Norwegian Bark Birtha Was Wrecked on Reef in Atlantic-Eight Believed Dead.

NORTH PACIFIC LOSS BIG

War and Shipwreck Take Toll Seven Vessels Since Cereal Shipping Season Opened.

Seven members of the outbound fleet of North Pacific grain carriers, four of them from Portland and three from Puget sound, have been wrecked before reaching the United Kingdom. The latest, the Norwegian bark Birtha, Captain Larsen, was wrecked recently on a reef 40 miles north of Old Providence and some of her crew were landed in Colon yesterday by the British bark Reliance,

Captain Larsen and seven sailors, who left the vessel and are believed to have attempted to reach the island of Jamaica in a small boot, are believed to have been lost.
The Birtha was laden here by

Strauss & Co., the Northern Grain & Warehouse Co. acting as agents. She carried 83,870 bushels of wheat, valued at \$125,085. She was a vessel of 1344 tons net register.
The Birtha sailed from here Febru-

ary 18 and was the first sailing ves-sel to attempt to go by way of the Panama canal. She made the canal April 27, 68 days out of the river.
