

CORPORATIONS CAN'T RECOVER FEES PAID STATE DEPARTMENT

Attorney General Brown So Holds in Connection With Many Demands Made.

Salem, Or., June 21.—Attorney General Brown today held that foreign corporations which had paid fees to the corporation court in 1912 and 1913, under the provisions of a law requiring a graduated tax based on capitalization, cannot recover the fees so paid, although the law requiring the tax was declared unconstitutional by the Oregon supreme court in 1915.

The opinion was for Corporation Commissioner Schulerman, and means that all claims for refunds will be refused.

It was said today at the corporation department that probably \$100,000 was involved. Letters demanding the return of the money have been coming in from foreign corporations that have paid, and it is considered probable that a suit is contemplated.

No Business for Saloons in Nehalem

Valley Will Be "Dry," in All Probability, After July 1, Liquor Men Having Failed to Apply for License.

Nehalem, Or., June 21.—After July 1 the Nehalem valley will be as dry as a desert as far as saloons are concerned. The three saloons in the valley will close their doors on that date, probably never to reopen.

Unfavorable business conditions are the cause of the first of the saloons there have been four saloons in the valley—two at Nehalem and two at Wheeler.

About three months ago one of the places closed because of creditors and the remaining stock was sold by the sheriff. The proprietors of the other three saloons have been losing money since the first of the year and they will not venture another six months.

The closing of the big mill at Wheeler was a blow to the entire valley. It resulted in shutting down the logging camps in the district and three many men but many of the industries have suffered in consequence. The city councils of each city found no applications for liquor licenses at the last meeting.

This leaves both Nehalem and Wheeler city officials in a predicament. They had planned to receive the license money for some needed improvements on the streets and for repairs. Nehalem needs its \$500 license money, and Wheeler could use its \$275 to good advantage, but proposed work will now have to wait until after the next tax levy.

Wife of Warden Is Murdered in Prison

Body of Mrs. E. M. Allen, Formerly Los Angeles Comic Opera Prima Donna, Burned by Fiend.

Joliet, Ill., June 21.—(I. N. S.)—Suspected of the murder and cremation of Mrs. Edmund Allen, wife of the warden of the state penitentiary here, and before her marriage Odette Malaise Bourdeaux of Los Angeles, a comic opera prima donna, who was arrested as a convict, today was held in solitary confinement. A formal charge was expected to be made later.

Mrs. Allen's body was found in her bed in the warden's suite early yesterday. A wound in the temple gave rise to the belief that she had been wholly or partly strangled by a blow with a heavy water bottle found soaked to the bed, and her nightclothes soaked with alcohol and ignited.

San Quentin, Cal., June 21.—(P. N. S.)—Dr. William F. Burke, who is serving a seven year sentence for a crime to tempt to kill with dynamite Miss Luetta Smith and her baby, of which she says he is the father, was today paroled by the state board of pardon. Burke formerly conducted a sanitarium at Santa Rosa. Miss Smith was a nurse. Five years ago dynamite exploded beneath the tent in which she and the 11-month-old baby were sleeping. Burke fought conviction for three years and served a fortnight in 15 years old. The parole takes effect next month.

Superintendent to Practice Law?

La Grande, Or., June 21.—Efforts to prevent George T. Cochran, superintendent of water division No. 2, from acting as one of the attorneys for the plaintiff in a damage action against the Grand Ronde Lumber company for alleged damages claimed to have been sustained from defendant's defective engines in causing a fire, consuming plaintiff's grass and property along the right of way of the company's logging railroad, have failed. The case was previously set for trial today, but Saturday a motion was made to prevent Cochran from further acting as an attorney, his name having appeared on the papers filed in the case.

The lumber company's attorney claimed Cochran had no right to practice law while he was water superintendent. Judge Knowles ruled, however, that since Cochran had been admitted to practice in all the courts of the state, by the supreme court, and had practiced for years, both before and after his election as water superintendent, he had no alternative but to recognize him the same as any other attorney.

Cochran is senior member of the law firm of Cochran & Eberhard, and that firm recently secured the affirmation of a \$5000 judgment against the lumber company.
