

DR. W. H. LYTLE IS MADE VETERINARIAN FOR OREGON STATE

Board Recommends That the
Quarantine Against Im-
port of Stock Continue.

Salem, Or., June 28.—The state livestock sanitary board voted at its meeting yesterday afternoon to recommend that Governor Withycombe issue an anti-foot and mouth disease proclamation prohibiting the shipment of stock into Oregon from Wisconsin, Michigan, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky, West Virginia, Maryland, Delaware, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, New York, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Vermont, New Hampshire, Maine, eastern portion of Iowa and four counties in Kansas and three in Montana.

The proclamation will succeed one now effective, which expires June 30. It was ordered that those cholera virus should not be used without permission from the board, and that the tuberculosis should be applied to all cattle offered for sale at public auction and at state, district and county fairs.

Dr. W. H. Lytle was renamed state veterinarian. Frank Brown of Carlton was elected president of the board, and J. M. Dickson of Shedd, vice president.

Leases Entire Floor.

Salem, Or., June 28.—D. M. Mier, agent for the Dodge, Overland and Mitchell automobiles, has leased the entire floor of the big R. R. Ryan building, South Commercial street, and will use it as a salesroom. The floor space will be 104 by 160 feet, and the space will permit the storing of 75 machines.

Oregon Halibut Banks Attract

Seattle, Wash., June 28.—(U. P.)—The recent development of halibut banks off the Oregon and Washington coasts is having surprising results, as indicated by reports to the local office of the bureau of fisheries. During the last 15 days of June there has arrived in this port from the new banks 385,000 pounds of halibut, more than half the total halibut supply received here during that time.

Before the development of the new banks, Seattle caught her halibut north, even as far as Alaska. Deriving the new supply from a point nearer means that fish industry will be given a great stimulus.

Medals Souvenirs Of Liberty Bell Visit

Philadelphia officials accompanying the Liberty Bell when it arrives here on Thursday, July 15, are to be presented with attractive bronze medals. Medals are also to be given members of the Portland committee handling the reception and ceremonies.

Such was the decision of a committee meeting yesterday afternoon in Mayor Albee's office. The medals are to be offered as souvenirs of the visit of the Liberty Bell and party to Portland. On the cross bar of the design selected are the words, "Presented by the City of Portland." To this bar is attached a red, white and blue ribbon, which carries a round medal the size of a dollar, on which is inscribed: "In Commemoration of the Visit of the Liberty Bell, July 15, 1915."

Prominent Democrat Laid to Final Rest

Funeral Services Held for George A. Hartman, Formerly of Pendleton, Who Died at Hot Lake Sunday.

The funeral of George A. Hartman, who died from heart trouble at Hot Lake, Sunday, was held this morning from the family residence at 753 Hancock street, with interment at River-view cemetery. The funeral was conducted under the auspices of the Willamette lodge of Masons, and Rev. O. W. Taylor of the Grace Memorial church read the Episcopal service. Many friends of the family, including former residents of Pendleton, Mr. Hartman's home for many years, witnessed the last rites at the residence. Only members of the family and close friends were present at the grave.

The active pallbearers were C. N. McArthur, A. W. Whitmer, A. W. Giesy, William Elliott, George W. Hason and T. C. Taylor.

The honorary pallbearers were Judge S. D. White, S. R. Wentworth, Major D. E. Hall, A. W. Nye, Thomas Warner and D. M. Taylor.

Mr. Hartman had resided in Portland since 1908 and was considered one of the leading Democrats in the state. Prior to coming to Portland he had lived with his family at Pendleton for many years. There he served as county clerk in 1888 and later served two terms as county judge. He was a native of Iowa and was 63 years of age. He is survived by a widow and four children, three sons, Ernest and Fred L. of Portland and George Jr. of Pendleton, and a daughter, Mrs. C. W. Meyers, of this city. His mother, Mrs. Jane Hartman of Pendleton, and four sisters also survive him.

He was a member of the Masonic lodge of Pendleton and of the Al Kader Temple, Order of the Mystic Shrine, of Portland.

Washington Militia Will Cruise.
Seattle, Wash., June 28.—(U. P.)—Carrying a crew of 150 men and officers the United States cruiser Albany will leave Seattle Thursday for the annual cruise of the Washington state naval militia. After spending several days in drill at Port Angeles, the Albany will leave, July 4, for San Francisco. Four days shore leave will be given the crew to visit the exposition. On the return trip the militia will spend three days in target practice at Port Angeles with five inch guns.

MARKETING PROBLEMS BEING CONSIDERED AT NORTH YAKIMA TODAY

Shippers' Council Asks That
Federal Representative Be
Sent to Help Growers.

North Yakima, Wash., June 28.—(P. N. S.)—Problems vital to the marketing of the 1915 apple crop of the northwest are being considered here today at a conference between the executive committee of the Northwest Growers' council and the board of governors of the Northwest Fruit Shippers' council.

The conference will close tonight with an open meeting to be attended by growers and shippers of the entire northwest.

At a meeting of the shippers' council board yesterday resolutions asking that a representative of the United States bureau of markets and rural organization be sent to the northwest to assist in marketing the 1915 apple crop were adopted. A uniform system of accounting for fruit sales to growers was also approved.

Efforts of W. H. Paulhamus, chairman of the growers' council, to bring about the adoption of a two bushel package of C grade apples were turned down by the shippers, on the ground that introduction of such a fruit box of packing would entail a heavy loss.

Superintendent Is Robbed.

Salem, Or., June 28.—Superintendent Hale of the state training school for boys, is today searching for Langford Foster, a negro boy of 15 years, who broke into Mr. and Mrs. Hale's room at night, stole \$15 and a gold watch belonging to Mrs. Hale, took property room keys and fitted himself with a new suit and made his getaway. Foster was a native of Texas and came here last year with the Barnum & Bailey circus. He was committed from Marion county.

Hurled From Auto, On Her Deathbed

Mrs. Mary Henderson, Making Dash to
Save Sister Before Her Death, Loses
Race When Accident Occurs.
San Francisco, Cal., June 28.—(U. P.)—Mrs. Mary Henderson is dying today, as a result of injuries received when she was thrown from an automobile in front of her home after safely making a wild automobile ride to the home of her sister, Mrs. Elizabeth Langford, who dropped dead in her apartment.

Mrs. Henderson was in Santa Cruz when she learned of the death of her sister. The breakneck automobile trip was made safely over the rough, mountain road to Los Gatos. Everything went well until the apartment was reached, when the machine skidded, switched against the sidewalk and turned over.

Woman Driver on Manslaughter Trial

Tacoma, Wash., June 28.—(U. P.)—Two Martini cocktails each and three bottles of beer consumed by Mrs. J. L. Warner of Seattle, and a woman companion shortly before the former ran over and killed A. J. Olsen, an aged rancher, according to the testimony of Leroy Herron, a waiter, in the manslaughter trial which was continued here today.

Mrs. Warner, who, it is alleged, drove her automobile from 30 to 35 miles an hour while in an intoxicated condition, disappeared for two weeks after the accident. She assumed masculine clothing, cut her hair short and moved away from the Derby hotel, Seattle, of which she was the landlady. Her defense will be that it was an unavoidable accident.

Captain Basker Exchanged.

TELLS HOW MASSIVE ZEPPELIN DESCENDED —LIKE A BALL OF FIRE

One of Crew Crashes Through
Roof of Building Into
Kitchen.

London, June 28.—(U. P.)—A vivid account of the destruction of a Zeppelin by the late Lieutenant Warneford, V. C., is given in the following narrative:

"At half past two in the morning, I was awakened by a violent explosion which shook the whole house. I saw a spectacle I shall never forget. Some hundred yards away there appeared a giant Zeppelin bursting into flames. Some seconds later it was an immense furnace. One explosion after another. A rain of fire descended upon the neighborhood.

"Down came the monster like an aerolite till it sank with a frightful crash and lay, an incandescent mass, on the ground. A part of it fell in the court of a convent, burying the dead beneath it. The body of one of the crew fell into the back kitchen of a cafe, crashing through the roof. The debris fell on the country road for a distance of several kilometers. I could pick up pieces by the thousand. A cemetery was strewn with fragments. I picked up charred pieces of rubber and aluminum in the garden. It took 20 days to carry away what was left of the monster."

Sulzer Will Open Mine.
Seattle, Wash., June 28.—(U. P.)—Ex-Governor Sulzer of New York and Mrs. Sulzer, registered at a local hotel, will leave Wednesday night for Alaska, where the Sulzers will open a copper mine to take advantage of the present high prices for the metal. Charles A. Sulzer, brother of the former governor, is in the north at present. The mine is located near Sulzer, Alaska.

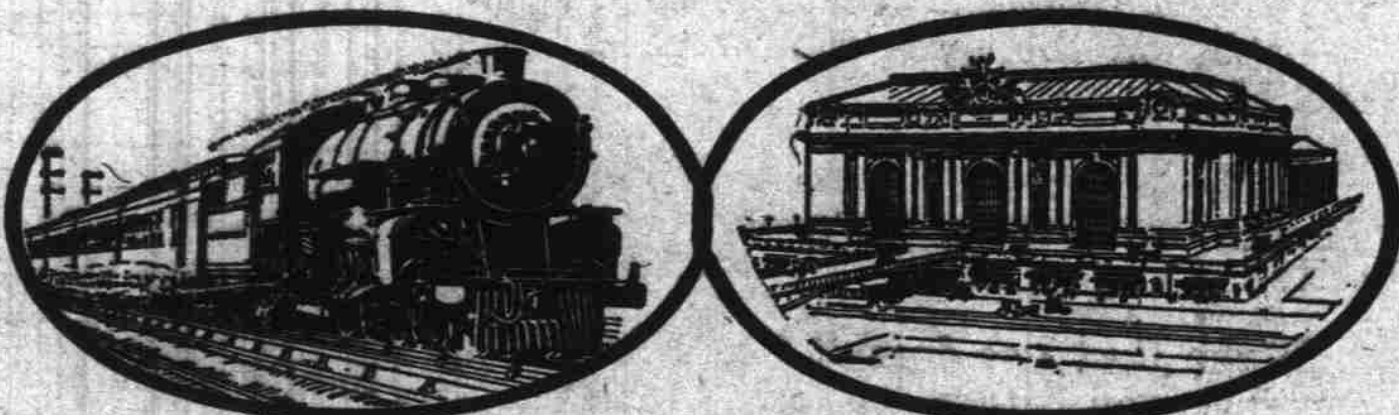

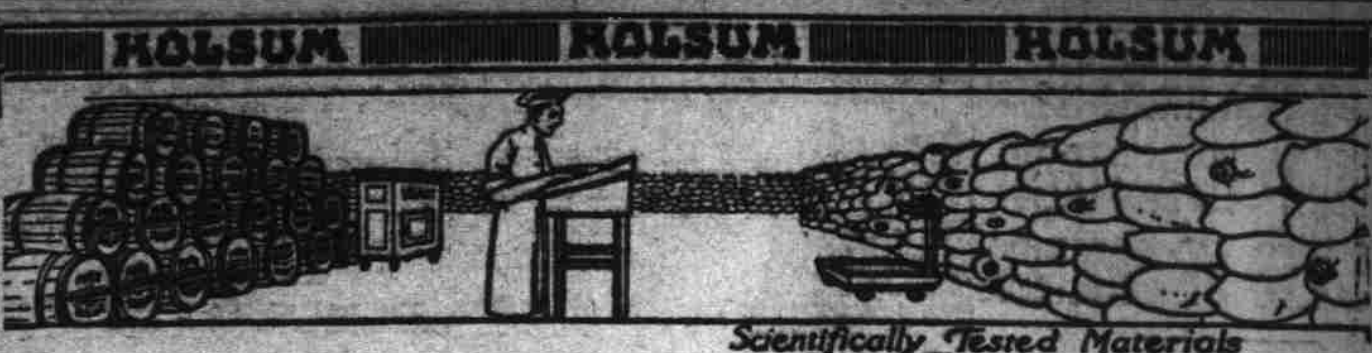
