

COME ON BOYS, HERE ARE YOUR GIANTS AT 50 TO 1 MAKE A BET

Nothing but Miracle Can Win
Another Pennant for the
McGraw Team.

HIS PITCHERS SLIPPING

Matty Has the Old Brain But the Old
Arm Is Weakening—and
Marquard Is Erratic.

New York, June 12.—The Giants are a 50 to 1 shot for the 1915 pennant—just that and nothing more. Nothing but a miracle can win for them now. The Giants have just one real pitcher—Tesseraud. And no ball club ever won a pennant with less than three top-notch pitchers. Matthews is about through. The brain of the "old master" is as crafty as of yore, but the old arm refuses to obey the dictates of that brain. And the opposition has batted the feeble shots and slants to all portions of the lot on practically every start Matty has made this year. Now his arm is strained.

Marquard is erratic. One day he pitches a great game; the next day he performs like a bush leaguer. Ferritt was a winning twirler with the Cardinals, but he hasn't touched the 500 mark with the Giants. Stroud is showing up nicely but he can't be depended upon to win two thirds of his games. Schupp and Schauer haven't shown anything.

And these men constitute the Giants' defense, Tesseraud, a marvelous pitcher, the fast slipping Matty, the erratic Marquard, the in-and-out Ferritt and the unreliable Stroud, Schupp and Schauer.

Offensively the Giants do not show up much better. On some days they look like the greatest outfit of sluggers in existence; on others they act like a bunch of blind men. They hit in streaks and no streak-hitting club ever won the pennant.

Some Are Optimistic.

Some wonderfully optimistic Giant rooters still see a chance for the pennant. They point to the work of the Braves last year. They argue that the Giants can do what the Braves did. But how different is the situation! Last year the Braves had no one to beat out but the Giants. The New York outfit overshadowed every other club in the league up to July 1. Every other club was of the second division order. But this year there are at least four clubs that seem as powerful now as the Giants did in 1914.

The Cubs, Phillies, Braves and Pirates—and even the Brooklyn Dodgers—can give the Giants a mighty battle. No team has more than a 50 to 1 chance of winning the pennant. The Giants, in an attempt to climb from the bottom to the top of the National league heap would find the climbing at least 300 per cent harder than the Braves did last year. And, furthermore, the Giants haven't the power that the Braves had. Their Braves were aided and abetted in their achievement by the most remarkable pitching feat in the baseball world ever known. Three twirlers—James, Rudolph and Tyler—pitched in rotation week after week and pitched as no trio of men ever pitched before.

McGraw hasn't any trio to work as Stallings had. He hasn't got a Marquard or an Evers. His men aren't imbued with the same fighting spirit as were Stallings' men and, most important of all, he hasn't got the Stallings luck.

Breaks Saved the Team.

Good playing and marvelous pitching were mighty factors, but the most of the "breaks" saved the Braves from defeat and gave them victory. Day after day the gods of the game smiled on the Braves and victory rested upon them.

A pennant catching team must be well rounded—and was luck. A dozen well rounded—pitchers, batters, fielders, and a manager who knows how to manage. Their pitching department is the main weakness, but the catching department is not anything that should be envied. World Interest Is
Shown in Athletics

The increasing world interest in sports and athletics has been helpful in extending the foreign markets for American athletic goods, exports of which increased from \$473,337 in 1912 to \$711,111 in 1913 and \$738,113 in 1914. Shipments to the Philippines almost doubled—\$44,878 in 1912 and \$81,404 in 1914. To Japan the United States sold only \$941 of athletic goods in 1914, to China \$728 worth, the last item comparing with \$812 worth in 1912. This entire far eastern trade was stimulated by the Stockholm 1912 Olympic games and also the recent far eastern Olympic festival.

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RECORDS SHATTERED OR EQUALED IN THE SCHOLASTIC EVENTS

1915 Track and Field Season
One of the Kind on Record
in Northwest.

REVIEW OF THE CONTEST

Johnson Clears 22 Feet 6 Inches in
Broad Jump, Beating Former
Record.

The 1915 scholastic track and field season was one of the best on record in the northwest. Records were shattered or equaled in practically every meet.

The most sensational performers were Carl Johnson, a jumper and hurdler of the Lewis and Clark high of Spokane, and Pearson, a sprinter of the North Central high of Spokane, Ralph Spearow, a pole vaulter of the Lincoln high of Portland, and Reg Bullivant of the North Central high of Spokane, and Clarence Johnston of the Washington high of Portland, javelin thrower.

Johnson cleared 22 feet 6 1/4 inches in the broad jump, breaking the former northwest record held by Knapp of Oakesdale, by 3/4 inches, equalling the long standing Pacific coast record made by B. Chaplin of the Berkeley high school in 1902. Johnson's best time in the high and the low hurdles was 15-4-5 seconds and 26-1-5 seconds, respectively.

Coast Record Equaled.

Pearson equaled the coast and northwest record in the century dash and also tied the northwest record in the 220 yard event. His best time in the 220 yard run was 22-2-5 seconds, 2-5 of a second behind the coast mark.

Reg Bullivant set a northwest javelin throw mark by making a throw of 160 feet 2 inches, bettering the former record made a short time before by Clarence Johnston of the Washington high of Portland, by six inches.

In the pole vault, Spearow vaulted 11 feet 2 1/2 inches, establishing a new local Portland mark. The former record was 10 feet 8 inches made in 1913 by Robert Krohn of the Washington high.

Two inland empire runners, Walter Squires of Pullman and Morris of the North Central school, set new northwest marks for the quarter mile run by going the route in 52 seconds, eclipsing one-fifth of a second of the former record held jointly by Edward Springer of the Jefferson high of Portland and Pelouse of the Medford, Or., high. Springer and Pelouse made their marks this season, also.

Two Coast Records Tied.

In the distance events there were no good performers. Demmon of Jefferson, being the only runner who made good time in both the half and mile runs. With the exception of the javelin and broad jump record breakers, there was no consistent performers in the field events.

All told, two Pacific coast records were tied, three northwest marks were bettered, and two were equaled, one Oregon state mark was hung up and one tied and the tri-state records were smashed. On account of having no information regarding the meets held in Tacoma and Seattle it is impossible to state how many Washington records were broken or tied.
