P.)—With William Barnes Jr. scheduled to go on the witness stand this afternoon to testify in his \$50,000 libel suit against Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, the end of the trial was in sight. Barnes is determined to testify, despite the fact that his attorney claimed his evidence was not necessary. He felt a bad impression would result if he did not go on the stand.

NEWS OF NORTHWEST

Nearly the Limit. Albany, Or., May 13.—Howard F. Hazen, who was acquitted last week in the circuit court on a charge of taking part of a fallen woman's earnings, was convicted in the police court yesterday afternoon of running a questionable house and was fined \$100 and 30 days in jail, nearly the maximum provided for such cases. The case was appealed and Hazen is now out on bonds. The charge brought by the city authorities against Hazen was continued until the outcome of the circuit court case.

New Teachers at Klamath. Klamath Falls, Or., May 13.—Two more additions have been made to the staff for next year's term at the Klamath county high school. These are Miss Mabel Mears, domestic science instructor, and D. H. James, who will have charge of the manual training department. Miss Mears is at present teaching in the Medford high school, and Mr. James is of the Lakeview high school faculty.

Institute at Troutlake. Troutlake, Wash., May 13.—A farmers' institute, under the auspices of Troutlake Grange, will be held here May 15 when an all day session with a basket dinner at Grange hall will be enjoyed. Professor J. M. Price, A. L. Straus and Miss Mary Sutherland of Pullman Agricultural college will be in attendance to lecture on subjects of particular interest to this vicinity.

Marking Exam. Papers. Albany, Or., May 13.—Under the direction of County School Superintendent Jackson, correction of the largest number of eighth grade examination papers began Tuesday and it will be several days before the work is completed. The examinations were taken Thursday and Friday of last week in 102 schools of the county. Those assisting Mr. Jackson are Supervisors Barker and Penner, Professor C. G. Bigbee and Mrs. W. L. Jackson.

Smith Improves Herd. Troutlake, Wash., May 13.—Among those improving local dairy herds is O. J. Smith, who for years has conducted a general merchandise store here and who, at present, is interested in farming and dairying. He has recently purchased several head of pure bred registered Red Polled cattle and expects to become identified with the dairy business at this place.

Russell Is New Mayor. Marshfield, Or., May 13.—Elmer F. Russell was Tuesday elected mayor of North Bend by the city council to fill the unexpired term of L. J. Simpson, who resigned to make his campaign for congress. Russell had been postmaster at North Bend since 1907, until his successor was recently appointed by the Democratic administration.

Soldiers Home O. K. Roseburg, Or., May 13.—Colonel James Miller of Washington, D. C., a Federal inspector, spent Monday in Roseburg inspecting the Oregon soldiers' home. School at Pendleton. Pendleton, Or., May 13.—A summer school for teachers will be conducted in Pendleton this summer by Principal A. C. Hampton of Pendleton high school with the assistance of County Superintendent I. E. Young and other competent instructors. Already between 20 and 30 have signed up to take the work. The plans are to make the institution a permanent one as there is a demand for such a school.

Will Drain Marshes. Klamath Falls, Or., May 13.—Incorporation of the Klamath drainage district, which contemplates the reclamation of 21,000 acres of marsh land, has been completed by the approval of the organization's by-laws by the county court and the election of the following officers: President, Mr. Mot-schenbacher; vice president, C. R. DeLap; secretary, A. A. Mehaaffey; treasurer, L. F. Willets. The project to be undertaken by the district is the drainage of lands around lower Klamath lake.

Physicians Meet at Ashland. Ashland, Or., May 13.—The Southern Oregon Medical association held its annual meeting and banquet at Ashland Tuesday. The district represents all south of Roseburg. Dr. Jones of Portland read a paper, Dr. Calvin White of Portland was also present. All southern Oregon towns were represented by members of the association. Roseburg was selected as the next place of meeting, on the second Tuesday in April, 1916. Asks Mere \$25,000 As Week's Salary. Charlie Chaplin, "Movie" Comedian Says He Will Appear for That Sum 30 Minutes Daily.

Los Angeles, May 13.—(P. N. S.)—Twenty-five thousand dollars per week with 30 minutes constituting a day's work.

This was the offer Charlie Chaplin, famous "movie" comedian, today telegraphed his lawyer in New York to accept for him. Chaplin was offered \$25,000 per week to appear at Madison Square Garden for two weeks. It was understood New York capitalists plan to make Madison Square Garden into a moving picture theatre and desire Chaplin's presence to advertise the opening, appearing 30 minutes each day.

Submarines Will End War, Says Lake

Builder of First American Submarine Fredriks Germany Will Soon Leave England Out by Torpedo Warfare. Bridgeport, Conn., May 13.—(U. P.)—Forecasting an early end to the war as a result of German submarine activities, Simon Lake, inventor and builder of the first American submarine, today defended torpedo attacks without warning on merchantmen such as the one which cost 1100 non-combatant men, women and children their lives on the Lusitania.

"It is impossible for the submarine commander to warn the vessel he is about to attack," said Lake. "In order to do that, he would have to rise to the surface, open his conning tower and appear in full view in the open, a short distance from the ship's decks. In that case a rifle shot would end the career of the submarine. "German submarines such as the one which sank the Lusitania are going to end the war by stopping Great Britain's commerce. I learn Germany is building 150 more submarines. I think that Grand Admiral von Tirpitz will make good on his threat to starve England."

Girl Graduate Weds Doctor Just Divorced

Tacoma Father's Telegrams Get Answer That His Daughter Has Been Married in San Francisco.

San Francisco, Cal., May 13.—(U. P.)—Many telegrams were received here today from D. D. Outcalt of Tacoma, Wash., who was trying to learn details about the reported marriage of his daughter Beatrice, to Dr. Burton E. Paul, a Tacoma physician, who was visiting here. When informed of the marriage Outcalt expressed skepticism. He said his daughter was visiting San Francisco with her mother, that she was barely 18, and that he had heard nothing of any romance. Later he was informed of more circumstances and told the bride pair had started for a honeymoon trip to San Diego. Still unconvinced, he is busy seeking information.

Dr. Paul was recently separated from his wife. The bride just graduated from the Annie Wright Girls' seminary in Tacoma.
