Council Crest (1100 feet)—View unequalled, Columbia and Willamette rivers, Multnomah valley, Willamette valley, the gorge of the river, five snow-capped mountains (north to east on clear days). Rainier, 14,000 ft. St. Helens, 9097; Mt. Adams, 12,507; Mt. Hood, 11,225; Mt. Jefferson, 10,522.
Washington Park, at head of Washington street. Flowers, shrubs and trees. Children's model playground. Noteworthy pieces of sculpture: "Coming to the White Man" by Herman Atkins McNeill, presented by Mrs. L. D. Thompson; "Sacajawea" (Indian girl, guide of Lewis & Clark expedition) by Alice Cooper, presented by Sacajawea Statue association and Henry Altman. "The Miner" walk.
Sunken rose garden in east part of city, containing more than 100 varieties of roses. Macleay, left untouched in wild native beauty. High trees, just the woods "where rolls the Oregon."
Forestry building—Lewis & Clark exposition grounds, west. Hours 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. Built of specimen mammoth Oregon fir logs. Contains 1,000,000 feet lumber.
Attractive views from King's and Willamette Heights and Westover Terraces.
Terwilliger boulevard, south of city, above Skyline, on west side.
Road around spur between Council Crest and Willamette river offers fine views of city.
Columbia and Willamette—Eucelre Peninsula district and St. Johns, affording excellent views of city, industries and harbor.
Typical home sections—Portland Heights, Nob Hill, Irvington, Mt. Tabor.
