

PERIL OF BREAK WITH GERMANY'S DANGERS

Ambassador Gerard Reports He Has Delivered American Rejoinder and Tells of Its Reception in Berlin.

GERMANY WILL MEET MOST AMERICAN POINTS

Immediate Crisis Is Past but Extent of German Concessions Unknown.

Washington, June 12.—(U. P.)—Germany will meet the United States more than half way. She is ready now, officials are almost certain, to make material concessions to retain America's friendship. The officials who enjoy the president's confidence and whose opinions in the past have always been borne out by developments believe the immediate crisis in our international relations has passed.

The peril is no longer immediate. Whether Germany will accept America's demands in their entirety will not be known until the reply actually comes from Berlin. The president has demanded assurance that American lives will be protected and American rights recognized to travel where they will on the high seas.

Germany, it is stated, upon the highest authority, certainly will acknowledge a willingness to do this. That Germany will go so far as to agree that all merchant vessels on the high seas will be treated as neutral is not certain. It is believed that Germany will accept the principle of immunity from submarine attack in the case of neutral vessels. German Aviation Camp at Evero, North of Brussels, Raided and Hangar Fired With Bombs.

Paris, June 12.—(U. P.)—A German Zeppelin and five Taubes were destroyed and 19 German soldiers killed in a raid by allied aviators on the German aviation camp at Evero, north of Brussels, according to unofficial reports from Belgium tonight.

The Zeppelin and Taubes were inside a German hangar, the dispatches said. Allied birds, duplicating the feat of English aviators several days ago, rained bombs upon the hangar until it burst into flames.

Despite warnings from the German military authorities, the Belgian population of Brussels, hearing the news, rejoiced openly when news of the result of the air raid reached the city.

Makes Sensational Escape From Boat

P. A. Grimes, held prisoner on Transport Sherman, slipped down a rope from the top of the transport and was carried off \$25,000 in gold certificates.

Grimes, who is the wayward son of a wealthy San Francisco family, was captured by the Japanese in the Philippines two years ago from San Quentin, where he served a term for forgery. In San Quentin his conduct succeeded in securing for him the position of secretary to former Warden Hoyle.

After his release from San Quentin Grimes went to Shanghai, where he was arrested and held in prison. He fled to the United States and was captured by the Japanese in the Philippines.

British Steel Boat Sunk by Germans

London, June 12.—(U. P.)—The British steamer Leucra, a steel vessel of 2,027 tons, owned at St. John's, N. F., and engaged in the trans-Atlantic trade, was sunk by a German submarine today. The crew was picked up by the steamer William Mason and later transferred to a tug which landed the members in safety.

Attorneys Quit The Schmidt Case

Attorneys withdraw; not enough money in pot for defense of alleged dynamiters.

Los Angeles, Cal., June 12.—(U. P.)—Attorneys Horace Arnold and LeCompte Davis today withdrew from the defense of M. A. Schmidt and David Caplan, alleged accomplices of J. B. and J. J. McNamara in the dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times building. It was stated that there was not enough money in the defense fund to pay Appel and Davis. They will be replaced by Fred V. Moore of Los Angeles and Attorney Farrell of San Francisco. Caplan and Schmidt are in jail in connection with a murder charge.

In Answer to President Wilson's Message Mexican Constitutionalists Say Opposition to Him Is Beaten.

PROMISES TO CALL AN ELECTION BEFORE LONG

Declares One of Greatest Difficulties Caused by Lack of Understanding.

He expects, he says, in a short time to regain control of Mexico City and to submit to the president and to the people a list of questions to be decided as soon as he will resign his authority as chief of the revolution.
