New Train Added On Tillamook Line

Departure From Portland Will Be at
1:40 p. m. and From Beach End at
4:30; Other Special Trains.

Additional summer train service by the Southern Pacific starts today on the Tillamook beach run, one new train each way being inaugurated. BONES FOUND IN THE SILETZ THOUGHT PART OF MAYES' SKELETON

Accident of Two Years Ago
Recalled by Finding of
Shoulder Blade, Skull.

Toledo, Or., July 1.—While fishing in the Siletz river gorge Tuesday with a party of friends, I. R. Wishart, local druggist, found the shoulder blade of a human being and a human skull.

The bones are believed to be from the body of Oscar Mayes of Dallas, who two years ago while walking over a foot bridge across the Siletz river with a companion, was thrown into the water when the bridge gave way.

The companion swam ashore, but Mayes was not seen again. Repeated attempts to find his body, no trace of him was ever found, and it was not known whether he had been drowned or had been struck on the head and stunned, and had wandered away in the woods in a demented condition.

The bones were found about a mile below where Mayes fell into the river.

Mothers' Troubles Heavy.
Oscar Mayes, believed to have drowned in the Siletz river, was a son of Mrs. Jessie Mayes of the Cody apartments, East Seventh and Taylor streets, who has suffered a series of misfortunes during the last 18 months.

Mrs. Mayes had barely recovered from the shock of the death of her son Oscar, when she was taken seriously ill, and she was sick in bed when news was received of the accidental death of her son Jack, an aviator with Villa's army in Mexico.

Last week Mrs. Mayes lost a suitcase containing a number of her most precious possessions, including pictures of her sons.

Germany Planning To Get More Boats

New Submarine Campaign to Sink
Vessels Carrying Ammunition From
the United States Is Arranged For.

Washington, July 1.—(I. N. S.)—Germany is planning a new submarine campaign against British and French steamers about to leave New York and other Atlantic ports with ammunition, according to advice reaching here today from Scandinavian sources. The state department is understood to be gravely concerned, fearing further complications of the crisis between the United States and Germany should Americans suffer.

It is understood that deliveries of munitions made in the United States are scheduled to commence tomorrow to the allies and that many ammunition freighters will cross from the United States in the next few weeks. In anticipation of start of this service, the Scandinavian reports say, Germany is massing many thoroughly modernized submarines at Wilhelmshaven and will strike as soon as the hunt begins to move.

Germany Suppresses More Newspapers

Incurs Kaiser's Displeasure by Reprint-
ing Peace Plans That Caused Sus-
pension of Berlin Vorwarts.

Amsterdam, via London, July 1.—(I. N. S.)—Several Socialist papers in Germany have been suppressed for reprinting the Socialist appeal for peace which was originally published by the Berlin Vorwarts, resulting in that paper's suspension. The papers suppressed for reprinting the article include the Koeningberger Volks Zeitung and the Goerlitzer Volk Zeitung.

Goodwin Snatched From Death.
New York, July 1.—(I. N. S.)—Nat Goodwin, actor, is alive today through the quick wit of a "movie director," Harley Knowles, who was knocked unconscious after rescuing him from certain death. Goodwin was riding in an automobile which was to go over the palladium at Woodcliff, N. J., when the platform over which the car had to travel gave way. The car had

stopped on the platform to permit the substitution of a dummy for Mr. Goodwin. Suddenly the platform gave way and Director Knowles just had time to snatch Goodwin from his seat as the machine crashed through on its way to the bottom, 150 feet below.
