University of Oregon, Eugene, Or., May 14.—In one of the most exciting political battles that the campus has ever witnessed, Lamar Tooze of Salem was Wednesday elected president of the student body, and Max Sommer, editor of the Emerald, both had strong competition. Sommer won by 29 votes.

The votes cast this year, over 600, was the largest number on record at the university. Anson Cornell, captain-elect of next year's football team, received the largest number ever cast for a single person, 529.
