

CAVE WOMAN, DUSKY SLAVE AND COLONIAL DAME RUN TOGETHER

Broadway Gets Glimpse of Odd Parade as Women Scurry Out of Heilig.

MIKE ROGOWAY IS AMAZED

Head College Students, Rehearsing for "Everywoman's Road," Find Street Appearance Necessary.

Out of the front door of the Heilig this morning at 11:10 a cave woman ran. She turned to the left and kept running.

Mike Rogoway, manager of The Journal barber shop, in which door he was standing across the street, knew she was a cave woman. Her feet were bare, her dress was skins, her hair blew free. He couldn't remember having seen a cave woman before. Perhaps he had the faintest memory of one of his own earlier incarnations.

Anyway, he knew, but before he recovered enough to exclaim, out ran a splendid colonial dame, skirts flutter and powdered coiffure bare to the drizzling rain. She too turned to the left in her flight.

Right behind her came a brown armed maiden with a big jar, and she turned to the left and scurried up the street. She looked like an Indian, and Mike couldn't make her out exactly, but she was really an Egyptian slave of the kind that carried water to the male slaves that built the pyramids.

And then came a deuce of women, every one different, and only one that looked at all modern or American was

a girl in shirt waist and neat black skirt. She looked like a telephone girl, and that's what she was. They ran.

They all turned to the left, and ran. When they got to the corner smoking room entrance of the theatre they all turned again to the left, some slipping on the wet sidewalk, and ran in.

Other people besides Mike Rogoway stopped to see the strange parade.

For a pageant it was, or part of one. The women were characters in Miss Josephine Hammond's pageant-play, "Everywoman's Road," which will be produced by Reed college students at the Heilig June 1 and 2.

The days of the production they will do just as they did today. They represent the evolution of woman from the dim dawn of her spiritual consciousness to the present, when she is asking and taking her "place in the sun" as a spiritual and economic entity.

The characters came up from beneath the stage, bearing their burdens, passed across it and down along one of the aisles to the rear lobby, just

as they will do in the real performance. Rather than have them stay there for the rest of the play, Miss Hammond will have them go out as they did this morning, in at the corner entrance and along the side corridor to the rear of the stage.

There was a complete rehearsal today, with the essentials of the settings in place and the 120 women actors in costume.

Aberdeen.—Writing from Siberia on a postal card, in the Austrian language, Martin Reimer, aged 23, tells Mr. McAlpin, Mrs. Adolph Sahlhoff of this city, that he is held a prisoner by the Russian government and is in need of necessities.

Tacoma.—Rev. J. A. Sutton, recently forced to resign under fire from the First Baptist church here, following sensational charges made by Doris McAlpin, 16-year-old daughter of Rev. Mr. McAlpin, associate pastor, will return to Tacoma to establish an independent church, according to friends.

Centralia.—Hoss & Timmerman, local realty dealers, report a deal closed Wednesday whereby the Charles Smith place on Fords Prairie, west of this city, is sold to Charles Johnson of Kirkland, the sale price being \$15,000.
