

GOLF CHAMPIONSHIPS WILL BE OPENED AT 9 A. M. TOMORROW

Sixty-two Players Have Entered in Men's Amateur Contests at Waverly.

MUCH INTEREST TAKEN

Russell Smith of Waverly, Favorite in Men's Championship, Plays Sixteen Low Medal Scores.

Play in the annual Oregon State Golf championships will begin tomorrow morning promptly at 9 o'clock on the course of the Waverly Country club. The drawings and the starting time were announced yesterday by the club's handicap committee.

Sixty-two players have entered in the men's amateur championship qualifying round and it is expected that more will enter today. It is expected that close to 100 golfers will tee-off in this event.

Chandler Egan, ex-National golf champion, will not enter, according to word received today. As yet nothing definite has been heard of the Californians, who announced that they might participate.

There is more interest in this year's tourney than in any previous state championship play. Russell Smith of the Waverly Country club is the favorite in the men's amateur championship. The 16 low medal score players will qualify for the match play.

The qualifying round of the women's championship will be played Tuesday morning.

Baker Golf Club May Lose Links, Home

Baker, Or., June 12.—Baker golfers face the possibility of losing their course as the property now used for the golf links is in litigation in a foreclosure suit and its future disposition uncertain. The foreclosure suit was brought by Norman Elliott, holder of the mortgage given by the Hot Springs Land & Improvement company, from which the club leased.

If the links are lost through inability to release after the case is disposed of, the club faces the necessity of abandoning the new club house, tennis courts, natatorium, etc., and the direct loss of all the money invested. However, there is a possibility that some arrangements may be made although some of those at the head of the club's affairs are a little pessimistic.

ETIQUETTE OF GOLF

This Is the First of a Series of Articles on the Rules of Golf.

1—No one should stand close to or directly behind the ball, move or talk when a player is making a stroke. On the putting green no one should stand beyond the hole in the line of a player's stroke.

2—The player who has the honor should be allowed to play before his opponent tees his ball.

3—No player should play from the tee until the party in front has played its second stroke and is out of range, nor play up to the putting green till the party in front has holed out and moved away.

4—Players who have holed out should not try their putts over again when other players are following them.

5—Players looking for a lost ball should allow other matches coming up to pass them; they should signal to the players following them to pass, and having given such a signal, they should not continue their play until these players have passed and are out of reach.

6—Turf cut or displaced by a player should be at once replaced and pressed down with the foot.

7—A player should carefully fill up all holes made by himself in a bunker.

8—Players should see that their caddies do not injure the holes by standing close to them when the ground is soft.

9—A player who has incurred a penalty stroke should intimate the fact to his opponent as soon as possible.

GOLF NOTES

The national open golf championship will be played at Baltusrol, June 15 to 18. Amateurs will be given suitable trophies, while the entire \$250 prize money will be shared among the professionals.

The Edgewater Golf club of Chicago recently staged a "weight limit" tournament for its members. More than 200 players participated, the players weighing in at the first tee.

The classes were: Submarine, 145 pounds or under; Destroyers, 146 to 160 pounds; Cruisers, 161 to 190 pounds; battleships, 191 pounds or over.

Baltimore has the largest country club in the United States. There are 2683 members, with a waiting list of 150. Only 280 are non-residents and 150 juniors. The Baltimore Country club has a surplus of \$100,000, although it marks off several thousand dollars each year for depreciation. Last season its profits exceeded \$15,500, and at that its restaurant was conducted at a loss of \$9300.

OPEN GOLF TITLE IS FIRST TO BE PLAYED IN POTLATCH EVENT

Will Consist of 72 Holes, Medal Play, and Will Last Two Days.

WOMEN'S TITLE JUNE 29

The Qualifying Round of the Potlatch Tourney Will Be Started on Tuesday Morning, June 29.

The open championship will be the first event of the annual Potlatch Golf tournament, which will be staged under the auspices of the Seattle Country club June 28 to July 3, inclusive, according to the schedule of play announced by the tournament committee of the Seattle club.

The open event will consist of 72 holes, medal play. The first 18 holes will be played on the morning of July 28 and the second 18 on the afternoon of the same day. The third and final 18 holes and the women's championship qualifying round will be held on the following day. The qualifying round of the Potlatch tourney will be staged Wednesday morning.

Tuesday, June 29.—Open championship: 72 holes, medal play, 8:30 to 10:15. First 18 holes, 12:30 to 2—Second 18 holes.

Women's championship (for H. C. Henry cup): 10 to 11:30.—Qualifying round, 18 holes. Best 16 to qualify and continue at match play, 18 holes on subsequent days until first round.

Tuesday, June 29.—Open championship: 8:30 to 10:15.—Third 18 holes, 12:30 to 2—Final 18 holes.

Women's championship: 10 to 11:30.—First match round. The beaten eight on this round shall constitute the first flight.
