaxed with eager buyers and farmers from Polk and adjoining counties.

The Williamette valley has for many years been recognized as one of the great Jersey regions of the United States. Polk county has more prominent breeders more Jersey cattle, more register of merit, and has won more A. J. C. C. medals and showing honors than any other county west of the Mississippi river.

Prize Show Record. The show records of the Polk county, Oregon, Jersey show, reach from the California state fair to the National Dairy show at Chicago. Polk county has several times brought home all the championships and for many years the Jerseys of this county have taken home most of the prizes at the Oregon state fair.

The records of the consignment of stock sold in this sale showed excellent combination of form and production to an exceptional degree. The fact that a number with official records of over 500 pounds of butter in a year were among the consignments showed that some of the best were put in this sale, and that most of the young heifers were from register-of-merit dams. Breeders from distant states found it an opportunity of purchasing quality cattle for their herds, as well as foundation blood.

Independence and Monmouth dairy men were the largest consignors. Clark Hembree had eight cows entered; Frank Loughery of Monmouth had entered six cows and two bulls; Guy Hewitt of Monmouth contributed 14 head to the sale. John Stump and son were the largest consignors, entering 35 head. The second largest consignor was W. O. Morrow of Rickreall.

Twenty head were sold from his herd. Other dairymen in Polk county who listed stock were: Frank Lynn of Perrydale, Ward L. Hall of Rickreall, Rose Nelson of Independence, W. F. Allen of Rickreall, and Fred Loy of Independence. Colonel D. L. Perry of Columbus, Ohio, was the auctioneer, and kept the bidding lively throughout the sale.

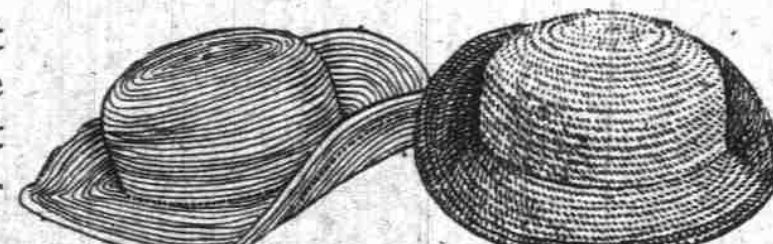
