

HIGHWAYMAN HOLDS UP MT. TABOR CAR AND GETS \$13 CASH

Jitney Driver Reports Attempt
to Rob Him on Willamette
Boulevard.

ONE HOUSE IS RANSACKED

Flourist on Way Home Found on East
Side Stabbed in Back by an
Unknown Assailant.

Two holdups and a house robbery
occurred yesterday afternoon and last
night.

A lone highwayman held up a Mount
Tabor car at East Eighth and
East Yamhill streets about 12 o'clock
last night, getting \$13 from Conductor
F. T. Reid. No passengers were
on the car.

The car was standing still, just be-
fore starting on the return trip to
Portland, when the robber, wearing a
black mask, stepped quietly on board
and ordered Reid and Motorman H. J.
Scott, who were sitting inside the car,
to throw up their hands. He made
Reid empty his pockets, taking the
money which Reid had taken as fares.

Sam Davis, jitney driver, reported to
the police that two men tried to hold
him up near the city limits on Willamette
boulevard, but that he beat them off
before they could get his money.
Davis said that two men hired his ma-
chine down town and ordered him to
drive for St. Johns.

Revolver Is Flashed

When nearing the city limits one
of them ordered him to stop, and then
flashed a revolver in his face, accord-
ing to his story. He told the police
he knocked the gun from the man's
hand and then gave both of them a
beating. The police look on his story
with suspicion.

While E. H. Florschutz, 739 Sycamore
street, and family, were away from
the house yesterday afternoon, burglars
entered and removed several
pieces of jewelry, including a gold
nugget stickpin, cut links, a watch
chain and several other pieces.

Stabbed in Back

Returning home early this morning
James Preberg, a florist, was stabbed
in the back of the neck by an un-
known assailant, sustaining several
deep gashes. Considerable mystery
is attached to the strange attack on
Preberg as he did not see his assailant
nor can he assign any reason for
any one attacking him unless for the
purpose of robbery.

The affray happened at Fremont
and Rodney avenue. According to
Preberg he had just stepped on the
curb at Rodney when he felt a sharp
pain in the back of his neck. Then
the blood began to gush out, and he
fell. When he picked himself up no
one was in sight. He walked to his
home at 560 Rodney avenue where an
Ambulance Service car was called and
he was taken to the St. Vincent's hos-
pital. While the cuts are deep they
are not believed to be serious.

regard, however, probably will not be
definitely known until he is called as
a witness for the government if he is
called.

During Muraire's connection with
the cashier company he was one of its
most active agents, and disposed of
tens of thousands of the million dol-
lar worth of stock and bonds. Joseph
Hunter, who changed his plea to
guilty Saturday, Muraire went to In-
diana and joined the force of the In-
ternational Coin Machine company of
Terre Haute when it took over the
"remains" of the local cashier com-
pany following its collapse here in
1913. When indicted he returned vol-
untarily to Portland and pleaded not
guilty.

With Muraire as a witness and
Hunter already confessed guilty the
opportunity for the government to

substantiate its charges of fraudulent
use of the mails is strengthened in
that degree.

A panel of 100 is in attendance upon
the court from which a jury will be
drawn beginning this afternoon.

Many attorneys in cases.

Although the defense has no less
than 12 attorneys including some of
the most prominent in Oregon, it is
anticipated that selection of the jury
will not be a tedious affair. There is
in fact a strong possibility that it
will be selected before adjournment
this evening. The prosecution will be
handled by United States Attorney
Reames, aided by Deputy John Beck-
man. The attorneys for the defense
include W. C. Clark, Martin Pipes,
John F. Logan, Dan Maloney, Thomas
Fitzgerald, Lake Blythe, Colonel Do-
son of Seattle, Lark Blythe of Eugene
and Frank Collier. Now that Muraire's
case has been continued, the list of de-
fendants comprises these: Frank Men-
dese, president of the United States
Cashier company; Thomas Blythe, in-
ventor of the machines and director; F.
M. Johnson, former stock sales man-
ager; O. E. Gernert, his assistant; H.
M. Todd and B. F. Bonnell, sales-
men; and Oscar Campbell of Eugene,
vice president. The trial will last a
month or longer.

alienists who have been identified with

Holt in Bad Shape.

Dr. Cleghorn said this afternoon
that Holt was too weak to be taken to
Glencoe tomorrow for preliminary
hearing.

In addition to being weakened by
the loss of blood, he is suffering
from stomach trouble and is un-
able to take any nourishment except
orange juice and the whites of eggs.
It is possible that the court hearing
may be held in the jail in view of the
fact that Holt's condition would make
worse by his attempt at suicide.
Holt's suspenders and other articles
of wearing apparel which he might
have used in attempting suicide had
been taken from him before last night
but when the prisoner asked for a pen-
cil, saying he wished to write a letter,
the turnkey suspected nothing. He
had been restless during the early part
of the night and had not slept. Shortly
after midnight he became strangely
quiet, however, and it was then that
the turnkey investigated and found
the prisoner bleeding from the gash in
his wrist.

Poof of Blood on the Floor

There was a pool of blood on the
floor of his cell. The pencil, with its
sharpened tin cap was found on the
floor where Holt had dropped it after
cutting himself. He had lost consid-
erable blood, but the flow was quickly
checked when Dr. Cleghorn was sum-
moned and banded the wound.

Holt dismissed T. J. Ready, whom
he first engaged as his attorney, and
today retained Martin Littlefield to
defend him. A telegram from Holt's
wife in Dallas was received today and
delivered to the prisoner. In her mes-
sage Mrs. Holt said:
"Have best counsel here. Advised
to rest and wait. You must do same.
Loving greetings hourly. Be careful
tribute to you in both evening papers.
I am tarrying for details of our fi-
nances. I will come when you need
me. Don't be afraid. Rest. (Signed)
"LEONIE."

Woman Cries Mysteriously

The dramatic appearance of a pretty
young woman who demanded to see
Holt, would-be assassin of J. P. Mor-
gan, added a new element of mystery
to the case. Warden Hulise refused to
admit the young woman and she de-
clined to give her name or tell why
she desired to see Holt. She carried
a letter purporting to be from the
chief of police of Dallas, Texas, ask-
ing that "every courtesy" be shown
her.

Holt was told in his cell of the visit
of the young woman, but said he had
no idea who she might be. His wife
was in Dallas yesterday. "The girl ar-
rived here, presumably from New
York at 10:30 this morning. She ap-
peared at the jail early in the day and
asked that she be permitted to see
Holt."

If the prisoner is not considered
strong enough to be taken from the
jail to Glencoe tomorrow the pre-
liminary hearing set for Wednesday
by Justice Lusk will be postponed.

Physicians and jail officers alike
who have dealt with Holt are con-
vinced he is insane, but the police have
not dropped the theory that the pris-
oner may have had accomplices in his
attempt to blow up the capital in

Washington as well as in his attack
upon Morgan. Holt has declared he
will tell the full story of his life when
arraigned before Justice Lusk and
the police hope to clear up the mystery
resulting from reports of the close
resemblance the prisoner bears to
Erich Muester, former Harvard pro-
fessor, who fled after being charged
with the murder of his wife.

Dr. Cleghorn, physician at the county
jail here, today declared that an
examination of Frank Holt, who at-
tempted to assassinate J. P. Morgan,
revealed scars similar to those de-
scribed by the police as having been
carried by Erich Muester, former Har-
vard professor, wanted on a charge of
having murdered his wife.

MORGAN IS BETTER AND OUT OF DANGER, PHYSICIANS REPORT

Glencoe, N. Y., July 6.—(U. F.)—

J. P. Morgan called his office on the
telephone from his home and dis-
cussed business affairs with his part-
ners. Morgan told his partners that
despite the two wounds from which he
is suffering as a result of the attack
of Frank Holt he now "felt fine."

Physicians attending Mr. Morgan
announced today that because the pa-
tient is practically out of danger no
more bullets as to his condition will
be issued from the Morgan home here.
All future reports will come from the
Wall street office of J. P. Morgan &
Co.

Morgan is becoming restless because
of being forced to remain in bed while
the two wounds inflicted by Frank
Holt, when the latter shot the finan-
cier Saturday night, are healing. Mor-
gan himself feels that he will soon be
able to leave his bed and again take a hand
in his vast business affairs, from his
home, at least.

The fact that none of the local of-
ficials who will conduct the case
against Holt has been permitted to talk
to Morgan, however, has renewed the
belief that the financier's condition
may not be as favorable as the official
bulletins indicate.

Justice Spencer Morgan, the finan-
cier's son, today assured reporters
that his father was about out of
danger.

How Morgan escaped a fatal wound
in the abdomen is regarded as almost
miraculous. It is a mystery how the
bullet entered almost at the center of
the abdomen without piercing the wall.
Physicians express the opinion that
the bullet fired by Holt probably en-
tered Morgan's body at an angle and
was deflected by a roll of muscle.

No Credentials Given

Dallas, Texas, July 6.—Police Chief
Ryan denied he had given any young
woman credentials to call on Frank
Holt, held in the Mineola, L. L. jail
for shooting J. P. Morgan.

Attempts to Kill Union Secretary

Man, Calling at Home of Charles John-

son, of International Bricklayers' Union, Shoots Him in Back.

Chicago, July 6.—(U. P.)—An un-
known man called at the home of
Charles Johnson, secretary of the In-
ternational Union of Bricklayers, early
today, and when Johnson met him at
the door fired two shots through
Johnson's lungs. The assailant es-
caped.

Johnson, who has played an active
part in Chicago's carpenters' strike, is
in a precarious condition.

187,459 Attended Exposition on 4th

San Francisco, July 6.—(U. P.)—Ex-
position officials announced today
that 187,459 people passed through the
fair gates yesterday to celebrate In-
dependence Day. With the exception of

255,149 persons were registered at the
gates, yesterday's attendance breaks
all records. There were no accidents.
