

## ARRANGEMENTS FOR PEACE CENTENARY AT BLAINE COMPLETE

Ceremony Will Take Form of  
Flag Raising on Boundary  
of British and U. S. Flags.  
EXPECT BIG ATTENDANCE

Representatives of Several Foreign  
Countries Will Be Present, as Well  
as Coast Point People.

Arrangements for the celebration of  
100 years of peace between the United  
States and Great Britain at Blaine,  
Wash., July 4, under the auspices of  
the Pacific Highway association have  
been completed. The ceremony will  
take the form of a flag raising. Two  
flag poles will be set up on the bound-  
ary line, and at 2 o'clock in the after-  
noon the British and American flags  
will be hoisted simultaneously. Suit-  
able addresses will then be made.  
A large attendance from Vancouver,  
B. C., and Seattle is expected, and a  
number of Portland people are prepar-  
ing to be there.

The coast states will be represented.  
Frank Branch Riley having been ap-  
pointed by Governor Withcomb to  
represent Oregon. A number of rep-  
resentatives of foreign countries will

## NORTHWEST HAPPENINGS

**Spokane**—Former Secretary of State  
William J. Bryan will be a speaker at  
the Liberty bell celebration in Spo-  
kane the morning of Tuesday, July 13,  
according to plans announced by the  
committee in charge of the patriotic  
celebration.

**Seattle**—The Roosevelt, the ship in  
which Admiral Peary traveled on the  
trip which ended with the discovery of  
the North pole, will be in Seattle with-  
in a few weeks on route to Alaska and  
the North Pacific, in the service of  
the fisheries department.

**Seattle**—Since the new motor law  
went into effect in June 1st, Ju-  
niper, Auditor Phelps has issued to-  
day 8707 licenses for automobiles and  
motorcycles netting King county \$56,-  
68. Phelps estimates that only half  
the owners of motor vehicles have ob-  
tained their licenses thus far.

**Midfield**—While William Ahrens, a  
well known rancher of this place, was  
ranging a large bull from the field  
the animal turned and charged him,  
Ahrens' collar bone and right shoulder  
were broken.

**Tacoma**—Tacoma ministers, whose  
request that no automobile races be  
held on Sunday, July 4, was turned  
down by the Montanara Feste man-  
agement, will not accept passes to the  
race.

**Port Angeles**—Although heir to \$53,-  
000 left by a brother in Minneapolis,  
Louis Brandt refused to give up his  
work in a logging camp, and is dead  
as a result of a scalding received when  
donkey engine exploded last Friday.

**Albany**—Although he is a dentist,  
here will be a dignified funeral when  
John Dahl, a police character, is laid  
to rest. Jailor Bob Hickey made sure  
this today when he solicited funds  
for the funeral. Dahl, who was 72  
years old, at one time was prosperous  
and noted for his humorous sayings.

**Tacoma**—The chorus of 400 voices  
which will take part in the religious-  
patriotic service to be held in the Ta-  
coma stadium July 4, is ready for the  
big event. The singers heard their final  
hearsal last night.

**Seattle**—Plunged into darkness by  
the sudden disconnecting of the gas  
handler, M. J. Burke, a lodger in a  
hotel, struck a match to see what  
the trouble was. An explosion which  
looked the entire building, doing dam-  
age estimated at \$200, followed, and  
Burke and his companion, A. J. Law-  
son, were taken to the city hospital  
suffering from burns.

**Centralia**—A long trestle on the  
Western Railway & Lumber Co.'s line  
at Kopah, was threatened with de-  
struction Tuesday by a fire that pre-  
sumably started from a passing loco-  
motive. George D. Berlin, who was  
riding by the trestle, discovered the  
fire, and notified the mill company  
by phone. An engine and water tank  
were rushed to the scene and the blaze  
was extinguished. About 50 feet of  
the structure was burned.

**Aberdeen**—Because she tried to save  
second trunk, after hauling one out  
her room which had caught on fire,  
Mrs. Mary Beck, 109 years old, of  
Aberdeen, is believed today to be fatal-  
ly burned. A neighbor's boy saved  
her from perishing in the flames.

## HYPOCRISY CHARGE IS BITTERLY DENIED BY GERMAN GOVERNMENT

Germany Suffered Greatly  
From Lack of Ammunition  
at Start of War, Is Claim.

Berlin, July 1.—(U. P.)—(Via wire-  
less to Sayville.)—David Lloyd  
George's charge of hypocrisy on the  
part of Germany in preparing for war  
through the buying and manufacturing  
of enormous quantities of ammunition  
while ostensibly maintaining the  
friendliest relations with other Eu-  
ropean powers, notably Great Britain,  
today was made the subject of bitter  
denunciation in a statement of the  
Overseas News agency.  
Declaring the assertion of the British  
minister of munitions had been offi-  
cially refuted as a baseless defama-  
tion, the agency said:  
"Best proof to the contrary is of-  
fered by the fact that Germany in re-  
ality suffered greatly from lack of am-  
munition at the beginning of the war

but soon overcame this condition  
through the efficiency of German in-  
dustry."  
In a supplementary statement, accus-  
ing Russia of lending encouragement  
to guerrilla warfare, the agency said:  
"When German troops occupied the  
portions of Courland, the Russians ad-  
vised the Letts to rise up and wage  
a franc-tireur warfare. Lett papers  
sanguinely declared support of this policy  
and advised the inhabitants to remain  
peaceful and orderly."  
The statement concluded with the  
gratifying assertion that "Courland would  
have shared Belgium's fate if there had  
been any attempt to initiate the war-  
fare waged by the Belgians."
