

GERMANS EXPECT TO BE IN LEMBERG AT END OF THIS WEEK

Teuton Forces Report They Are Aedy to Start Bombardment of Forts.

RUSSIANS STAND GROUND

Troops in Southeast Galicia Strengthen Lines and Are Rapidly Killing Off the Austro-Germans.

Vienna, June 8.—(L. N. S.)—(Via Berlin and Amsterdam)—German occupation of Lemberg is expected before the end of the week. Reports received here today say the Teutons are ready to begin bombardment of the forts.

Petrograd, June 8.—(U. P.)—Russian forces in southeast Galicia have reformed and strengthened their lines and are now inflicting heavy losses upon the Austrian and German armies. In front of the position of one division 5000 Austrian dead were abandoned by the enemy, following the Russian advance on Kolomoia and Nadvorna, an official statement announced today. In addition 720 officers were taken prisoner. The enemy was completely repulsed and thrown back upon his original positions.

Elsewhere in the southeast Galicia region the Austro-German forces have suffered similar rebuffs, it is declared. While it is admitted some units of General von Linington's army succeeded in crossing the Dniester, they are declared to have been engaged by the Russians on the north bank of the river, and to have been halted there.

On the northern front the war office announced the Germans are continuing their efforts to maintain an offensive in the region of Libau. Reinforcements are constantly arriving, but the Russian forces are generally holding the enemy in check.

East of Priemysl, the situation is officially declared to be unchanged, though dispatches from the front indicate the Austro-German army is advancing immediately east of the fallen fortresses toward Lemberg with comparatively little opposition. The Russians are retiring toward the defenses, which are being hastily strengthened for the stand which will be made before Lemberg.

during the Festival center: "Portland will witness a great floral display on the park blocks this week. Many of the professional displays are now in place. Community exhibits will be interesting and varied. The Festival center has been produced on an elaborate scale this year and will no doubt prove a pleasing feature for all."

F. W. Hild, second vice president and director of the electric parade: "This year's electric parade, the closing feature of the festival, will surprise both Portland people and the visitors in this city. It will be an electric pageant in every sense of the word. Besides the many beautiful floats depicting the industries of the state, there is to be a commercial section and special features staged under the auspices of the Jovians and the electrical men of Portland in general. The Jovians have devoted more than six weeks of hard work to make this parade a spectacular feature and there are many surprises in store for the crowds witnessing this procession Friday night."

Track and Field.

Charles F. Berg, secretary and director of athletics and special features: "We were indeed fortunate to secure the Pacific northwest amateur champion and track and field meet for the festival. It is a great honor and a great pleasure to have the meet in Portland. The course will be over the business streets. The roller skating marathon and afternoon will be one of the unique features of the festival program. George L. Baker, director of fraternal, military and industrial parade: "The big pageant of the festival will move promptly on time Friday morning. Fraternal bodies are ready and all orders to bring the military forces here were issued last week. We have many entries in the industrial division. This parade will be the greatest ever staged in the west and we have had the hearty cooperation of all fraternal organizations and business houses of the city. Governor Withycombe will ride his famous mount, 'Loretta,' at the head of the procession."

Contributions Generous.

H. L. Corbett, chairman of the finance committee: "Portland people contributed well to the support of the festival this year and we feel sure they will heartily approve of the program we will give them. We have incorporated every feature possible to give an entertainment covering the three days that would appeal to the visitors as well as Portland people in general."

Jacob Kanzier, director in charge of decorations: "All Rose Festival decorations are now in place. Broadway is to be the grand promenade and the lights will be turned on for the first time tonight. The Festival colors, red and white, have been used to advantage this year and we have decorated our decorations over as many streets as possible."

J. Fred Larson, chairman publicity committee: "If publicity was being the people to Portland they should be here by the thousands. The Rose Festival has never received more desirable publicity in its history."

Music to Be Feature.

S. C. Pier, director of music: "Music will be featured this year as never before. We have musical events of some kind every hour of the day. If the musical program for the three days were given in a Portland theatre it would require three days and three nights to cover the various features. The festival has had the cooperation of all musicians in the city in the work of assembling the various events for the festival."

O. M. Plummer, director children's parade: "The children's parade will move promptly tomorrow morning. The public school children are ready for their part in the fiesta. The features to be introduced into the parade this year will be the most attractive ever planned, and every resident of the city and all visitors should be on the east side tomorrow to witness this wonderful spectacle."

ment—20,220 yes, 8102 no; majority for, 12,118.

An ordinance to facilitate in the handling of grade crossing elimination projects by enabling the city council to handle several projects as a unit, thus doing away with a great deal of red tape and much engineering detail.

Dog pound amendment—19,582 yes, 11,292 no. Majority for, 8189.

An amendment giving the city council power to contract with the Oregon Humane society for the handling of the dog pound which at present is handled by the city. The terms of the contract are to be fixed by the council.

Jitney ordinance—21,132 yes, 13,977 no. Majority for 7155.

An ordinance regulating the jitneys and auto buses. The ordinance was passed by the council and referred to the people. The measure fixes the hours the jitneys must run, licenses them, regulates seating capacity, etc.

Firemen's pension amendment—Yes, 20,891; no, 9921; majority for, 10,900.

An amendment requiring temporary firemen to pay a share into the firemen's pension and relief fund and giving pensions to W. H. Whitcomb and

C. D. Shane, incapacitated members of the fire bureau.

Measures Defeated.

Measures on the ballot defeated are: Water meter ordinance—Yes, 15,755; no, 19,488; majority against, 3743.

An ordinance providing for the purchase of 5000 water meters to be installed for domestic and large services, to prevent waste and theft of water.

Sunday closing ordinance—10,561 for, 23,293 against; majority against, 12,732.

An ordinance providing for the closing of all grocery stores on Sunday. The measure was passed by the city council and then referred to the people when the referendum was invoked.

The ordinance had the endorsement of the Retail Grocers' association. Garbage collection system amendment—13,115 yes, 20,951 no; majority against 6036.

An amendment changing the \$75,000 bond authorization and gives the city council power to collect the garbage at municipal expense. The issue authorized in 1911 required the council to charge users for the garbage collected.

Awarded \$100 Damages.

Blanche E. McN. Moore was awarded \$100 damages yesterday by a jury in Circuit Judge McGinn's court in a suit against J. L. Fowler, H. H. Cole, George Peterson and T. S. McDaniel which has been at issue for six years and been once to the supreme court.

She sued for \$2500 damages because of removal by the defendants of a fence around a portion of a 10 acre tract she owns near Lewis. The removal of the fence resulted from a dispute as to her right to a strip

claimed as a public road and which would be a portion of Van Ness avenue at Gilbert road. She was non-suited the first time and the supreme court reversed the case.

Emperor William's Wardrobe.

Emperor William of Germany owns 295 different uniforms, but only wears 20 or 25, according to report. Sixteen valets, under the guidance of a grand marshal of the court, take care of the wardrobe. The emperor uses fawn colored note paper, sealing his envelopes with black wax.
