New York, May 27 .- (U. P.) -After having been transferred four times to different vessels at sea, the passengers of the Holland-American liner Ryndam, which was rammed by the freighter Cuneo off Nantucket yesterday, arrived at Hoboken pler today. They had been sent first to the Cuneo, when it appeared that the Ryndam would sink, then to the United States battleship South Carolina, later to the tug T. C. Millard and at quarantine back to the Ryndam.

The liner is in the lower bay, he

pumps having worked all night. The Cunco reached quarantine at 8 a. m. today. There was no panic on the Ryndam following the collision at sea, according to the story told today by D. de Bos, purser of the Ryndam.
"I was in my bunk at 2:55 o'clock
Wednesday morning, when I was
awakened by a shock," he said. "It
was not severe. I dressed quickly
and ran upon deck. There the steel nose of the Cuneo was sticking far into the hull of the Ryndam. It was just at dawn.

"We aroused the passengers and assembled them on deck and as a precaution got them into the fifeboats. The Cuneo then backed out of the hole and a little later we put the passen-gers on board the freighter. There was no confusion and no panic of any kind.
