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## Companies Must Return Premiums

Salem, Or., June 5.—Judge Galloway  
today directed the Mutual Fire com-  
pany of Portland to pay unearned pre-  
miums to the receiver of the Oregon  
Merchants Mutual Fire Assurance as-  
sociation and Horticultural Fire Re-  
lie association, in the holding that mutual  
insurance companies are required by  
law to return unearned premiums.

The two companies insured in the  
Portland Mutual and Receiver were  
cancelled the policies when he took  
charge.

Attorney Donald Miles, acting for  
the receiver of the Dramatic club  
claims, applied for an order for the  
return of the unearned premiums, as-  
serting that mutual companies cannot  
make the law by paying unearned pre-  
miums when the policy is cancelled.  
The Portland Mutual company re-  
fused to return the premiums to the  
receiver.

## Russian Lines Near Przemysl Strong

Military Expert Says No Danger of  
Czech Army Being Torn Apart if  
Dnieper Line Remains Intact.

London, June 5.—(U. N. S.)—The  
military expert of the Times, discuss-  
ing the fall of Przemysl and its effect  
on future operations, says:

"The Dnieper line is at present, so  
far as we know, intact, and Miskolc  
is in a strong position. So long as the  
Dnieper remains intact and no serious  
charges occur on the San and  
Himskow rivers the Russian position,  
although gravely menaced, remains de-  
fensible. There is no immediate dan-  
ger that the Russian front will be  
broken. The Russian armies driven  
apart. We can be sure that Russian  
reinforcements have reached Lemberg  
and that our sturdy allies, who are in-  
creasingly becoming Russian fighters,  
will compel their enemy to gain every foot  
of ground at immense cost."

"That the Russian line appears to be  
continuous along the fronts attacked  
and that the Italians are across the  
Isonzo will be read with interest. Three  
of the best Austrian army regiments  
have been annihilated by the Russians  
at Rudnik. It was expected that the  
Russian army would be driven back to  
back to its mountains when Italy took  
the field, but as this has apparently  
not been the case the Italian task will  
be facilitated."

## PROPOSED LOCATION OF WOMEN'S HOME MEETING OPPOSITION

May Grand Jury Hands Re-  
port to Judge Gatens; Rec-  
ommendations Are Made.

"We condemn the proposed location  
for the Home for Incorrigible Women  
on the ground of its nearness to the  
Multnomah farm," said the report of  
the May grand jury, handed to Circuit  
Judge Gatens this morning.

The grand jury recommended in-  
stallation of larger stanchions and fire  
hose at present thirty-fourth  
and pipe and hose is used, and two  
inches is recommended in place. Reopen-  
ing of the gate to the property and  
working of prisoners was advocated.

A new modern equipped hospital  
building is recommended. The grand jury  
said. The grand jury also recom-  
mended that the present building be  
used for the present building except for  
furnishing doors in places where fire  
protection would be aided. Equipment  
of a gymnasium and a room for the  
employment of a trained nurse to super-  
vise institutions for sick, infirm, de-  
pendent and dependent institutions  
was endorsed.

The grand jury returned an indict-  
ment against Gus Holzer with using  
an automobile belonging to John H.  
Sharp without permission, May 25.  
During the month of its existence, the  
grand jury returned 20 indictments  
and 12 not bills. One secret indictment  
and true bill were brought in this  
morning.
