

SEALER OF WEIGHTS
AND MEASURES IS IN
SEARCH OF EVIDENCENew Ordinance Becomes Ef-
fective; Ice Buyers to Be
Protected.

COOPERATION IS SOUGHT

If New Regulation Is Observed, Ice
Will Be Cheaper, Says
Official.

As the new weights and measures ordinance requiring ice men to deliver tags with all ice sold showing the weight of the ice, the name of the firm and the deliveryman, takes effect today, Municipal Sealer of Weights and Measures Jones is asking for the cooperation of every purchaser of ice in the city.

According to Mr. Jones, if the law is followed, there will be more ice delivered for the same money they will pay now. He asks every purchaser to demand a slip and see that the ice is up to weight when purchased. Heavy penalties are provided for ice men failing to observe the provisions of the ordinance.

Sprinkler Systems Proposed.
Sprinkler systems will be placed in the basements of all buildings used for the storage or manufacture of combustible materials, provided an ordinance introduced before the council is adopted. The ordinance would require the system in all buildings hereafter built, and allow present structures three years to have them installed.

Twenty-seven Saloons Quit.
Owing to the failure of 27 saloon proprietors to renew their liquor licenses June 15, there are that many less saloons in Portland today. The places failing to pay closed their doors at 1 o'clock this morning, leaving 239 saloons in the city. Seven restaurants, grocers, drug stores and others also failed to pay and have stopped selling liquor.

WOMAN, 75, ASKS DIVORCE

San Francisco, Cal., July 1.—(U. P.) Although married 52 years, Mrs. Elizabeth Dorothy Johnson, 75, today filed suit for divorce from her husband, Amasa Parker Johnson, aged 85, on the ground of desertion. Johnson is a real estate dealer at Belmont. The couple lived together 33 years when Mrs. Johnson avers her husband left her. Johnson said today that he did not intend to desert his wife, and that he has a home at Belmont, where she is welcome.

Colored Man Identified.
The body of the colored man who committed suicide on the Linton road Tuesday by taking arsenic, has been identified at the morgue as that of William Moore. The identification was made by an employee of the Kern Drug company of St. John, who said that Moore had purchased the poison Monday to kill insects.

County Boarders
Petition to Go to
Work on Rockpile

Disgusted at the life of inaction in the county jail during the hot summer, prisoners of Corridor D, one of the largest populated sections of Sheriff Harburt's institution, have just unanimously drawn up a petition requesting the opening of the county rockpile.

The men of Corridor D are in the direct rays of the sun, and several of them in the request, which was addressed both to the grand jury and to Public Defender David Robinson, say that they have been seriously affected by the bright sunlight, the intense heat and idleness.

Tone of Musicians
Not Liked by All

Theatrical Managers Will Decide Tonight on Action to Be Taken on the Withdrawal of Demands of Union.

Theatre managers will decide tonight what action they will take as a result of the notice received yesterday from the Musicians' union announcing that the musicians had withdrawn their regulation prescribing the minimum number of persons that should be employed in theatre orchestras.

Some of the theatre managers do not like the tone of the letter received from H. C. Banzor, secretary of the Musicians' union, or of the statement issued by George E. Jeffery, president of the Musicians' union. Mr. Banzor's letter advised that the demand of the musicians was withdrawn on request of the Central Labor council of Portland, with which they are affiliated. The statement issued by Mr. Jeffery said the musicians receded from their position because an investigating committee of the labor council found that the musicians had made an error in proceeding to make their demands without submitting their proposition to the Federation of Theatrical Employees for indorsement.

SAYS HE IS DR. CHILDS

A young man who says he is Dr. H. M. Childs was taken into custody at the Madison Park apartments this morning by Detective Mallett and Price and is detained at the city jail pending an investigation. It is said that an alleged business transaction with Stanley Eoff, of 127 Eleventh street, in which Eoff asserts an attempt to defraud him of \$150 was made, is the basis for action.

June Brides Number 254.
The wedding bells pealed frequently in Multnomah county during June, for according to licenses issued during the month just closed there were 254 June brides. This number is 21 less than for June of 1914 and far below the 1913 record of 420.

CLOSING ARGUMENTS
IN ALIENATION CASE
BEING HEARD TODAYJ. E. Ray Wants \$23,000
From M. V. Donovan; Ver-
dict Expected Tonight.

Closing arguments are being made this afternoon in the \$23,000 alienation of affections case brought by J. E. Ray against Martin V. Donovan before Circuit Judge McGinn. Ray alleged that his wife was wooed and won by Donovan while she played a piano for Donovan in a moving picture house operated by Donovan. A verdict is expected tonight or tomorrow.

FOWLE WOMEN ARE INDICTED

Mother and Daughter Charged
With Slaying of Babe.

Indictments charging second degree murder were returned yesterday afternoon by the June grand jury against Mrs. Bessie L. Fowle, 53 years old and her daughter, Harriet Fowle, 17 years old. June 3 and mother of the baby boy are charged with killing. Both have admitted their participation in the crime. Mrs. Fowle confessed that she strangled the baby May 17, the day following its birth, with a cloth soaked in camphor and that she buried it the following day under a raspberry bush in a lot adjoining her home, 3411 Fifty-fourth street. The girl admitted urging her mother to commit the crime. Donald Duffield, 18 years old, is held on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of the girl, as he has been named as the father of the child. Other indictments returned were: Chris Vasella, charged with passing a worthless check and of uttering a forged check; Paul Waddell and Bill Milam, charges of stealing five horses belonging to William Livingston.

JITNEY REGULATION INVOLVED

Arguments on Injunction Are
Being Presented.

Arguments for modification of the injunction against enforcement of the jitney regulation ordinance pending appeal of the jitney operators to the supreme court are in progress this afternoon before Circuit Judge Gantenben, who issued the injunction.

City Attorney La Roche and Deputy City Attorney W. L. Brewster are appearing for the city in an effort to have the injunction modified that provisions deemed necessary to the public safety be enforced pending the appeal. Attorney G. W. Stapleton is appearing for the Safety First commission. Attorney A. W. Lafferty is appearing for the jitney people, who lost their suit to have the ordinance passed by the people at the election June 7 declared unconstitutional.

Dodge Not Yet on Stand.

The testimony of E. H. Dodge was again postponed in the suit of Parker Steadick, trustee in bankruptcy of the E. H. Dodge interests against Frederick A. Kribe, Willard N. Jones and the J. K. Lumber company in Circuit Judge Kavanaugh's court this morning. Dodge is to testify to a charge made by Attorney Thomas Mannix that William S. Nash of attorneys for the defense of Dodge, had received \$25,000 in bonds in the J. K. Lumber company if he would testify favorably to the defense. Dodge may testify tomorrow or Saturday. The suit involves \$14,000 which Steadick alleges was lost by Dodge through fraud and conversion of property.

County Will Repair Ferry.

The county commissioners this morning rescinded the order of yesterday awarding the contract for repairs of the St. John ferry, recently damaged by fire, to Joseph Supple, and instructed Superintendent of Ferries Welch to rush the repairs with county employees. It was decided that the insurance companies could not under the circumstances make the repairs and that to award the contract would mean delays while bids were called.

Physician Files Answer.

Answering the \$10,000 damage suit of Mrs. Bessie Madden, who charged the performance of an autopsy on the remains of her husband, Edward Madden, without authority, Dr. R. C. McDonald, defendant in the suit, this morning alleged that the autopsy was performed under orders of Coroner Dammasch, who acted in good faith with a desire to determine the cause of Madden's death.

Leaves \$90,000 Estate.

An estate of \$90,000 value was left by Ferdinand Zimmerman, according to a petition filed this morning for appointment of his widow, Mrs. Nina Zimmerman, as executrix of his estate. Mr. Zimmerman died May 21, just one day less than 21 years after he made a will leaving his property to Mrs. Zimmerman. He bequeathed \$2 to each of three daughters and a son.

Al Dotson Is Paroled.

Al Dotson, 19 years old, will not be compelled to face the world with his rights as an American citizen taken from him. This morning Circuit Judge Gatens permitted the boy to withdraw a plea of guilty to a charge of stealing from the grocery store of Dan Kallander and continued the case indefinitely on condition that the boy straighten up and report frequently to Attorney Roscoe Hurst.

Mrs. Sax Sues for Divorce.

Mrs. Rebecca Sax this morning filed a supplemental complaint for divorce against Sam A. Sax alleging that since she sued for divorce Sax has been guilty to a charge of attempted arson and has received a sentence of three and a half to seven and a half years, being placed in the Oregon state penitentiary. She alleges that his plea of guilty convicts him of a felony, giving her good grounds for a decree.

In Jail for Nonsupport.

Arthur Johnson, alleged to have deserted his wife and four children after selling all of the family furniture and taking all of the family funds, was brought back from Pendleton yesterday by Deputy Sheriff Ward and is in the county jail awaiting a hearing on a charge of nonsupport.

Glad He Killed Wife,
Mother of SevenPatrick Lamey Says Only Thing He
Regrets Is That He Didn't Use More
Bullets in Committing Crime.

Los Angeles, July 1.—(P. N. S.)—Refusing to speak to his dying wife, the mother of his seven children, whom he today confessed he had deliberately shot to death, Patrick Lamey was arrested at the side of the dead woman and taken to jail.

Lamey shot his wife with an automatic pistol while she was returning to her home after an hour's absence. He expressed no regret for the deed, but said if the gun had been in better condition he would have fired every bullet into her body.

Lamey had been out of work for a week. He refused to say why he shot his wife.

City Park Employees
Are a Happy LotOut of 79 on Payroll, 50 Have Homes
and Children, Finds City Commission-
sioner.

Out of 79 laborers in the municipal park bureau, 59 of them own their own homes, according to statistics compiled by W. L. Brewster, formerly in charge of the department of public affairs.

These men receive \$3 a day, are married and have happy homes. There are from one to 12 children in the families they support too.

Fire Extinguisher
On Auto Explodes

Cracked by the heat, the Babcock fire extinguisher on Fire Battalion Chief Young's automobile exploded yesterday afternoon, forcing the heavy tank 100 feet in the air. The explosion occurred at Fifth and Morrison streets and the noise when the bottom of the tank burst could be heard for blocks.

The running board of the machine where the tank had stood was badly splintered and the wheels of the car were damaged when the tank flew upward.

Rector of St. David's
Files Resignation

Ill health has caused Rev. Henry Russell Talbot, rector of St. David's Episcopal church, to tender his resignation to the vestry of that church. Dr. Talbot has been ill since he left Philadelphia, on leave of absence and was to have resumed his duties August 1. Beginning next Sunday, Rev. Robert S. Gill of Salem will be in charge of the services of St. David's.

Yoncalla Bank Reports.

Roseburg, Or., July 1.—A report of the affairs of the Yoncalla State bank, which suspended business some time ago, has been filed with the county clerk here. The report shows claims to the amount of \$60,944.02. The total amount of money collected during the liquidation to date is \$32,355.35. The disbursements were \$33,555, leaving a balance of \$23,100.92 to be paid out in dividend to depositors. The first dividend, to be paid at once, will be 45 per cent. It is understood another dividend will be made later when other collections are now due, will be made.

Inherits Two Estates.

Florence Serruler is the sole heir to the estates of both her mother, Mrs. Florence Taylor, and her step-father, Charles M. Taylor, according to her petition for probate of the estates of her parents filed this morning. Mrs. Taylor died March 31 leaving property estimated to be worth \$9084.97 and Mr. Taylor died May 18 leaving an estate estimated to be worth \$4694.93. Mr. and Mrs. Taylor each left wills dated July 16, 1894.

Sues for Death of Daughter.

Drew Griffin, a Eugene merchant, as administrator of the estate of his daughter, Winifred, 7½ years old, has sued P. M. Dekum, owner of the Oregonian, for \$10,000 damages because of the girl's death. The little girl was crushed to death in the automatic elevator of the apartment house in an accident which occurred last November.

Children Are Heirs.

Ten grandchildren and seven children are heirs of Mrs. Mary C. Oiler, who died June 23 leaving property estimated to be worth \$4000, according to a petition filed yesterday for probate of her will. Her oldest son was 90 years old. She left \$5 each to her children and grandchildren and divided the remainder among her children.

Jitney Driver Fined.

A. K. Crumley, jitney driver, asked for a jury trial in the municipal court on a charge of driving past a red car that had stopped. He was convicted and fined \$10 by Judge Stevenson.

CHAMBERS OF NATION
UPHOLD ATTITUDE OF
LOCAL ORGANIZATIONResult of Vote Taken All Over
Country Is Given Out Here
Today.

Results of the nation-wide vote by chambers of commerce regarding the attitude of the Chambers of Commerce of the United States on the shipping situation were announced by the Portland Chamber of Commerce today. In every instance, save one, the result of the general vote was the same as the vote by the membership of the local chamber.

The national chamber's members oppose the policy of the government in undertaking the purchase, charter or construction of vessels for mercantile purposes, together with their operation. They oppose the policy of government ownership with private operation. They favor subsidies by the government sufficient to offset the difference in cost between operation of vessels under the American flag and operation in the same deep-sea trades under foreign flags.

They favor subvention from the government to establish regular mail ship freight lines under the American flag to countries in which the commercial interests of the United States are important.

The national chamber favors a federal shipping board to investigate and report to congress regarding the navigation laws and to have full jurisdiction. The chamber favors the proposition to subscribe to the entire stock of \$30,000,000 for a company to finance pur-
