

NEW FEATURES WILL THRILL SPECTATORS OF ELECTRIC PARADE

Entire Line of March Will Be Illuminated by Various Attractive Means.

UNIQUE FLOATS IN LINE

Jovians and Electrical Men in General Have Promised to Give People Some Surprises.

For the first time in the history of the Portland Rose festival, the electric parade, the great night feature of the fiesta, has been assigned directly to the electric fraternity.

"Through the cooperation of the members of the Portland Jovian league and the electrical men of the city in general, many new and novel features will be introduced into the parade to close the festival the night of June 11."

In addition to the magnificent electrical floats depicting the industries and the progress of the state, there is to be a commercial section. Electricity will illuminate the entire line of march. The Jovians request all electric signs be turned off while the parade is passing through the business section so that the full effect of the electrical decorations may be shown.

IRVINGTON TOTS TO GIVE MIMIC FESTIVAL PARADE ON SATURDAY

Three hundred Irvington children will take part in their mimic rose festival June 12, the day after the big festival closes.

The parade will rival those of the grown-ups in variety, will be as thoroughly organized, and real policemen will help Grand Marshal Porter Randall.



The float bearing Queen Elizabeth, 3 1/2 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George H. Cecil, with her six maids, will be drawn by six little girls. Doll buggies, pushed by their owners, will number 30 or more.

There will be 32 baby buggies, containing 32 babies, for there will be four pairs of twins.

There will be a big butterfly float with little girls, an umbrella float with little girls, a float with 16 boys as coachmen and 16 as horses, and a Ferris wheel float with little girls seated in the revolving boxes.

Besides decorated coasters, tricycles, pushbikes, children's automobiles and many other floats—for the lists are still open—there will be a whole garden of chrysanthemum girls, a flock of little Yama Yama girls, other little girls in Japanese costume riding in rickshaws and a company of Kate Greenaway girls.

Little Red Riding Hood, bearing her basket and afraid of no wolf, will be one of the character entries. Little Bo Peep, looking for her lost sheep, will be another. Charlie Chaplin will stride along just as he does in the movies.

Then there will be cowboys, clowns, frogs and shepherdesses. One young man will march along as Uncle Sam. With him, subject to his constant care, will be "Peace," a little girl riding a tricycle. They will

Musical Students to Compete in Contest

Miss Vera Kitchen and Albert Creitz will represent Oregon in Coast-Wide Competition at Los Angeles.

Miss Vera Kitchen, piano student, and Albert Creitz, violin student, were chosen yesterday afternoon to represent Oregon in a contest to be held at Los Angeles June 15 at which American-trained vocal and instrumental students will be selected to compete later in the month before the biennial convention of the National Federation of Music Clubs at Los Angeles.

The contest was arranged by Mrs. H. A. Heppner, president for Oregon of the Federation. Announcement of the contest was made about two months ago.

Miss Letha McBride and Miss Carmela Windle were voted second choice in the pianists' competition. Miss Kitchen and young Creitz, who is but 16 years of age, announced at once that they would make the journey to California to enter the final tryout, in which students from all parts of the Pacific coast will compete for the main event in which four vocalists, four violinists, four pianists will take part.

Miss Kitchen's numbers in yesterday's contest were Beethoven's Sonata, op. 31, No. 2; "Woodland Sketches," MacDowell, and "Echo de Vienne," Sauer. Creitz played Wieniawski's second concerto in D minor, Spanish Dance No. 8, by Sarasate, and "Masada de Concert," by Musini.

The judges were Lucien E. Becker, Waldemar Lind, Carl Denton, W. H. Boyer and J. L. Wallin.

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Arrested on Fraud Charge.

On complaint of F. M. Johnson, manager of a touring car service at Sixth and Washington streets, W. A. Garvin, clerk, was arrested by Detectives Price and Mallett on charges of defrauding Johnson out of \$21, said to be owing Rose Festival officials to have this a feature of the festival, the movement having been started six months ago. 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Linnton Merger Is Said to Offer Real Advantages

Any disadvantages which Linnton might receive through annexation with Portland would be more than offset by the advantages, according to O. M. Clark, president of the Clark & Wilson Lumber company of Linnton.

Mr. Clark, who is vice president of the Portland Chamber of Commerce and also president of the Oregon state commission to the Panama-Pacific exposition, is at San Francisco attending to fair duties, but took time to telegraph as follows:

"I believe Linnton taxes will be higher with annexation to Portland, but that in my opinion will be more than balanced by better government under city government and other advantages as to schools, water rates, parking system, etc."

But never in the history of Rose Festival has such careful attention been given to keeping the crowds in good humor and interested in the intervals between the big events.

Band concerts have been arranged at almost every hour of the day for this purpose, but receptions, glass chuin concerts, serenades, musical programs, street dancing and tribal dancing and ceremonies by Blackfoot Indians from Glacier national park are only a few of these entertainment features. It may be truly said of this year's fiesta that there will be music in air morning, noon and night.

Band Concerts Galore.

For example, Wednesday, the first day of the festival, there will be band concerts from 3 to 5:30 p. m. in Broadway and Yamhill streets, Sixth and Oak streets, First and Alder streets, East Sixth and East Alder streets, and serenading of all the principal hotels.

There will be similar concerts in the afternoon from 3 to 4 o'clock, and in the evening from 7 to 8 o'clock, and again from 10 to 11 p. m.

There will be concerts each day at the festival center, and band concerts will be given throughout Thursday and Friday at the points mentioned above, although at different hours in some instances than on Wednesday.

From shooting at Jennie station, marathon races and the Pacific Northwest Amateur Champion Track and Field meet are festival offerings to please lovers of sporting events.

Something Doing All Time.

The cruiser Boston will be open each day to the public and Spanish-American war veterans will find the fiesta of special interest in a reunion planned for Wednesday evening.

The festival center in the park blocks will be the scene of many varied attractions, such as rose exhibits, concerts, programs by schools and choral societies and community singing. From 8:30 o'clock Wednesday morning until past midnight Friday night there will be something doing every second.
