

SUFFRAGISTS REJECT PEACE PROPOSAL AT OPENING OF SESSION

National Body Tables Motion
to Patch Up Differences
With Congressional Union.

IS IN MID-YEAR MEETING

Veteran Leader Says Passage of Con-
stitutional Amendment Would Be
Beginning of the Fight.

Chicago, June 7.—(U. P.)—Leaders of the National Woman's Suffrage association in their mid-year conference here today tabled a motion to appoint an arbitration committee to confer with a similar committee from the Women's Congressional Union looking toward peace between the two organizations. The motion was tabled by a vote of 49 to 35.

Mrs. Henry M. Youmans, president of the Wisconsin suffrage organization, protested that "steamroller" methods were being used by the adherents of Dr. Anna Howard Shaw in the conference, but as a result of the vote today it is not likely that other peace proposals will be considered.

The result of the vote was a victory for state suffrage rather than the national plan of the Congressional Union.

The passage by congress of a constitutional amendment providing for woman's suffrage will be the beginning, and not the end, of the fight of the women of the country for the vote.

This view was expressed by Miss Alice Stone Blackwell of Boston, veteran suffrage leader and editor of the Woman's Journal, who addressed the conference at the La Salle hotel.

"Some people," said Miss Blackwell, "talk as though the only difficulty in our way was getting congress to pass an amendment to the federal constitution, but that is a mistake. Our real work will begin after congress has passed an amendment and submitted it to the states for approval or rejection. We shall have to carry 36 legislatures."

During the morning session Mrs. Medill McCormick, Illinois leader, addressed the delegates on suffrage work at Washington.

"That suffrage has a place on the political map," said Mrs. McCormick, "and national place of considerable prominence, was decided by congress' vote on the Susan B. Anthony amendment to the size of that vote and by the action of the rules committee in refusing to report our measure unfavorably after the election. The argument which defeated our amendment was the states rights argument."

Dr. Shaw, president of the association, welcomed the delegates at the morning congress.

Asks Shaughnessy
To Act for England

Vancouver, B. C., June 7.—(P. N. S.)—Announcement was made that Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, who has just reached London, went to England at the invitation of Lord Kitchener on the suggestion that Sir Thomas should take over the direction of Canada and the United States of the purchase of war supplies for the British government. It is understood that to some extent the purchasing department of the Canadian Pacific railway, of which Sir Thomas is the head, will be utilized by the war office.

Cooperative Cannery Planned.

McMinnville, Or., June 7.—The farmers of the Unionville neighborhood who are affiliated with the American Society of Equity are planning the erection of a cooperative cannery. Considerable small fruits and vegetables are grown in that section, and the farmers in the past have had a difficult proposition in disposing of their products. A committee consisting of H. A. Kerr, Sam Dixon and Mr. Wilson have been appointed to investigate ways and means of cooperation, canning machinery and kindred matters. It is hoped that a cannery will be in operation to handle a portion of this year's crop.

Married Near Sodaville.

Lebanon, Or., June 7.—Miss Laura Mae Miller, and Richard E. English of Weston, Or., were married at the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Sylvester Miller, near Sodaville. Miss Miller has been teaching school in this state for 10 years. After the wedding the couple left for a trip to the Panama-Pacific exposition, after which they will be at home at Weston.

Lawyers Not Increasing Fast

Carnegie Foundation Figures Show
Country's Number of Clergymen,
Physicians, Surgeons Has Increased.

New York, June 7.—The ninth annual report of the president and treasurer of the Carnegie foundation for the advancement of teaching, for the year ending September 30, 1914, shows a total endowment of \$14,260,000, a surplus of \$1,245,000, an annual income of \$746,000, and an annual expenditure of \$716,000. Of this, \$32,000 was spent in administration, \$47,000 in educational inquiry, and \$634,000 in retiring allowances and pensions.

During the year 23 retiring allowances and 15 widows' pensions were granted, the average grant being \$168. The total number of allowances now in force is 322, the total number of widows' pensions 106, the general average grant being \$1594. The total number of allowances granted since the beginning of the foundation is 555, the total expenditure for this purpose being \$255,190.

The study of legal education, undertaken at the request of a committee of the American Bar association, has resulted in the publication of a survey of the case system of teaching in American law schools, by Professor Josef Redlich of the University of Vienna.

While the number of physicians and surgeons in the country, now 157,000, and of clergymen, now 333,000, has recently increased uniformly with the population, the number of lawyers, now 122,000, increased only one third as fast as the population between 1900 and 1910, although it increased faster than the population between 1890 and 1900, from 89,000 to 114,000, and very much faster between 1880 and 1890, from 64,000 to 89,000.

W-O. Property to Be Sold at Auction

Chehalis, Wash., June 7.—Following an order recently issued by the federal court in Tacoma, the property of the Washington-Oregon corporation, operating a network of power and traction lines in that section, will be sold at auction at the Lewis county courthouse in this city on July 3. The company owns power plants on Coal creek, at Winlock and Kalama, and in Clarke county, and in addition to an interurban line between Centralia and Chehalis also operates an interurban in Clarke county. Its power service is continuous from Tenino to Vancouver, and in addition a number of lines are operated in northern Oregon.
