

CITY HAS RIGHT TO LEVY ASSESSMENT TO PAY CORNELL PAVING

Supreme Court Holds That
Council Possessed Requi-
site Authority.

OTHER DECISIONS TODAY

Conviction of Fannie O'Donnell for
Selling Liquor on Sunday
Is Affirmed.

Salem, Or., June 22.—The supreme court today decided in favor of the city of Portland in the suit brought by W. E. and Hannah B. Robertson, to restrain the paving of Cornell street and to prevent the levying of special assessments to pay for the improvement.

Circuit Judge Morrow was affirmed and the opinion was written by Justice Harris.

The court holds that the council possessed the requisite authority for making the street improvement and for exacting the assessments complained of, and that the commission charter was broad enough to authorize the procedure.

The conviction of Fannie O'Donnell in Cook county on a charge of selling liquor on Sunday was affirmed by the supreme court. The opinion was written by Justice Eakin and Circuit Judge Cooke was affirmed.

Other decisions today were as follows:

State of Oregon vs. John M. McPherson, appellant, charged with larceny, appealed from Crook county, opinion by Justice Eakin; Circuit Judge Bradshaw's judgment for state affirmed.

Milwaukee Mechanics' Insurance company, appellants, vs. A. Ramsey et al., suit on a fire insurance policy, opinion by Justice Burnett; Circuit Judge Holmes' judgment for defendant affirmed.

School district No. 4 of Baker county vs. J. H. Neder, appellant, suit to quiet title to property, opinion by Justice Burnett; Circuit Judge Anderson's judgment for plaintiff affirmed.

Petitions for rehearing were denied in Evans vs. Marvin, Nielson vs. Portland Gas & Coke Co., Dale vs. Marvin, and original adhered to in Wolfers vs. Bechill.

W. E. and Hannah B. Robertson objected to the paving of Cornell road and the levying of the assessment for the improvement on the ground that the city had never legally acquired title and therefore had not a right to make the improvement. The street was hard surfaced and the improvement accepted last February.

Portland Wins in Suit Against Blue

Salem, Or., June 22.—The supreme court today decided in favor of the city of Portland in its suit against H. R. Blue and others, involving the re-assessment of the property of the defendants for the construction of a system of sewers known as Riverside sewer district.

Crew of Woodstock Car Is Held Up by A Masked Robber

A lone masked highwayman
held up the two members of the
crew of a Woodstock car at
East Fifty-seventh street and
Sixtieth avenue, the end of the
line, about 1 o'clock this morning,
relieving A. R. Keiser, the
conductor, of \$5.05 in small
silver.

Kaiser and B. Orvell, the motorman, were seated in one end of the car, eating lunch. The robber, his face completely masked, wearing a long gray raincoat, a soft felt hat, and carrying a blue steel revolver, entered the farthest end of the car, made the two street-car men hold up their hands, and then went through the pockets of the conductor.

After the looting he backed out of the streetcar, his run still pointed at the crew, and towards the Eastmoreland district. Conductor Keiser reported to the police that the man talked brokenly, and was probably an Italian.

adoption of the 1913 charter and that body still has the same right," says Justice Harris in his opinion.

The question of re-assessments for the construction of the Riverside sewer system has been in litigation for a number of years. Property owners protested against the assessment on the ground that all of the district affected was not assessed.

No Fraud in Sale of Restaurant.

Salem, Or., June 22.—The supreme court today reversed the judgment of Circuit Judge Galloway of Marion county in the case of William and Dora Black against William A. Irvin, in which the lower court had held that Irvin had practiced fraud in trading the Elite restaurant in Salem to the Blacks for a farm owned by the plaintiffs, located near Silverton, and rescinded the sale.

It is found by the supreme court that Black had ample opportunity to discover the defects he alleges now before the sale of the property. In reviewing the case Justice Bean points out that the capital city inaugurated a no-saloon policy November 30, and that Black took possession of the restaurant January 1.

The restaurant had been closely connected with a beer saloon and served liquor to those who desired it with its meals.

The restaurant naturally lost trade under the new order of affairs.

Housman Verdict Partly Affirmed.

Salem, Or., June 22.—The supreme court today conditionally affirmed the judgment of Circuit Judge Davis of Multnomah county in favor of the plaintiff in the action of J. H. Housman against J. H. Peterson, in which the plaintiff got judgment for a beating administered in Portland, and ordered that if within 10 days the plaintiff will remit the amount claimed for special damages, the judgment will be affirmed as to the residue of \$800, and if he fails to do this the judgment will be reversed.

SILVERTON VOTES ON POSTMASTER; CUSITER BEATEN BY BROOKS

Election Decided Upon, as
Best Means of Settling a
Long Drawn-Out Dispute.

Silverton, Or., June 22.—The long drawn-out controversy over the appointment of a Democratic postmaster for Silverton was brought to a close Monday when John H. Brooks easily defeated George Cusiter at a special election held at the suggestion of Senators Chamberlain and Lane.

The voting was confined to the people living within the corporate limits of the city and almost a full ballot was cast.

The result was: Brooks, 336; Cusiter, 169.

The senators have agreed to recommend the winner in the race for appointment as postmaster.

The election was decided upon as a means of settling the dispute when an amicable agreement could be reached in no other way.

Colbert Gale Dead, Following Operation

Colbert Gale, aged 60, died at St. Vincent's hospital at 7:30 this morning. Eight days ago he underwent an operation for cancer of the stomach. Death was due to hypostatic pneumonia. The funeral will probably be held Thursday afternoon from J. P. Finley & Son's chapel. Interment will be in Rose City Park cemetery.

Mr. Gale was born in Ontario, Canada, and had lived in Oregon 22 years. He was one of the first residents of Rose City Park. His business was that of buying and selling livestock.

Boy Coasting on Bicycle Receives Serious Injuries

Junior Bale, the 6-year-old son of J. Bale, manager of the Pacific Coast Biscuit company, was seriously injured at Twenty-sixth street and Broadway yesterday afternoon, when the bicycle on which he was coasting down Stewart drive, crashed into a Broadway car.

The boy was hurried headlong into the streetcar, in addition to numerous cuts and bruises, he was still unconscious at the Good Samaritan hospital at noon today, and he is believed to be suffering from a fractured skull. The lad's parents live at 835 Glenn avenue. The parents say that the accident was unavoidable and do not blame members of the crew of the streetcar.

He had a ranch in eastern Oregon, from which he came for the operation. He is survived by the widow, Mrs. Martha E. Gale, and three children, Arthur, George and Helen.

Sends Daughter to Grandmother; Dies

Salem, Or., June 22.—Leaving a note to Mrs. Fanny J. Bennett of Baker, telling her to keep secret the manner of her death from her daughter, Esmeralda, age 11 years, Mrs. Gladys Bennett, housekeeper at the Electric hotel, last evening swallowed six ounces of carbolic acid and died soon after. According to the police, she had twice before attempted to commit suicide with poison, the second effort being last Sunday. Her daughter is with her grandmother.

"I have sent my little girl to you forever," Mrs. Bennett wrote to the little girl's grandmother. "I know you will love and care for her. This is the only way."

Cabinet Considers Deficit.

Copenhagen, June 22.—(I. N. S.)—Berlin dispatches today state that no orders of merit have been conferred upon the commander of the submarine responsible for the sinking of the Lusitania.
